Community Grants Total \$74,000

The Bunyip and Garfield Community Op Shops handed out their Community Grants last week on Friday and Sunday with Bunyip Community Shop supporting 24 community organisations and Garfield Community Shop supporting 30.

Hillview Bunyip Aged Care received the largest grant from the Bunyip shop of \$8900.00 which will be used to furnish a room in the recently built Bill Pearson

Wing.

Bunyip Community Shop distributed \$43,529.00 and Garfield Community Shop gave out \$30,536.00. President and Coordinator of the Garfield Shop, Helen Davey said that in the past financial year \$27,200.00 was also donated to the fire emergency relief fund following the tragic fires in March which meant that the total given is actually \$56,736.00

New Wing At Hillview Named In Honour Of Bill Pearson

More than 150 people including staff and residents attended the official opening of the newly built extension and the refurbishment of the Memory Support Unit at Hillview Bunyip Aged Care last Wednesday morning the 17th of July.

The opening was officially made by Mr.Russell Broadbent, M.P. for Monash which was fitting as the Grants of \$1.5 million for the extensions and \$500.000 for the refurbishment of Shelley House were made possible through his efforts. Mr.Broadbent has a high regard for Hillview, an admiration of the Board and for the dedication of the staff in providing high quality care for the residents.

The Bill Pearson Wing extension resulted in a total build of 12 new rooms. Four rooms were demolished and 8 additional rooms added. There is now a total number of 58 approved beds , 10 additional bed licences have been approved currently not in use and will be built in the near future.

The extension is named The Bill Pearson Wing in honour of Bill Pearson of Bunyip North. Bill played a major role in fundraising for the building of the original Hillview which opened in 1994. He was also the first CEO of Hillview and worked tirelessly without pay for the first 18 months to get the facility off the ground on a firm financial base. Bill was also secretary of the Board of the Community Medical Centre which was sold in 2016 with the proceeds of the sale in excess of \$750,000 going to Hillview.

Hillview Aged Care Board President Sue Beattie and CEO Frank Hoff also presented a plaque honouring the late much loved and respected local Erica Ponting who gave so much of self to the Bunyip Community. A special garden in her honour will be built at Hillview.

The extensions and refurbishments were carried out by local builder Brad Lamble whose father Steve built the original Hillview which opened in 1994. Steve's father Jack Lamble built Shelley Memorial Hospital, which closed in 1991 and is now the current site of Hillview.

Features of new rooms include 23 square metres, Eight rooms have north facing aspects looking out onto A'Beckett Road and 4 rooms have courtyard aspects with sliding doors. All rooms have smart TV's Foxtel, fridges all new furniture, hydronic heating, ceiling track hoists, direct dial phones and quality window furnishings.

Planning for the big trip – part 1

So you have the motorbike, the approved annual leave, a couple eager like-minded mates, and most importantly the leave pass from your partner and family! All that's left is to decide where to go and for how long...right!? Need I say there's a little more to planning a long motorbiking trip, especially if you plan to head into the central parts of our magnificent brown land for a couple of weeks or more.

I've recently gone down this same thought journey, and my mate Tim and I have decided that its time to head back up north into some of the outback tracks of NSW, Sth Australia, ...places like Cameron's Corner, Innamincka, Birdsville and the fabulous Flinders Ranges. I'll be riding my trusty KTM 990 AdventureR and Tim will be aboard his Honda Africa Twin... two more-than-capable bikes for a trip like this...long hours in the saddle, 40% bitumen, and the rest a combination of sandy tracks, reasonably well-graded gravel roads, a few creek crossings and some rougher rocky sections up through Arkaroola.

We plan to do around 4,800kms over about 10 days, riding highway to Broken Hill, then mostly on gravel roads and smaller sandy tracks, and will probably camp on around 5 nights. We've been into central Australia 2 or 3 times before, so we have a fair idea of what has and hasn't worked in the past.

The first thing to think about is where you want to go and how readily accessible the fuel is. This will determine how much additional fuel you'll need to carry and how to carry it. I've used expandable fuel bladders but found they can rupture so instead I carry a 10-litre hard plastic fuel container. Also allow for several litres of water for cooking and drinking but also to balance out your load. Remember to keep your centre of gravity (CoG) as low as you can when positioning your bags and packing. I prefer soft pannier bags either side at the rear of my bike. Pack any tools, water, etc at the bottom of the bags and keep the bags as narrow as possible as wide bags also throw the balance and CoG off, especially when riding through loose gravel or sand.

You'll need to check your toolkit and take a few spares with you but be sure not to double up on common tools or spares by sharing items between you and your mates. Apart from standard tools you should consider items such as air filters (pre-oiled in a ziplock bag), oil, lubricant, cables, cable ties, gaffer tape, spare screws/nuts/bolts, spare fuses. If you plan to do a lot of gravel tracks or off-road, be sure to have the right tyre tread, especially on the rear – a good 50/50 road/dirt combination – there are plenty in the market to choose from. Because we'll be running lower tyre pressures when in sand, its also worth considering getting a rim-lock fitted to your rear wheel to stop the (deflated) tyre from rotating and shearing off your tube valve. I've seen this happen to a tyre and tube that were only 200kms old!

Take 4 good tyre levers (shared amongst you), a tyre pressure gauge, and a couple of spare heavy-duty tubes. If space or weight is becoming an issue then take tubes that fit your front wheel size as these could be fitted to the back in an emergency, but also take a good puncture repair kit. Most adventure type bikes have centre stands which makes changing flats a lot easier, but consider what you'd have to do if you only have a side-stand. We've had to previously balance the bike on rock using a large branch as leverage – it wasn't pretty but it worked. Download the service manual for your particular bike (try the website: xxxxxxx) and transfer the pdf document to your phone. If you don't have one, consider hiring an EPIRB device. They're inexpensive these days and provide great peace of mind out in the desert and remote areas. I've previously gone for 7 days without any mobile phone coverage. Load up your bike completely and take it for a test run a couple of weeks prior to your trip. Test the balance and feel, as well as the straps and placement of your bags panniers, tent and sleeping bag. Remember...try to keep the weight balanced, keep the weight low and as close to the bike frame as possible.

I'll continue with part 2 of the planning next month. Write to me on the above email if you have any comments, questions or suggestions. Until next month, ride safe....cheers

Ready to serve

Over the past week we have attended several call outs during the wild and wet weather. It is important that motorists drive to the conditions. Cutting your speed back a few kms in wet conditions will improve your chances of getting to your destination safely.


Recently the brigade members have been very busy updating their first aid skills including CPR. Members have also been training on the new lighter and more compact Breathing Apparatus. The new BA equipment now means that all emergency agencies have similar equipment enabling inter-agency training and use. We also have members undertaking Fire Equipment Maintenance training which entails maintaining extinguishers, hose reels and other portable firefighting equipment.

It's essential to know that smoke alarms more than 10 years old should be replaced as they may become unreliable. CFA recommends photo-electric smoke alarms powered by a 10 year lithium battery. When installed and maintained correctly these smoke alarms detect smoke the quickest, alerting you earlier and giving you more time to evacuate to safety.

Fires can occur at any time, but the personal risk is greatest at night when we are asleep. When we sleep we can lose our sense of smell.

Shelterbelts do recover after fire

On Saturday 3rd August, 38 landholders from the Western Port catchment and Bunyip fire affected area attended a workshop at Bunyip North focussing on post fire shelterbelt design, fire ecology and environmental weeds.

At the event, Ecologist Gidja Walker, spoke about how plants respond to fire in the Australian context, what fire hazardous characteristics to avoid, and what characteristics to encourage. She also spoke about how to structure your shelterbelt to avoid the rapid movement of fire across your property.

Other factors that determine how a fire spreads are wind, slope and aspect. According to Gidja, the best orientation for your shelterbelt is from east to west as the prevailing fire winds are usually northerly then tend to swing around to the south west. Avoid having shelterbelts running up a slope, particularly on a drier northern slopes, but rather have them running across a slope and provide gaps between them to impede the wicking effect from the fire. The structure of the shelterbelt vegetation is also critical.

Gidja recommends removing hanging bark and fine fuels in your shelterbelt prior to the fire season as these can create fuses for fire to travel into canopy and cause fire spotting as leaves and bark are picked up by the wind and transported ahead of the fire front. Gidja also recommends planting clumps of mid storey vegetation which can impede the movement of fire within the shelterbelt. "Remember that fire travels faster uphill, faster through grassland than forest and there is a difference between fire intensity and severity" she said.

Some of the characteristics to avoid when designing your shelterbelt are summer dry annual winter growing grasses, high biomass of dead fine material, species with a high oil content or loose candling bark, dense woody weed understorey, even age stands that are starting to reach the end of their natural life (senescence) and plants that look sick or dead (remove them). On the plus side, characteristics to encourage are indigenous summer growing grasses, sheoaks and cherry ballart, long lived wattles such as Blackwoods, low growing ground cover and herbs and to maintain moss and ground layer. "Swamp gums have a relatively low oil content unlike some of the other eucalypt species and can be grown in a number of situations" she said.

Gidja also spoke about post fire rehabilitation of your shelterbelt and the process of weed prioritisation and alternative weed removal techniques. She recommends that you minimise disturbance to your burnt area and monitor for regeneration

and weeds. If weeds do start to emerge then non-chemical means of weed removal are best.

This event was organised by the Bunyip Fire Natural Environment Subcommittee which includes representatives from local Councils, the Port Phillip & Westernport CMA, Landcare, Melbourne Water, Victorian Farmers Federation and AgVic. The subcommittee meets fortnightly to ensure that fire affected landholders have access to relevant information and services to support the recovery from the March bushfire. Sound travels whether you are on or near water, it bounces off the water, cuts through the trees like it's amplified at times. If you can close your eyes and just **LISTEN** for a while, you'll hear a lot more going on around you than you thought was apparently not there. Insects flying around your head, so on the river too. The speed of the runs in the stream, the strength of the wind, feeling it on your face will give you the direction too. Stay crouched and hidden and listen for a rising trout splash, that'll spark your interest for sure.

The one I've always listened intensely for is a sliding snake in the grass, that'll open your eyes for certain. The sounds that I would miss on a river are a Kookaburra's laugh, a Magpie's warble, even a Crow's call, Ducks, not so much. The wind whistling through the gum trees and the leaves flapping along with it. A tied winged Damsel dry fly buzzing past my ear attached to the end of my fly leader. If this all sounds a bit like poetry that's because it is, poetry of the bush.

Take some ear plugs with you next time and 'insert', take away that all important sense. See if you agree with me, you'll find I'm right because we take it all for granted like most things that are everyday givens.

Here's an experiment for you that demonstrates it better, turn your TV sound right down to '0' you'll be amazed how much more detail you'll notice than you normally would, just by viewing it only.

It's the same thing going on here. Respectively sight without sound or sound without sight, one takes over and enhances the other. Without the advantage of sound for a few minutes, (plugs in) just watch and observe, you miss a lot of bush traffic by thunder footing along the banks spooking everything and missing everything that moves around you. Stay hidden and take the time to just **LOOK** sometimes you'll learn a lot more than you'd have ever expected. Fish you'd walked right by, Platypus and insect's water landings, a multitude of aquatic life.

SMELL is another sense, but mine is not that good anymore, and for the amount of cow dung around the banks I'm grateful for that small mercy.

So skill up and enhance your 'Spidey' senses have a greater awareness of your surroundings as it will improve your fishing stealth, hunting skills and safety.

To The Editor - Farewell to BlaizeAid

After completing 152 km of fences and clearing 300km of damaged fence line in the area affected by the Bunyip complex fires, on Friday August 16, the Bunyip BlazeAid camp closed down.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all volunteers I would like to offer a special thanks to the Bunyip Scouts, who participated in this exercise.

When work commenced on March 12, BlazeAid volunteers were faced with blackened paddocks, smouldering trees and destroyed fences.

By July, conditions were the complete opposite, rain, wind, mud and slippery working conditions. It is a testament to the dedication of the fencing teams that they continued to go out every day and repair fences.

The fencing crews were the visible face of BlazeAid, but supporting them was a dedicated crew who provided breakfast, ingredients for lunches to be taken to the jobs and afternoon tea. This team was led by Therese Baker and Sue Neilson from Bunyip. A number of community groups were rostered to provide dinner every evening. This task was coordinated by Sarah Johnson.

Running a camp of this nature requires back office support, and this was provided by Cathrine Righton from Bunyip who undertook this task in a very professional manner.

As coordinators, my wife Sue and I were ably assisted by Paul Knight and Simon Righton who provided dedicated support to the fencing crews.

BlazeAid also has to ensure that tools and equipment are in sound operational condition, and this important role

was carried out by Joe Petersen from Tungamah who has been at the camp since March.

Cooperation from the community groups who share their facilities at the Bunyip recreation reserve also played a big part in the success of BlazeAid.

Tennis, Netball and Cricket clubs for allowing us the use of their facilities during this period.

BlazeAid exists solely by the generosity of donors, and, to the many organisations and individuals who supported this exercise BlazeAid is extremely grateful.

As you can see, with over 600 volunteers who came and went during this period, the logistics of this exercise were complex and really did require a coordinated team effort. Finally, from feedback I have received from the volunteers, the greatest reward that they all agree upon, is seeing the transformation of the property owners whose fences have been replaced, and seeing livestock return to the area.

Speech made by Tony Fitzgerald chair of the Community Recovery Committee at BlazeAid breakup.

I was looking for a quote that would best described great community action and I decided on this one by Coretta Scott King. Coretto was Martin Luther's King's wife and a great person and activist in her own right. Coretta said - The greatness of a community is most accurately measured by the compassionate actions of its members - if that's the case we have the greatest community imaginable right here in this venue this evening.

When our fire Recovery Committee were planning this event we reflected on the overwhelming generosity that we had and are still receiving. We talked about the great CFA, the good old Salvo's, the Red Cross, Rotary, Lions, Windermere, four wheel drive club, Samaritans Purse, the compassionate Buddhist, our wonderful Sikh community, local businesses and our own Cardinia Shire have also given us strong, consistent and caring support.

I certainly haven't named everyone and for that I apologise but our heartfelt thanks goes out to every individual or group or business who has displayed any act of kindness in our hour of greatest need.

So, we are here this evening to celebrate the amazing organisation that is BlazeAid and it's band of 600 volunteers who have traveled from the far reaches of our great country to come to help rebuild the lives of us West Gipps landers in Tynong North, Garfield North, Bunyip North and Tonimbuk.

You have come with big smiles on your faces (well, most of you) and compassion in your hearts to give us the great gift of selfless generosity. You worked so bloody hard and for months on end. As mentioned over 600 volunteers - you cleared approximately 300 kilometres of debris and old fencing and then erected 130 kilometres of new fencing.

An estimate of the economic value of BlazEAid's work revealed that without BlazeAid it would have cost over \$2ml in labor and equipment to achieve the same outcome.

Then our own local BlazeAid volunteers fed and watered the crews twice a day since they started work nearly five months ago.

Local businesses have also played a critical role in supporting BlazeAid with numerous acts of kindness and generosity.

BlazeAid has also given \$25,000 in fencing material and the volunteers staying at the Bunyip Showgrounds and Recreation Reserve substantially boosted the local economy.

Well, What can we say, there are actually no words that can accurately express our profound gratitude except a simple Thank you.....

Now, all this could've happened if it wasn't for two locals and we all know who they are. To attempt to thank and acknowledge those two locals with the praise and thanks they so richly deserve we decided to get the thoughts and feelings of BlazeAid founders the great Kevin and Rhonda Butler.

Kevin and Rhonda were very sorry couldn't join us this evening but they had this to say about our Sue and John Anderson.

The solid and dedicated leadership that local farmers John and Sue Anderson have given to the Bunyip community over the last 158 days is Extraordinary and way beyond what any community could ever expect.

To coordinate a BlazeAid camp for five months day in day out takes enormous organisational skills, strength of purpose but what John and Sue have done is both remarkable and extraordinary.

They have created BlazeAid history. They are the first local home grown BlazeAid Coordinators since Rhonda and I began BlazeAid in 2009.

Their's has been a wonderful achievement - they volunteered for the leadership when they had their own farm and family to look after. To say they were thrown into the deep end is an understatement.

Other BlazeAid Coordinators have several weeks training and tuition. John and Sue had metaphorically several minutes and had to learn on the run using their instinct, intelligence and common sense. How they never buckled under the pressure and workload is a testament to their grit and determination and character as people.

The work demanded seven days a week planning including preparing the combat ready trailers and coordinating volunteers. Then the farmers and land holders - those who had lost a little to those who lost almost everything including their homes.

There were cooking groups and roster boards to organise and overseeing the safety of every person

Then there was the workplace with multiple machines across many farms and different topography from dust and ashes to slime and mud.
They had to keep meticulous work and financial records that BlazeAid HQ require on a weekly basis for proper governance.

In the meantime Sue & John were juggling their own family lives, feeding their cows while proactively rebuilding the lives of others who just don't have the strength, spirit or resources to start over again.

For many many weeks John has given over his own tractor to drive posts. This was leadership by example thus allowing a small fleet of tractors to drive in posts simultaneously and on multiple properties.

And then perhaps the biggest challenge of all - not knowing what phone call or text message would come next or who would walk through the door.

They had to deal with the sometimes differing and challenging personalities a

differing and challenging personalities as well as the wonderful altruism of hundreds of volunteers both locally and interstate.

There are also local Council and State Government personnel wanting to help. But with BlazeAid the buck stopped with John and Sue and they were winners in every way!

What these two have done has not been going to a simple meeting or a working bee for one or two hours a week - like most of us do for our community - but up to 14 hour days, every day, seven days a week under pressure with the phone calls coming in up to three times a minute. They have contributed several hundreds of thousands of dollars of aid through donations, posts and the wire program and the deployment of equipment and volunteers to their neighbours.

A feat that very, very few other local couples anywhere have achieved for their community after a Natural Disaster.
Rhonda and I feel that the Bunyip community owe a massive and enduring debt of gratitude to John and Sue. When the BlazeAid camp winds down and the last of the volunteers and Combat ready trailers finally leave - they leave the place better than what it was.

The Bunyip community and all those families and friends will admire their new fences for many many years. Fences built on volunteer love by others from all over Australia at a time of dire need. We ask you please spare a thought or even a phone call of thanks to the couple who made it happen for Bunyip after the 2019 fires, John and Sue Anderson.

John and Sue - we all thank and salute you!
