Electoral Boundaries Commission releases proposed State electoral boundaries

Victoria's Electoral Boundaries Commission (EBC) today released proposed new State electoral boundaries for public comment.

The EBC has been conducting a redivision of electoral boundaries for both Houses of State Parliament to ensure that each vote in Victorian State elections has an equal value and that each elector is represented equally in the Victorian Parliament.

Electoral Commissioner Warwick Gately, one of the three members of the EBC, was pleased with the level of community engagement in the initial consultation period and issued a further call for Victorians to have their say.

'The EBC in December 2020 invited submissions from the public, and received 58 submissions – five from political parties, 15 from organisations and community groups and 38 from individuals,' Mr Gately said.

'Anyone interested in providing comment on the proposed boundaries should lodge a written submission before 5 pm Friday 30 July 2021.'

The proposed boundaries can be downloaded from the EBC website, ebc.vic.gov.au. Written submissions can also be lodged via the website.

The EBC will take account of suggestions and objections, and prepare final boundaries by late October 2021. These boundaries will take effect at the 2022 State election.

Applications now open for beautification grants

Applications are now open for Cardinia Shire Council's 2021-22 Beautification Grants program.

The program provides community groups and individuals with funds for landscape enhancement projects.

Community groups and individuals can apply for dollar-for-dollar grants of up to \$2,000 for projects to beautify local public open spaces across the Shire.

Priority is given to projects that: are driven by community groups, improve the appearance of green, public open space on Council owned or managed land are in areas used frequently by the public such parks, recreation reserves, town centres, and around Council buildings such as community centres and halls are in line with priorities identified in township strategies, landscape master plans, and other strategic Council documents.

Applications close 5pm Monday 6 September 2021.



August – Gardening Calendar for Temperate Australia

(http://deepgreenpermaculture.com/)

It's August, the weather is still cold and windy, but the end of winter is draws near, the days begin to grow noticeably longer and the change of season is not too far away.

This month is the last chance to complete the pruning of deciduous trees and shrubs, and for planting raspberries and brambleberries (such as blackberries and their hybrids).

It's now time to sow the first summer vegetable seeds. Where there's a danger of frost, sow seeds in trays and place them in a protected area such as a veranda, greenhouse, or indoors near a sunny window.

Towards the end of August, feed fruit trees with organic fertiliser, manure and compost. Also dig these into the soil when preparing new garden beds. The soil life will begin working on the organic plant food and will begin to slowly release its nutrients into the soil after a week or two, ready for the beginning of new spring growth in September. If fruit trees need a feed of potash, late autumn is also the time to do that too.

Things to Do This Month:

- Continue planting deciduous trees, shrubs, vines and cane fruits (and roses!). Wait till spring for planting citrus.
- Continue pruning deciduous fruit trees (not apricots, best to prune these in late autumn).
- Continue pruning deciduous shrubs (and roses too if you didn't prune them in July).
- Prune dead seed-heads, stems and branches on herbaceous perennial plants.
- Relocate any deciduous plants (trees, shrubs, vines) or herbaceous perennial plants growing in the wrong place in winter. (Evergreens can only be moved in autumn and early spring, where they have time to regrow roots – remember, they retain leaves in winter which transpire and lose water!).
- Apply organic fertiliser to fruit trees, so that the slowly released nutrients will become available when the new growth commences in spring.
- Spray peaches and nectarines to protect against leaf curl fungus. Use lime sulphur or a copper fungicide at the bud swell stage (just before the buds begin to open) but before pink bud stage or colour shows. It is too late to spray once flowering occurs.
- Feed pot grown shrubs and plants and refresh their potting mix by scraping off the top 2.5cm and replace it with fresh potting mix which has been mixed with slow release fertiliser. Top dressing with compost is also beneficial.

National Farm Safety Week

When you live in a regional area like Gippsland, we all know of someone touched by a tragic accident on a farm.

Some are deadly, others are life changing.

We know farm life is a risk, and it's too easy to become complacent because, after all, we've never had an accident before.

This week is National Farm Safety Week and it draws our attention to staying safe and alive on farms.

According to the Safer Farms 2020 Agricultural Injury and Fatality trend report, between January and June 2020, there were a total of 10 fatalities and 6 non-fatal injuries on farms in Victoria.

Victoria had the highest number of farm related fatalities in the Nation.

When working on a farm in Australia, quad bikes lead to 22% of fatal accidents and 35% of serious injuries amongst farmers. 89.3% of fatalities on farms are males, with over half of those men being over 50 years of age.

There have been too many lives cut short by these accidents. There have been too many families torn apart by avoidable mistakes.

We know of the reported accidents. What we don't know is how many unreported accidents are seen as a part of working-life on a farm.

Farmers are the lifeblood of our community. It is in all our interests that they survive and thrive.

Stay safe on our farms.

That's just as I see it.



Thermomix tips with Chelsea McGill



Hi everyone,

I hope you're all doing ok through the latest lockdown.

The way I stay sane through these crazy times is by baking. If these lockdowns continue, I'm not going to have any teeth left hahaha.

I love all the amazing things I can bake thanks to my Thermomix. But I think sourdough would have to be my favourite.

In the first lock down last year, I grew a sourdough starter and believe it or not,

I've kept it alive for 18 months now! A sourdough starter is a culture of yeasts and beneficial bacteria which naturally occur and are allowed to ferment over the

course of about 2 weeks. A portion of the starter, known as the levain, is mixed with bread flour to make sourdough. Growing a starter is a bit of a task, 14 days of separating and "feeding" the starter to get it going.

Now that it is established, it lives in the fridge and comes out for a "feed" once a week. It really is the strangest thing, but fresh baked sour dough is just divine.

If you'd like to make your own Sourdough starter, You can find the instructions on my instagram page Mixing it real or you can shoot me a message with your email address and I'll email over the instructions.

Some other things we've been baking this lock down are Rocky road, Vanilla slice, Caramel self saucing pudding, Soft cinnamon doughnuts and Puff pastry.

TALKIN' ... FISHIN' Spaced Out

Whether you're building or purchasing a fishing rod, consideration needs to be given to the amount of guides (runners) it has. The quantity and size of guides affects the action of the blank as well as how they pull the rod into its natural curve or shape, the weight of the guides used also affects the action and overall weight.

The general 'Rule of Thumb' is that the guides get smaller towards the tip of the rod and the spacing get closer together as well. The spacing is not 'Willy-Nilly', the formulas for this are closely guarded by rod builders and manufacturers of quality rods. The same spacing cannot apply to all blanks as they are all different in length, taper and action. Guessing the placement just won't do, but by sticking to the 'Rule of Thumb' you may come close, but if you're building on and expensive blank with quality components consult someone with experience in this field or it may cost you a lot of money and time.

The best advice I can give you is, if you're new to this game, try and rebuild an old rod first with new guides and spacing. Practise makes perfect!

Also take into account the frame style and inner ring quality of your guides. Start with the size and placement of the stripper guide (the largest) closet to the reel, allowing distance for the line to spool off the reel. Work up from there to the tip, choosing quantity and sizes as you go, and then temporarily masking tape in approximately the correct places. Formulate your spacing carefully before binding into positions. For overhead reels usually accommodate with a few extra guides so the line doesn't pass the blanks curve between the guides when under load, as the rod is used upside down. Apart from the choice of blank for your rod, the size and guide style and their placement would be the next most important decision you'll make that determines the rod's overall performance. Most of the off-the-rack rods of reputable company name brands have fortunately taken all this into consideration for you, making your choice a lot simpler. But as you'll see in any tackle shop they have a multitude of rods for you to choose from. So get some good advice or take someone with you that knows what to look for and take your time in buying the rod that most suits your purpose or style of fishing, unless you're building you own.

Hopefully you're now armed with better information, so Good Luck!

bag them up and drop them off instead of sending them to landfill.



Handy Eco-Hint for this month:

- Old print cartridges can be taken to Office Works for recycling
- Try to avoid buying pre-packaged fruit and vegetables....select your own items from the loose fruit and vegies bins instead...I have some mesh bags made from old net curtains that I use for this purpose.
 "Bananas don't need a plastic bag, they already have their own, the skin!"

Yarra Valley Community Power Hub: BRAG and Cardinia Shire supported Healesville CoRE's bid to receive \$428500 to set up a Community Power Hub.

They were successful and BRAG will be attending their steering committee which will start meeting early in August.

A condition of this funding is that the Community Power Hub must see a minimum of **2 renewable energy projects** through to completion within 12 months to July 2022.

The funding is being used to set up infrastructure that will support projects throughout the region by completing feasibility studies, assisting with fundraising efforts and providing any other administrative support necessary.

We are hopeful that YVCPHub will agree to support a project here in Bunyip.




