Award Benefits Community \$10,000 - Bunyip Market "Picnic Garden" Project By Roman Kulkewycz

The Bunyip Pharmacy was one of eight pharmacies in Australia to win the prestigious Arrotex Pharmaceuticals Community Pharmacy Of The Year Award which was announced at a gala dinner held on Hayman Island on the 15th of November.

Approximately 1200 pharmacies from Australia registered for this competition which required each participant to submit a video and digital submissions demonstrating customer engagement within the community. Each competing pharmacy displayed posters with a Q.R. code for customers to scan an in store vote. For each customer who voted, the

pharmacy received 5 points. Local Bunyip businesses also supported the pharmacy by displaying how to vote posters in their windows. There was also encouragement on social media and pamphlet distribution asking for people to vote.

Bunyip Pharmacist Dinesh Solanki and Retail Manager Belinda Brasier managed the project with over 140 submissions each demonstrating community engagement. The competition began in April and concluded in August. Each person who voted also nominated a community initiative, a local not for profit organisation to receive a \$10,000 Grant. The majority of voters nominated the Bunyip & District Community Market "Picnic Garden" project.



Researchers are seeking input from Cardinia Shire residents on Bushfire Maps

RMIT University is seeking help from residents of Bunyip, Maryknoll and Gembrook who were affected by the 2019-2020 fires. Residents are being asked to participate in an interview that will help to improve the design and communication of future bushfire maps. Dr. Erica Kuligowski, Senior Research Fellow and interview study lead at RMIT University said that the goal of this study is to interview residents about how they use, understand and take action in response to existing bushfire maps. These maps can display warnings and even fire spread predictions via websites, apps or public meetings, and it is important for these maps to be consistently designed and communicated to meet the needs of residents across Australia.

Interviews with residents are being held in-person until 17 Dec 2022 at 3 locations: Bunyip CFA, Gembrook CFA and Maryknoll Hall. They can also be held online. Ideally, an interview would last one hour and residents will be asked about the following topics: what information they received and what they did in response to the recent bushfire, what role (if any) maps played in their response, and their thoughts about two newly developed maps that will be shown during the interview. No experience with bushfire maps or maps in general is needed to participate in this study.

"Studying how bushfire maps are received and understood by residents is extremely important," said Dr. Kuligowski. "Through this type of research, we can develop guidance for those who design and communicate bushfire maps so that future maps, including fire spread prediction maps, can be better received and understood by the people who need them the most."

The project is funded by Natural Hazards Research Australia, with partners from RMIT University, Country Fire Authority, Emergency Management Victoria, Queensland University of Technology, Deakin University and Swinburne University.

Reliving Garfield Plane Crash 65 Years Ago.

The front page of the Melbourne Sun newspaper dated Saturday 18th Jan, 1958

As a 15 year old pimply faced RAAF Air Cadet, Ken Sumsion loved everything about aeroplanes. His opportunity to experience a flight came on the 17th of January, 1958. Little did he realise at the time, but that flight would nearly cost him his life when halfway through the journey, engine failure forced the plane to crash land in a paddock in Garfield South.

He had always desired to return to that fateful place, to see again where all the drama unfolded, but over the years was unable to pinpoint the exact location. With the help of locals, Mary White, Colin Teese and Heather Arnold, I was able to find it after Ken wrote to the Editor of the Bunyip Newsletter asking for assistance. In February 2017, Ken, Mary White, Colin Teese and myself visited this paddock. Nearly 60 years on, this became a very

Ken.....

The morning of Friday the 17th of January, 1958 began with clear blue skies and a blistering sun with the temperature rising quickly to peak at 41 degrees by lunch time. Fifteen year old Ken Sumsion was one of 25 excited RAAF Air Training Corps Cadets, a Reserve instructor, plus a military photographer, a civilian scientist and two pilots marched on the hot surface of the tarmac and boarded the ARDU Dakota A65-99 at the RAAF Base at Laverton for an air experience flight to the RAAF East Sale Base and back.

Throughout the flight Ken was seated on the starboard (right) side of the fuselage near the wing. "Right from take - off I was looking through the window at everything possible when suddenly I noticed oil spewing out of the starboard engine", soon this became quite a stream, then I saw the propeller stop, re- Mary White and Colin Teese from start, stop, restart and finally stop altogether". once that propeller stopped, everyone became scared and concerned". "I told them that I had seen oil coming from the port engine as well. Soon the pilot's voice came over the intercom and we were advised that we would be turning around and heading back towards Moorabbin Airport. I remember flying very low over a building that I thought was the Bunyip Post Office and I would think leaving a trail of oil. However returning to Moorabbin soon became out of the guestion.

Not long after turning back, a cadet who had been up the front with the flight crew came out and in a calm manner announced to everybody that we were about to make an emergency forced landing and for everyone to fasten their seat belts. Suddenly, to my horror I discovered that my seat belt had the buckle missing! All I could do was to hang on grimly to the conduit armrest next to my seat. There was no sign of panic or distress at any stage; it was all happening so very fast. However looking down at my sweaty hands, I can vividly remember seeing that my knuckles had turned a whiter shade of pale.

The Dakota glided towards the ground smoothly and silently. For a moment time stood still and we were in a time bubble flying in slow motion. Contact with the tops of the Cypress trees was slight and didn't bother me. Contact with the ground, wheels up was smooth too.

The plane slid along the ground on its belly for about 500 metres, there was a bit of clattering as we demolished a post and wire fence. I saw bits of post and wire whizz past the window. Fortunately we missed objects that could have turned this situation into a disaster - the road, the ditch, the pine trees, the house, the concrete water tower and the 22 kilovolt power lines. Upon coming to a halt we all experienced an eerie feeling as the dust blew away, it became quiet and peaceful. It's as if we were in a dream. Fortunately nobody was injured. I remember that we were marched out of that aircraft in a military, orderly fashion – left right, left right.

My most memorable moment following the crash is of the ladies who suddenly appeared as if by magic out of nowhere with food and drinks for everybody. They were so kind, comforting and efficient and it was as if it were all a routine part of their days activities. As I got older the yearning to kick over the traces had increased. I made a start in 1999 by buying some newspapers reporting the crash and scratching around on the Internet. I have the relevant "SUN" front page framed in my workroom. I played a plate event at Garfield Golf Club some 15 years ago and afterwards took a drive and thought that I may have found the paddock in question. I was a bit occupied running a small business back then and didn't pursue the matter any further.

Now I live at Emerald and since our Golf Club there has closed down. I have joined the Garfield Gold Club and have reconnected with the town that I became "accidentality" acquainted with some sixty years ago.

Garfield resident Colin Teese remembers that as a lad when he heard about this incident, he rode his bike out to "have a look "at the wreckage.

Council's \$3M Better Local Roads renewal program announced

Cardinia Shire Council is delivering 'Better Local Roads' and last night endorsed its 2022-23 road renewal program for works across 54 roads in 18 townships.

Council will invest \$3.122 million towards resurfacing and rehabilitating local council roads as part of its \$17.392 million commitment to upgrade, improve and maintain the shire's road network in 2022-2023.

Rehabilitation works involve rebuilding the road pavement along sections of road. Resurfacing works are proactive works to help prevent water damage to the road and help prolong the life of the road.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Councillor Tammy Radford said, "We have heard loud and clear from our community that improving our local roads is important to them. That's why council is prioritising improving road conditions, safety, and connectivity on our existing our road network."

Council currently manages an extensive 1,579 kilometre sealed and unsealed road network, which presents many challenges across each township and a recent report outlines how weather has been council's greatest challenge.

Sustained wet weather has caused defects to increase by 58% on sealed roads and 36% on unsealed roads during winter compared to the normal peak. More than 1,100 road defects were recorded over the 3-month period, resulting in significant maintenance demand.

"Unfortunately, the extreme and consistent wet weather we've seen over recent months has not only contributed to an increase in road issues within the shire, but it's also impacted our crews' ability to complete permanent repairs."

In response to the increased workload, council has:

- deployed additional sealed road maintenance trucks,
- added 2 maintenance trucks,
- reassigned staff to both sealed and unsealed road repairs
- employed contractors to complete drainage work
- employed an additional contractor grader
- hired and retained additional plant to meet functional need
- worked additional hours/days to support the community, and
- prioritised fixing defects on sealed roads to keep the shire moving.

Despite the significant wet weather, crews maintained an average response of 4 business days for correction of sealed road defects and response times within the requirements outlined in the Road Management Plan.

"We're making improvements and have increased our maintenance works to respond to recent weather and road issues, but we know there's still more work to be done and we'll continue to work closely with the state to improve our community's overall road network," Mayor Radford said.

Preparing your property for Fire Season

Preparing for the fire season is a collective responsibility, and we all have our part to play. This year due to above average rainfall, we will see increased grass growth, which will dry off quickly in warmer weather. Grassfire risk can be managed by everyone in our shire. Grassfires can start and spread quickly and can be very dangerous.

The taller and drier the grass, the more intensely it will burn.

The shorter the grass, the lower the flame height and the easier the fire will be to control.

Short grass (under 10cm) is a much lower risk.

In the lead up to fire season, all property owners and occupiers should prepare their properties for bushfire, even if their property is not immediately next to bushland.

At a minimum you should:

- Slash all grass and weeds on your block so they are less than 10 centimetres high. Make sure you maintain this length during the fire danger period.
- Clear fallen branches and dead vegetation from around your property.
- Clean up fine fuels such as leaves, twigs and long grass and remove any rubbish.
- Larger rural and agricultural properties need to create a firebreak at least 10 metres wide along external fences by slashing grass and weeds to less than 10 centimetres.
- Create separation between vegetation and buildings and fences by mowing and pruning vegetation.

Cardinia Shire Council undertakes an annual Fire Hazard Inspection Program which commences in the lead up to the fire season and comprises approximately 4,000 privately owned properties across the Shire. This program follows a risk-based approach which acknowledges that fire risk reduction is a shared responsibility for all residents in Cardinia Shire. The Fire Hazard Inspection Program is primarily focussed throughout the Fire Danger Period, however Fire Prevention Notices may be issues by an authorised officer year-round.

When a property has been identified as posing a fire hazard, a Fire Prevention Notice may be issued by a Fire Prevention Officer. The Country Fire Authority Act 1958 and Fire Rescue Victoria Act 1958 authorises Municipal Fire Prevention Officers to issue Fire Prevention Notices on owners or occupiers of private properties to complete fire management works.

If you receive a Fire Prevention Notice this means that a Fire Prevention Officer has inspected your property and determined it poses a fire hazard. If you do not comply with the notice, **you may be fined up to \$1,817**, and/or you may need to cover the cost of contractor hire to remove fire hazards, plus administration costs. Legal action may still proceed. Each property is considered individually for its level of risk, but there are key things Fire Prevention Officers look for when inspecting a property:

Long, dry grass

Fallen and dead vegetation

Weeds contributing to a high fuel load

Vegetation close to neighbouring assets.

Local Assists In Floods

Forty four year old Tony Ward, a fire fighter from the Bunyip Fire Brigade and an accredited Road Rescue specialist from the Pakenham Road Rescue Unit represented the Nar Nar Goon Fire Brigade recently when he was chosen to spend 3 days on stand by for road accident rescues in the Victorian floods.

With over twenty two years experience as a firefighter and twenty of those years as an accredited road rescue specialist, the mild mannered, quietly spoken Tony Ward had the necessary qualifications to be involved in this mission.

"We were on standby to cover the fire districts 20, 22 and 23 for road accident rescues for the flooded districts, which included industrial and farm accidents allowing us to fly in a helicopter to scenes that road crews may not be able to reach because of the floods. We carried a small cache of equipment, smaller to what we normally would on a rescue truck, but enough to do the job. To be eligible for helicopter rescue, an accredited member needs to weigh under 100 kgs in full turnout gear"

On arrival, Tony was sent for an afternoon of of training at Mangalore Kestrel Helicopters, then drove to the Bendigo Base Airfield."

I asked Tony what stood out most for him during his time *helicopter*. there "Just the enormity of the airbase operations. There

was approximately nine helicopters the for a range of other duties, people transport, surveying the flooded areas etc.

We did a familiarisation flight of approximately 30 minutes the first afternoon, and the third day we flew to Cohuna to meet with the local Rescue brigade, Police and Ambulance to fill them in on who we are and what we carry on board.

I think it shows great initiative and thought by Deputy Chief Officer Rick Owen (Special response officer.) to organise such a complex operation to look after the public."



December - Gardening Calendar by Angelo Eliades

December is the first month of summer, and with the warmer weather gardens explode into life - lush, abundant and awesome to behold. With the days getting longer as we progress towards the longest day of the year, the summer solstice, there's more time to enjoy the garden and the great outdoors!

During this time, temperatures can reach extremes as the days heat up, and gardens can get quite dry, so keeping up with the watering is important. Pests will also emerge with the warmer weather so keep an eye out for them!

'Chop & Drop' any broad beans or peas after harvesting, 'chop' the tops at ground level, and 'drop' on top of the soil as mulch, leave the roots in the ground to return any nitrogen in the root nodules to the soil

As strange as it may seem, early summer is the time to sow some winter brassicas such as broccoli, brussels sprouts, cauliflower and swedes, so they can be harvested in winter.
