



If you live next to grassland and a grassfire starts, walk at least two streets back from the fire.

If you live two or three streets away from grassland and a grassfire starts, stay where you are – grassfires are unlikely to spread into built up areas.

Never drive if you can see smoke or fire. Thick smoke will make it hard to see and traffic jams and accidents are likely.

Keep the roads clear for the emergency services.

Hydrocephalus Fundraiser Night

On the evening of Saturday February 5th, lona's population grew by about 400 as people gathered from near and far to support the Hydrocephalus Support Association.. Evie, who is two and a half years old, was born with Hydrocephalus, a condition which causes a build-up of fluid within the brain, causing swelling and pressure on the brain.. Evie's Mum and Dad, Jess and Travis Kitchin, came up with the idea to host a fundraiser night at the Iona Cricket Club. The night raised over \$23,000.00. This is Jess' summary of the night:. The night included live music, a BBQ dinner, silent auctions and raffles to keep the adults entertained. There was plenty to amuse the kids as well, including pony rides, face painting, showbags and cookie decorating. Thank you to Amanda from "Fizzy Face Children's Entertainment" for staying the entire night painting faces and balloon twisting and to Kierah from "Sweetly Grazed" for the amazing cookie decorating station. Once the night moved onto the real auctions for the night it was time for the "big kids" to have some fun and shave some hair! We could never have predicted just how fun it was and just how much money we were about to make! Local cattle auctioneer Ryan Bajada absolutely nailed it and had the crowd in the palm of his hands.. First to go was lona Cricket Club President, Michael Neilson's, beloved beard that he had been growing since April 2016, with the highest bid of \$1,200 going to Jayson Barwick who is a member of the club and said he had every intention of winning that auction to shave his President's beard! Michael also had quite a few other donations from family and friends which makes his beard shaving total around \$2,000!

Then it was Evie's Dad's turn. Travis had been growing the most "interesting" dreadlock mullet for the last 18 months that had certainly sparked a conversation or two in that time. There really was nothing pretty about it but it really got everyone talking about it and excited for the day that it would finally come off and raise some money. We made a rule that whoever won and got to cut the dreads, could make it into whatever hairstyle they want, and Travis had to keep it for the whole week and even play cricket that next weekend with it. Bajada opened the bidding and within the first 2 bids it was already up to \$1,000. People were throwing their hands up all over the crowd which made for a very fun and competitive auction. Once the bidding had hit \$3,500 it was down to 2 bidders, the funniest part about these two bidders was the fact that it was husband and wife bidding against each other! The two had had the conversation about how high they were willing to go and once Tanya Hilder had realised that no one else was bidding against her husband anymore, she took it upon herself to bump him up just that little bit more! Andrew Hilder from Nedz Shedz ended up winning the auction with a whopping total of \$4,150! I think it's pretty clear to say that he did not disappoint with the hairstyle he left Travis with!

We'd like to give a huge shootout to all of the businesses that donated towards our raffles and silent auctions. All of the prizes donated had a combined retail amount of around \$15,000! We still had businesses coming in on the night giving us more items to raffle and auction off, it was just incredible. We'd also like to give a special mention to the businesses who sponsored our night and are the reason it could go ahead in the first place. Bunyip IGA alongside Community Bank Lang Lang sponsored all of the food for the BBQ, which meant that 100% of money made from that went straight to the foundation. Liberty Equipment Hire (Narre Warren) not only donated 2 digital VMS boards, they also brought down portable toilets and light towers, plus bollards & tape to assist with parking. Bunyip CFA donated and set up their big marquee for us, Tynong CFA provided all the tables and chairs we needed to set up our raffles & silent auctions. Armour's Apples lent us their truck for the music stage and Hateley's Coolroom Hire generously donated a portable Coolroom for us. Musicians Meg Doherty & Tegan Blackstock couldn't have been more perfect. Unfortunately the girls from Seventh Winter Music had to pull the pin last minute, but we can't thank them enough for still coming and

setting up their whole PA system at the start of the night for the other music artists to use. Finally, the biggest and most important thank you goes to the entire Iona Cricket Club for all of your support since the day we arrived at the club, but especially for everything you all did on Saturday night and the lead up to. The club worked so hard right alongside us to make it the most perfect evening. From cooking the BBQ, scribbling on raffle tickets, directing car parking and everything in between. We literally could not have done it without you all. We feel so privileged and are so proud to be part of such an amazing family club.

We've had so many from the Cricket Club say to us that we should definitely make this an annual event which is something we are certainly considering! It costs the Hydrocephalus Support Association \$163k per year to keep the registry running, and although the government has funded the last 2 years, unfortunately the funding is not recurrent. We are so blown away by the interest of so many businesses that we had not even thought of approaching this year, already so keen to jump on board for next year's event, if we decide to do it again. I mean this year was amazing, but I can only imagine how epic it would be next year seeing how successful this one was. Lastly, on behalf of my husband Travis and I, we would love to thank the community for all of your support in making this fundraiser in our daughters honour, so successful. Because of you all we will have a much better chance at making her much easier in the future.

Construction has kicked off for the new youth centre in Pakenham.

Cardinia Shire Council Mayor Councillor Jeff Springfield joined Bass MP Jordan Crugnale and La Trobe MP Jason Wood for a sod turn at the site this afternoon. Cardinia Youth Hub will offer programs and services for young people aged 12 to 24, with dedicated training/class rooms, counselling rooms, a program/group room, hang out space, a shower and laundry facility, recording booth, computers with internet access and a roof-top recreation space.

Services and programs will support young people to build resilience, re-engage in education, training and work opportunities, improve relationships, and provide timely access to expert specialist services. Cardinia Shire Council Mayor Councillor Jeff Springfield said Cardinia Youth Hub would support the future needs of our local young people.

"The move to construct this new, purpose-built youth centre is what our community has been asking for," Cr Springfield said. "We're a fast-growing community, and this is just one example of the continued collaborative efforts we have with both the Victorian Government and Australian Government to continue to improve local facilities for our communities here in the shire."

Henty Ward Councillor Carol Ryan said the location was ideal for our young people as it was close to public transport and local skate parks and shopping areas. "It's important we plan for the future and in particular for the future of our young people. The current youth centre is an absolutely fantastic service but it's bursting at the seams! We can't wait to have the new centre available for our young people," she said. Cardinia Shire Council has committed \$1.8 million towards this project. The Victorian Government has committed \$3 million from the Growing Suburbs Fund and the Australian Government has put forward \$1.5 million as part of the Community Health and Hospitals Program.

State Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale says Cardinia Youth Hub represents the very best in our community and I am so pleased that Growing Suburbs Fund has helped this project become a reality.

"This is what happens when all three levels of government work together to support and service our young people. "This youth hub will be a place for our young people to meet, learn, feel safe and to gain educational and employment support. "If our young people have the support and opportunities they deserve, they grow up confident, with a good sense of self, are healthy and active citizens - this enriches us all. This is a social investment and our youth and their families are so worth it."

Federal Member for La Trobe Jason Wood welcomed the sod turning saying the sod turning was a huge win for the community. "As one of the fastest growing regions in the country, the south east of Melbourne demands better support services. "The \$1.5 million in funding we secured on behalf of the Morrison Government will ensure that young people receive support in re-engaging with education, upskilling and socialising in a safe environment." Cardinia Youth Hub will be located on a Council-owned parcel of land on James Street in Pakenham and is anticipated to open in January 2023.

Have your say on Cardinia Shire's new Climate Change Adaptation Strategy.

The Climate Change Adaptation Strategy is now open for public comment and residents are encouraged to jump online and have their say on the new strategy. In September of 2019, a climate emergency was declared across Cardinia Shire Council. Climate change-induced natural hazards are increasing both in magnitude and frequency, which is having adverse effects on our ecosystems, human health and economy. Council is dedicated to supporting the community adapt to these climate change challenges.

The Climate Change Adaptation Strategy will provide the guiding pathways to reduce the community's vulnerability to adverse climate events and promote the resilience of social, ecological and economic systems. Adaptation planning will embed adaptive measures into council operations and processes, as well as recommend actions for the community to reduce their vulnerability to the impacts of climate change.

The development of the Climate Change Adaptation Strategy will bring together community and Council stakeholders to raise climate concerns and identify adaptation processes that will aim to protect our natural and built environment into the future for generations to come. Cardinia Shire Mayor Councillor Jeff Springfield is encouraging the community to provide their input into this strategy. "We are gathering feedback on the 14 community-facing actions in the Climate Change Adaptation Strategy to enable Council to prioritise the factors that affect our people the most," Cr Springfield said. "We want to know how climate change affects you as a Cardinia Shire resident. Which climate-related hazards concern you the most? What are your biggest concerns about the impacts of climate change? Tell us what matters most to you, so that together we can create a more sustainable future for Cardinia Shire."

Council's free waste drop-off events are back for 2022!

Cardinia Shire Council's free green waste drop-off events are back for 2022.

Council's green waste drop-off events are a free service accepting residential amounts of green waste including flowers, garden prunings, grass clippings, leaves, tree branches, weeds and trunks (up to 30 centimetres wide and 1 metre long). Residents must present photo ID as proof of residence within Cardinia Shire to access the free service. Waste will only be accepted from residential vehicles and trailers; commercial business operators cannot use this service.

Across the state there has been an increase in pollution reports to EPA, but particularly in noise complaints from 2019-2020 to 2020-2021. The new EPA Act gives councils new powers and EPA is able to assist people navigate their way to find the right authority to take their issue to. See the tables below for local statistics. Regards.

With more people working from home, Environment Protection Authority Victoria has seen a doubling of reports about noise pollution in the 2020-2021.

Noise report data collected between July 2021 and January 2022 show the trend is continuing with around 3,500 noise pollution reports received at EPA's Contact Centre in that period.

"The most common types of noise complaints are about residential and industrial noise," said EPA CEO Lee Miezis.

"In 2020-2021, 5,404 of the total 20,000 pollution reports we received were about noise, more than twice as many as the year prior, so people are hearing more noise when they would normally be at work and they're calling it in.

"The new Environment Protection Act, introduced in July 2021, give councils more powers to regulate residential noise and they can now appoint noise enforcement officers with power to make directions or even start court proceedings.

"EPA has more direct involvement in noise from commercial premises where machinery or work practices might be causing issues. Complaints about vehicle noise to EPA aren't as common, but we work with police if the offending vehicle is on the road and with council if it is a residential driveway.

"We recognise that people don't always know where to go to get help, so as we always say, call 1300 EPA VIC (1300 372 842) and we can at least help you navigate through to the right agency." For more information about how EPA works with local government to enforce noise pollution laws go to

Saved From Imminent Death

You could say that 84 year old Wes Wlodarczyk from Emerald has been to hell and back. As a seven year old lad in 1944 he was with a group of prisoners, including his mother and two sisters, Grarzyna, 8 and Jadniga, 6 that were herded into a gas chamber in Hohenfels, a German Concentration Camp, and the doors bolted in readiness for the Zyklon B, a toxic gas consisting of hydrogen cyanide, "death" gas to be released. After half an hour of "nothing happening", the doors were unlocked, opened and the prisioners were spared death.

During WW2 Wes's father relocated his family from Poland to Keszthely, a large Hungarian town, fearing that staying in Poland was too dangerous. Once his wife and three young children were safely in Hungary, he joined the British army and went into active service in Tobruk.

Although Hungary was friendly with Germany they were always friendly to Poland and its people and promised to look after them. However after the Germans exterminated the Jewish population by mid 1944, they took over the rule in Hungary, and decided to clean up the country of Poles as well. They rounded, up mostly women with children, the sick and elderly and loaded them into railway cattle trucks for the fourteen to twenty day trip to Germany. Wes remembers that under these conditions many died. "It was horrible", he says.

Wes continues "When we arrived in Germany no one knew what was going on and no camp wanted to take us as they were all full. We were moved from camp to camp for nearly 6 months and at the end we finished up in a small camp which to my memory was called Hohenfels.

This camp at first seemed to be just like the previous camps where the first thing they did was to spray us with D.D.T. to kill any vermin, lice, germs or bugs. However a short time after arrival there we were paraded naked past some tables where different men and women sat some with nurses habits and some who could have passed as doctors and we all went in to small concrete cubicles which lined the whole length of a huge shed like an aircraft hangar. Everyone went in quietly thinking that it was all for a shower. But when all the cubicles were filled and the doors were locked. the inmates found that there were no sprinkles just a small trap door in the centre of the ceiling. That's when it dawned on the men that they were locked in a gas chamber. A panic broke out and I nearly got trampled to death. Anyway, after about half an hour doors were opened and we were out. Now I suppose you want to know what happened that we came out alive? This I was never able to find out, but there could have been a number of reasons. 1. they ran out of gas. But I do not really think so. I think that there was a problem in giving the final order to drop the gas. The war was ending and although the Germans in charge wanted to get rid of any evidence and witnesses to their genocide no one wanted to take the responsibility for the signing of the order, fearing that showing their name on the order would have serious repercussions post war. As a 7 year old I was deeply traumatised for many years later even after arriving in Australia."

Wes met his sweetheart Marianna after arriving in Australia and the couple married in Sydney in 1970. The couple has three children and seven grandchildren. Wes still remains in contact with his two sisters.

I asked Wes if the memory of waiting for the gas to be released still haunted him. As a devout Catholic he says "No" and that being at peace with God and belief in Divine Providence has sustained him.

Matching colors to your clothing and shoes or accessories isn't necessary or important. The idea is to not stand out, but all the same hoping that you'll impress other anglers with your obvious wide expanse of knowledge and sensible choice of fishing gear.

It's House of Hardy V. Gucci.......Plano V. Fabergé.....and ...Velcro V. Buckles.

Pockets and compartments are a bonus or self-contained smaller tackle boxes that are incorporated in the bags design features. Helping you to decide on the placement of those items like...

Repellent V. Perfume......Tackle V. Jewellery......Chap-Stick V. Lipstick

Let's give credit where it's due though, the iconic Bum-Bag or Fanny-Pack has crossed into both genres as a convenience for its size, or multipurpose uses it has. Not quite a purse, nor a bag or a carry pack, just handy as an extra carry space that can have the use of the whole circumference of your body, that'll carry a single days use of fishing gear, without being in the way at all.

Whichever you choose a Backpack, Shoulder Bag, or Bum-Bag, make sure it's comfortable, think easy accessibility, also that it doesn't dig into you're side or back with sharp corners or edges and that it doesn't weigh too much so that the strap cuts into your shoulders.

It's all about easy access to your tackle. A shoulder bag would be my choice as you just sling it over your shoulder then slide it around to your back or front to enter the pockets. Whereas a backpack you always have to remove from your back and shoulders each time. The Bum-Bag is comfortable and out of the way but the contents is not always visible, depending on whether your body image is a six pack or a belly flap to keg, choose what suits you best, you know who you are!





March - Gardening Calendar by Angelo Eliades

March heralds the beginning of autumn, so there's lots of tidying up in the garden. It's also an ideal time to plant new trees, as the weather is milder and there is some time for the trees to establish themselves before winter arrives.

Pick marrows, pumpkins and squash before the flesh becomes coarse. Only pick pumpkins when fully ripe (no green skin or stem), cut when stalk begins turning brown and withers.

It's also time to lift root crops such as beetroot, carrots onions potatoes and turnips for storage and winter use. Leave parsnips in ground, they need some cold to taste the best.

If tomatoes have not ripened, the plants can be laid down flat on the ground and covered with a cloche (plastic covered frame) to speed up ripening. Plant garlic now, as it prefers a period of cold weather to grow well

Things to Do This Month:

- Compost autumn leaves.
- Collect perennial seeds and divide overgrown perennial plants.
- Sow cool season green manure crops, such as rapeseed, broad beans, fenugreek, linseed, lupins, mustard, oats, subclover and vetch, then dug in during autumn before flowering.
- Start planting new trees, shrubs, climbers, annuals and perennials remember to water them regularly until they establish.
- · Relocate evergreen shrubs (can be done either in autumn and early spring).
- Harvest autumn bearing raspberries, but leave canes unpruned till late winter-early spring
- Finish pruning canes that have fruited from summer fruiting raspberries.
- Prune blackcurrants and other brambleberries from now till winter.
- · Plant new strawberries
- Remove autumn leaves from ponds and water gardens and thin out aquatic plants
- Stop feeding container plants
- Cut down asparagus foliage as it starts turning yellow and mulch the plants generously
- · Net trees to protect fruit from birds

MHR Jason Wood visited Bunyip and Garfield last Thursday and met with some of the locals in the community.


Bunyip, which was previously in the Monash electorate is now part of the La Trobe electorate following a change of boundaries.




