Council's excuse of "too wet" doesn't seem to gel when you consider that locals were able to achieve the result in record time. Tap into EPA's bigger air monitoring network and daily forecasts

EPA Victoria is approaching the bushfire season with its biggest ever network of air quality monitors across the state, twice daily forecasts on Twitter, and the *AirWatch* website offering live data 24 hours a day. With the recent addition of 49 new regionally based air quality sensors, EPA's Chief Environmental Scientist Mark Patrick Taylor says *AirWatch* now offers live air quality data from 90 stations in Melbourne, Geelong, the Latrobe Valley and broader Victoria, including these in Gippsland:

- Bairnsdale
- Lakes Entrance
- Leongatha
- Maffra
- Mallacoota
- Orbost
- Sale
- Warragul
- Wonthaggi

"Each summer carries with it the risk of bushfires and *AirWatch* is designed to equip Victorians to take action to protect their health," Prof Taylor said. "AirWatch tweets twice daily forecasts for each region, and offers actions you can take to reduce the effects of smoke on your home, your health and your family," he said. AirWatch is at <u>epa.vic.gov.au/for-community/airwatch</u> - search on your location or scroll down and click on the map. "The scientists in EPA's forecast team use a range of tools including weather forecasts, satellite imagery and smoke modelling, backed up by valuable on -the-ground information from the AirWatch network," Prof Taylor said. "During summer bushfires people want to know if there is going to be smoke, and how smoky it is going to be. They need current conditions, a reliable prediction for tomorrow, and professional advice on what do to protect themselves," he said. *AirWatch* offers Victorians hourly air quality data from each sensor in an easy-to-read format that shows levels of smoke and other fine particles. Air quality sensors in regional cities and country towns are based with local VICSES volunteer units and CFA volunteer brigades, and in some cases with educational institutions. "Twelve VICSES units around the state can also respond to bushfires and other incidents with Incident Air Quality Monitoring (IAM) gear that links with EPA's *AirWatch* network. The *AirWatch* website has links that advise on how to protect your health and the best type of indoor air filters to use to remove smoke, dust and other particulates from the air in your home.

In early 2021, Imagine Cardinia and Imagine Cardinia People's Panel was used to identify priorities for the Council Plan, Financial Plan and Council Budget.

In order to deliver on the community's priorities through the Council Plan, Council prepares 4 year rolling budgets which are adopted annually.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Councillor Jeff Springfield is encouraging the community to provide feedback. "Council is now taking this opportunity to check in on the priorities identified by you early in 2021," Cr Springfield said.

"These are reflected in the Council Plan and will inform the 2022/2023 annual budget.

White Ribbon Art Gallery now online

Local artists and community members have contributed works to the 2021 virtual White Ribbon Art Gallery to raise awareness of and commit to action to prevent men's violence against women. The gallery has been organised by the Cardinia Arts Society with funding from Council. It replaces the traditional White Ribbon Day March, which is unable to go ahead in 2021 due to COVID-19 restrictions.

The gallery is being hosted on Council's website - Connecting Cardinia. The theme of this year's gallery is 'Domestic Violence is Isolating', with the aim to bring attention to the impacts of family violence and victims' experiences. The gallery will be live for community viewing for White Ribbon Day, Friday 19 November.

Artwork will be displayed both online and at the Cardinia Cultural Centre in the main window, foyer area and external projection until December 5.

The gallery coincides with Respect Victoria's 16 Days of Activism campaign (25 November to 10 December). The 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence is a global initiative designed to galvanise individuals, communities and organisations to address gender inequalities, gender-based violence and take action to prevent violence before it starts.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Cr Jeff Springfield said the gallery provides community members with an opportunity to come together and raise awareness of the implications of men's violence against women.

"There is no excuse for violence against women, and we all have a responsibility to stand up and speak out against behaviours that contribute to gendered violence, and to support women affected by it," Cr Springfield said.

"Men's violence against women is a very real and on ongoing epidemic in Australia, including Cardinia Shire, and unfortunately the COVID pandemic has made the situation worse.

"I encourage community members to visit this year's online and physical art galleries, which provides a platform for those who have experienced violence to tell their story, and for others to discuss how we can all make change and commit to action to end men's violence against women." Prolonged power outage payments

The Victorian Government is providing a Prolonged Power Outage Payment (PPOP) of \$1,680 per week, per household, for up to three weeks to support eligible households affected by the 29 October storm. This payment will help families buy the basics and find alternative accommodation to get through this difficult period.

You are eligible for this payment if:

• You have a residential electricity account and fall within AusNet Services' or United Energy's distribution area

• You were without power as at 12.01am Friday 5 November, due to the 29 October storm. The payment will be administered by AusNet Services and United Energy and is co-funded under the Commonwealth State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements. AusNet Services and United Energy contacted impacted residents on Monday, 8 November with details on how to apply for the payment.

If you are eligible for this payment and have not been contacted yet please contact AusNet Services on 13 17 99 or United Energy on 1300 131 689, or contact Council's recovery team on 1300 787 624 for support.

Burn off restrictions eased

Cardinia Shire Council has temporarily eased burn off restrictions for residents who are allowed to burn off for fire prevention purposes. From now until the Fire Danger Period is declared, open air burning is allowed without a permit from Monday to Saturday, provided that: you live in the Cardinia Shire Council Bushfire Prone Area (BPA) the burn off is for fire prevention and fire fuel reduction purposes, Council's burn off requirements are followed at all times & your burn off is registered with the CFA. If your property is 20 hectares or less in size you must have: no more than 1 open air fire at once a fire break of 3 metres a maximum pile size that is not greater than 2 metres in any dimension (eg. 2 metres long or 2 metres wide or 2 metres high). If your property is greater than 20 hectares in size you must have: no more than 3 open air fires at once

a fire break of 6 metres

a maximum pile size that is not greater than 4 metres in any dimension (eg. 4 metres long or 4 metres wide or 4 metres high).

The easing of restrictions aims to help landowners reduce fire fuel in the lead up to the Fire Danger Period.

Before you burn off, please consider using one of these methods to reduce your fuel load:

the kerbside green waste bin collection

hard and bundled green waste collection

composting or mulching (we offer waste reduction rebates)

taking green waste to a local tip, transfer station or waste facility

We also encourage residents to familiarise themselves with the CFA's guide to safely burning off and to talk to their neighbours before burning off.

If you decide to burn off this year, you must follow all the rules:

You cannot burn off on Total Fire Ban or smog alert days. To check if it's a Total Fire Ban day, go to the CFA website. To check if it's a smog alert day, check EPA AirWatch

Fires must be supervised. A person 18 years or over with the means and ability to put the fire out must be present for the whole time the fire is alight.

The purpose of the fire must be to reduce fuel on your property. It cannot be lit for commercial or industrial purposes.

You can only burn dry vegetation, not green vegetation. Hard rubbish, household waste, flammable liquids or commercial or industrial waste is strictly not allowed to be burnt.

Fires must not cause risk to other properties.

Smoke from the fire cannot reduce visibility on any roads.

Fires must not cause problems for other people. It must not be unreasonably offensive or a nuisance to another person – particularly from the smoke it creates.

You need to put the fire out if an authorised person tells you to. Fires must be immediately put out if a member of an emergency service or Council officer directs you to do this.

WGPA building a resilient community after the fires

After 300 primary producers were severely impacted by the Bunyip Complex bushfires in March 2019, several passionate volunteers formed The West Gippsland Progress Association Inc. (WGPA). WGPA is now at the forefront of the community's long-term economic recovery and resilience effort. WGPA has partnered with Cardinia Shire Council's Recovery team to secure funding to start several initiatives: Drive farmer collaborations through small business and farmer mentoring to encourage sharing of industry knowledge and experience.

Develop a regenerative agriculture group to determine the best strategy to support local farming and sustainable food systems. Delivery of 'Food and Tourism' community-led workshops to better understand the need to develop a food and tourism strategy for the West Gippsland area.

• Development of a West Gippsland Food and Tourism Strategy and mini destination marketing plan.

Bunyip and Longwarry public artwork

EPA asks how's your dairy effluent pump?

As dairy farmers empty their effluent ponds as part of annual spring maintenance, EPA says it's time for them to pay special attention to pumps and pipes.

EPA Gippsland Regional Manager Zac Dornom says EPA officers around the state find too many leaky pipes and broken sump pumps during farm inspections.

"It's a matter of common sense and one of the landholder's responsibilities under the *Environment Protection Act* that dairy effluent stays on the farm and out of channels, creeks and rivers. The moment it hits the water, this valuable fertiliser becomes a damaging pollutant," Mr Dornom said.

"Overflowing dairy effluent sends nutrients into waterways, reducing oxygen levels, killing aquatic life, encouraging toxic algae and potentially spreading disease," he said.

"Dairy farmers can stop effluent ponds from overflowing by irrigating the liquid component to pasture when the weather is right, de-sludging ponds, clearing vegetation from tops of ponds and keeping pumps and pipes in good working order."

"Put to sensible use as a fertiliser, dairy effluent can increase pasture production so good effluent management is a win for the farm as a business and for the environment."

Problems with dairy effluent management are too common. EPA officers who inspected 40 Gippsland dairy farms for effluent runoff in 2020/21, issued 13 remedial notices and two fines, and provided compliance advice on 11 farms.

EPA remedial notices are legally enforceable instructions requiring maintenance or repairs to solve pollution problems by a set deadline, and the fine for non-compliance can be more than \$8,000.

"It's not just about your responsibility under the law. You won't be doing your neighbours any favours if you set off an algal bloom in the water they are using for stock and irrigation," Mr Dornom said.

EPA officers can follow an effluent spill back to its source. They will also monitor progress on the work required by any remedial notice to make sure the job is done, to protect the local environment and neighbouring farms.

"EPA will issue fines for non-compliance where necessary, but also supports farmers by providing advice and technical support. It's every Victorian's responsibility under the General Environmental Duty to take reasonable measures to prevent pollution wherever possible," Mr Dornom said.

In providing advice and technical support, EPA works alongside Agriculture Victoria and Dairy Australia to provide practical advice and resources.

Agriculture Victoria's Dairy Extension Officers can provide a free effluent use planning service and a health check of current effluent systems, including technical advice on the best use of the valuable nutrients, and review of your pond storage capacity based on cow numbers and water use in the dairy and rainfall. If a dairy farm requires significant upgrades of their effluent system or a new infrastructure development like a new dairy, pond or feedpad is proposed, Agriculture Victoria can provide technical planning advice as well as refer farmers to an accredited Effluent System Designer, who has completed the Agriculture Victoria-Dairy Australia national designers course and has access to a range of toolkits. Did you know?

Japanese engineer and industrialist, and founder of Honda Motor Co., Ltd., Sōichirō Honda was born in Hamamatsu, Shizuoka, Japan in 1906. At 15, without any formal education, Honda left home and headed to Tokyo to look for work. He obtained an apprenticeship at a garage in 1922, and after some hesitation over his employment, he stayed for six years, working as a car mechanic before returning home to start his own auto repair business in 1928 at the age of 22. In 1937 Honda began producing piston rings for small engines which lead to manufacturing small engines to be used in motorcycles, and then in 1948 he started producing complete motorcycles as president of the Honda Motor Company. Honda turned the company into a billion-dollar multinational that produced the best-selling motorcycles out-selling Triumph and Harley-Davidson in their respective home markets. In 1959 Honda Motorcycles opened its first dealership in the United States. Honda remained president until his retirement in 1973, stayed on as director, and was appointed "supreme adviser" in 1983. His legendary status was such that People magazine placed him on their "25 Most Intriguing People of the Year" list for 1980, dubbing him "the Japanese Henry Ford."

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Mural Graces Entrance To Bunyip

Well who would of thought throughout Covid 19 lockdowns we could have achieved this result; a beautiful Mural for Bunyip but here it is, right there on the IGA West wall to stay, for all to enjoy. An idea was born from seeing a cousins water tank mural, Cherie and I were made aware of a very gifted artist, Simon from Simon White Art is a very talented chap, we were very fortunate that he was kind enough to offer his services to our town, he has been extremely busy creating his magical murals throughout the country side. Around the early 1900's Pearson and co timber yard, iron monger, seed and grain store was built on Pearson street the mural is based on the 1905 picture found in Denise Nests, 1990 Call of the Bunyip book The timber yard, grain and ironmonger was a much needed business for Bunyip and surrounding towns, Pots, pans, kettles, timber for houses, sheds and buildings, fences, rain and seeds for produce, it was all there at Pearson and Co The Pearson family were early settlers of Tonimbuk. Charles Pearson was a carpenter by trade, around 1893 he set up an orchard on 320 acres of land, this property was later know as Ern Nash's orchard, the house that can be see there now was built in 1896 after the original house burnt down in 1894. It was likely that the Pearson family lived in the first house for only about a year and then lived in a tent or hut for a year waiting for the new house to be built

Charles and Blanche Pearson were both born in 1863, they came to Tonimbuk in 1893 with 4 small children Charles Stewart 1886, Ida Ellen 1887(married Henry Gordon Virtue 1915), Frederick Francis 1889, Herbert George 1891 (married Ivy Towt 1914,) were all born in Melbourne, 2 more children were born at Bunyip, Stanley Percy 1903 and Arthur Vincent 1907 Frederick was killed at Gallipoli in World War 1, he died like many others on 25th April 1915 A memorial notice in the Age Newspaper of April 1917 recorded this <u>Anzac hero's</u> In fond memory of Private Frederick Francis Pearson who was killed on Gallipoli 25th April 1915 Second son of Charles and Blanche Pearson age 26 years I cannot Say, I will not say, That he is dead, he is just away. It is fitting that the mural was placed on the west wall of IGA facing Pearson street and the old site. After 1926 the Pearson family moved back to Melbourne. Pearson and Co was eventually owned by Permewan Wright and more currently it was known as Bunyip Home Timber and Hardware. At the moment sadly the buildings have gone the site is now home to the Gippsland Line upgrade workers. Thank goodness there are ways we can save our history. The Bunyip Mural project was totally funded by the Community. Organisers Cherie Johnson and Davina Veenstra from the Bunyip Social Hub thank all who have supported and contributed to this project.

TALKIN'FISHIN' without handles

The first memories I have of fishing as a kid was no rods, no reels, just a Coles handline of 20lb line wrapped around a large cork rigged with a bean sinker and a long shank generic hook, that I'd saved my pocket money for to buy new each year for our annual holidays.

Floats came next that I could make myself at home out of local wine corks I could scrounge, strictly Huckleberry Finn and Tom Sawyer style of fishing. The handcasters of old were timber, usually cedar for its weight, and wood turned to a desired or tried and tested shape. An upright back edge and prominent front lip tapered to allow line to flow over easily but still retaining it on the spool. The design hasn't altered much over the decades only the materials they were made from, Bakelite to plastic and fibreglass, now CNC or even print your own design on a 3D printer. The design came into its own later by incorporating the attributes of the centre-pin reel with handles and of the handcaster profile giving all the advantages of both in one, in the form of 'The Sidecast' reel.

Some simple other homemade but effective designs were a fruit tin with a short handle fitted inside, a wooden batten, even a beer bottle was known to be used (after emptying the tasty contents) all effective casting tools using the helicopter and hurl method. A sight to behold in the hands of an old fisher at it. All good and does the job ok, but tedious in the winding in and prone to line twisting. Even after all these years of fishing with some of the most expensive and technically advanced gear, there is something primal and yet romantic about fishing with just a handline. The complete lack of Hi-tech with only the sense of touch connecting your fingertips with the fish brings me or maybe you right back to a childhood.

An old work colleague of mine had all the gear and a large offshore boat, but still, with all the rods he had set out the back, he found it very soothing to sling a line on a large handcaster over the side filled with 50lb line and a light leader and rig, he hauled in flathead one after another but piling up the heavy line on the boat's deck had rules of, never let the ends meet or crossover each other, surprisingly, no tangles. Handlines can still be fun, and can pack hidden away for a sneaky trip away.
