

Counterfeit Money In Bunyip

On Friday 10th February, two Op Shops in Bunyip were handed a Counterfeit \$50 note each. The unsuspecting shop employees were unaware until the day's takings were taken to be banked on the following Monday. Described by locals as a disgusting thing to do to Op Shops that provide a necessary service to their local communities.

Immediately the counterfeit notes were discovered, other businesses in Bunyip were asked to be on the look out in case the offenders returned.

The notes were of the first polymer series. Banks and Post Officers have counterfeit detecting equipment, but if there is any doubt, there are a number of precautions that can be taken.



Pick which one is counterfeit? It's the bottom one.

- * Hold up to the light to see a seven-pointed star and the Australian Coat of Arms.
- * Tilt to see the bird's wings move and change colour, and the number change direction.
- * Check clear window is part of the banknote.
- * Use a UV light to see features fluoresce.
- * Tilt to see a rolling colour effect.

It is an offence to knowingly possess counterfeit banknotes. Suspect banknotes should be given to State or Federal police. It is important to note that counterfeits have no value – you will not be reimbursed. If they prove to be genuine banknotes, you will receive full value for them.

If you come across a banknote that you suspect is counterfeit, handle the suspect banknote as little as possible and store it in an envelope.

Note any relevant information, such as how it came into your possession.

Report the matter immediately to State or Federal police.

You are well within your rights to refuse to accept a banknote if you have concerns about it.

The Commonwealth offence of using or uttering counterfeit money knowing that it is counterfeit attracts up to 12-years imprisonment, or in the case of a body corporate up to \$133,200, under section 7.

Applications open for 2022-23 weed control grants

Landowners and community groups are encouraged to apply for Council's 2022-23 weed control grant program.

Weed control grants are available for Cardinia shire residents to help to control noxious and environmental weeds on private property, both in agricultural areas and areas of high environmental value.

Funding is available for:

- disposing of weeds
- hiring equipment
- hiring contractors
- purchasing herbicide

A maximum of \$350 per landholder or \$750 for community groups, within Cardinia Shire.

Applications will close on 31 May 2023 or earlier if the funding allocation for the program has been exhausted. We recommend you apply online as soon as possible.

Received an Emergency Alert warning message on your phone?

Emergency Alert is the national telephone warning system used by emergency services to send voice messages to landlines and text messages to mobile phones within a defined area about potential emergencies. This service is now 5G compatible.

Emergency Alert is just one way of warning communities and will not be used in all circumstances.

It is important that you do not rely solely on receiving an official message and should always be aware of what is happening around you, as you could find yourself suddenly in danger.

If the caller ID number or message header on your phone displays the number '+61 444 444 444' it is genuine. Do not block +61 444 444 444.

Frank Sinatra's My Way Story

While singer-songwriter legend Paul Anka has left a long trail of hits over his 60-year career, he admits that early on he was terrified to pen a tune for Frank Sinatra. "He'd always tease me, 'Hey kid, when are you going to write me a song?'" Anka remembers. "But I couldn't. I was scared to death. I was writing all this teen stuff."

Of course, there are few music lovers today who aren't familiar with the poignant ballad Paul Anka eventually crafted for Sinatra, "My Way." Some dub it the most powerful of Anka's many songs, which also include classics like "Puppy Love," "Put Your Head on My Shoulder," and even Johnny Carson's theme song for "The Tonight Show."

Anka didn't think twice those years ago when Sinatra called him out of the blue and declared, "Kid, we're going to dinner."

"When Sinatra says, 'We're going to dinner,' you drop everything and you go to dinner," recalls Paul, who as a budding Vegas headliner in the 1960's had a friendly tie with the Rat Pack.

During the meal, Sinatra dropped a stunning surprise: He was about to quit showbiz. "He said, 'I've had it. I'm fed up. But I'm doing one more album,'" Anka recalls. "He said, 'and you never wrote me that song.' "

Anka felt the pressure. Still reeling over the news at 1 AM in his apartment, he found himself toying with lyrics to a melody he had heard in France. "I thought, What would Frank do with this melody if he were a writer?" Anka says. "And all of a sudden, it just came to me: '*And now the end is near, and so I face the final curtain*.' "

He finished the song at 5 AM and called Sinatra, promising him a song for his final album. "I knew I had something I wouldn't be afraid to give him," Anka says. The next day, he recorded a demo of the song and flew to Las Vegas, where Sinatra lived. "I played him the song, and he looked at me and said, 'I'm doing it.' "

Two months later, Sinatra called Anka again. This time, with better news. "He said, 'Kid, listen to this,' and puts the phone up to the speaker," Anka remembers. "I heard *My Way* playing for the first time, and I started to cry."

Paul Anka never knew what a legacy he had created when, at the request of Ol' Blue Eyes, he wrote this song for Frank's (presumed) retirement. Frank Sinatra had a mega smash hit with it, followed by the Three Tenors, Pavarotti, and numerous other big stars who performed the song over the years.

Tynong School Escapes Fire

Burnt leaves and pieces of bark were littering the sky and falling gently like black snowflakes on the ground; the sun a huge ominous orange ball glowing in the morning sky with the streets seemingly eerily deserted. An oncoming lone car approaches and passes me, the sole occupant staring straight ahead as if on a mission doesn't acknowledge me, his mind is preoccupied. Perhaps he doesn't even see me! A shiver runs through my body.

It's 9 am on Saturday morning, the 2nd of March and I'm sitting in my car on the Nar Nar Goon – Longwarry Road opposite the railway crossing at Tynong. I see a heavy threatening plume of smoke in the distance heading towards the town. The air has been filled by smoke and the daylight around me has a yellowish, sepia tinge. Although the fire is still some distance away, it seems that it is only just down the road and about to confront me head on.

To my left I see St. Thomas Aquinas College. It looks like a lonely, defenceless sitting duck waiting for the fire to consume the whole complex. Earlier at the 8am Mass the parishioners prayed that their school and church would be spared. By late Saturday afternoon, the five resident priests at the Corpus Christi Catholic Church locked up the priory and the church and evacuated to safety.

A week later and although the fire was still burning, all of the damage was on the northern side of the Princes Highway. The fire did not cross over. The thick smoke and the fire risk eased and the school reopened its doors on Wednesday the 6th. It was the feast day of St. Thomas Aquinas and the planned whole school Mass at the Church went ahead as scheduled, followed by fun and games at the school. It truly was a day of Thanksgiving.

Bunyip & District Pony Club hosted their annual January 3 day Clinic Camp recently at Pound Road Reserve.

Families, visitors and Campers from as far away, Horsham, Lakes Entrance, Bullengarook, Wonthaggi with many places in-between, along with our locals were all welcomed.

Those who attended the Bunyip Clinic/Camp, had an enjoyable 3 days of horsemanship, riding instruction, learning and fun. Riders are placed into appropriate groups of 6 where Instructors can get to know each rider, their experience and expectations over the 3 days of the clinic. Riders have 3 full lessons each day, Dressage, Show Jumping and Cross Country. Instructors are chosen for their specific discipline; 2 Dressage, 2 Show Jumping, and 2 Cross Country Instructors.

Camp also caters for a very special group of riders on leadline or recently off leadline, once again very fortunate to have the services of Liddy Lambert.

Melbourne's weather was at its absolute best with, pleasant temperature, heat (way too hot), rain, wind, thunder and lightning. Gotta luv our fickle weather! Our riders and their families were certainly up to the adverse conditions, better known as "horsey resilience".

With the middle day of camp predicted to be a very unpleasant 38 degrees, the instructors and the riders met and agreed to an early 6am start. Yes, that's right 0600 start, which meant slightly shortened lessons allowing an early finish for the day. We were all finished by 1-30pm, this enabled some groups of riders and friends to visit Gumbaya World, KooWeeRup and Garfield swimming pools, also showed the resilience of campers who stayed at the grounds setting up a wading pool with even some brave riders paddling in the water jump, which for the first time in many years needed to have water pumped out, as it was too deep for instruction (Pony Club regulations regarding water depth).

Many thanks to Russell, Bunyip CFA, for helping out with a pump to ensure the level was correct. After the predicted hot weather a storm followed, accompanied by thunder, lightning, wind and rain during the night, which was the lead in to the final day of camp.

Wednesday's attire consisted of whatever was dry, or nearly dry, or completely saturated, or as several people were seen to be wearing an assortment of horse rugs.

Camp entries were only advertised for 15 days before we needed to add a "Wait List" for potential riders. One of the main drawcards to our Clinic are the Instructors, we endeavour to have the best, most sort after instructors available, once again this year we were able to achieve this. Next year's Instructors have already been pre-booked to ensure the quality continues.

Cross Country lessons were made more difficult throughout the year due to the lack of maintenance to our specialized jumps and to the Cross Country tracks. Fallen and uprooted trees have not been able to be cleared in a timely manner leaving some tracks impassable and not able to be used.

Bunyip Club members and Cardinia Shire Council answered our call for help ensuring the grounds were ready and safe for use. Preparing the grounds for the Camp each January makes the Pound Road Reserve accessible to all local equestrians.

A new booking system has been created to enable better use of our wonderful grounds.

TALKIN' ... FISHIN' GETTING 'ONABIT'

Unfortunately statistics show that our population is gaining a larger number of elderly than ever before. Along with those groups are fisherman too, that still would like to continue with their passion however age creeps up on us all and things increasingly become a little more difficult each year. Memory and movements are a bit slower, body parts don't work like they used to, however we try to deny it to ourselves. I prefer to think of it not as getting old, I'm just like a vintage car, I'm only getting 'Onabit' but maybe with a bit of rust in the joints.

Some of the common problems we face are these, with possible solutions available to keep us fishing into the future.

- 1. Hook eyes harder to see, with knots harder to twist and tie. 1(a). Magnification glasses with knot tying assistance tools.
- 2. Seeing clear line to thread and tie. 2(a) Use Coloured and Fluorescent lines.
- 3. Getting in and out of the boat safely. 3(a) Folding s/steel ladders or rope ladders, trailer steps for boat ramps.
- 4. Dangerous and slippery boat trailer frames to walk down. 4(a) Checker plate or grated full length runways, or grit adhesive tape.
- 5. Feeling the cold and heat more. 5(a) Thermal wear, heat packs or ice gel packs that fit into clothing pockets
- 6. Technology overload, keeping up with it all. 6(a) Take on a junior to mentor and operate the equipment, and teach you as well.
- 7. Loading boats back on the trailer, winching on by a hand winch. 7(a) Purchase a Powerwinch, power supplied by the car's plug outlet.

Many bushwalkers and that includes fisherman become lost and confused in remote areas, it's easily done but hard to explain, especially when there are so many safety devices available at reasonable prices from all of our most popular fishing and sporting retailers. Many hand held units use GPS and positioning or tracking via satellites is a personal safety feature you can't dismiss, Mobile phones assist but be aware of signal strength in the area you intend going, carry best quality spare batteries. These days it's early to bed, and hard to rise. Wading rivers that are a little shorter and levelled ground, or beaches with hard packed sand makes the walking easier, close to the carpark is handy too please.

Fishing with a mate, is a good practise to adopt, just in case, as we're all getting 'Onabit. Stay safe.'

Ridin' Route 93

What to do...it's a beautiful Saturday morning, blue skies, not too hot or cold and the 'todo' list is reasonably manageable and able to be postponed!? Jump on your favourite bike and head off to the back of Warragul South, on the way to Korumburra and look for the number 93 near Ellinbank...the Grand Ridge Road...an adventure biking gem of a road in our region.

For those who are fortunate enough to own an Adventure bike, or dual-sport as they are sometimes referred to ... try your hand riding our very own Grand Ridge Road which meanders through the hills south-east of Warragul, through to Mirboo North and beyond. It combines good, sealed road, graded gravel roads, logging tracks and lots of tight twisties as well as fast flowing open roads...quite frankly it's a weekend adventure bikers dream!

On this particular ride a couple of weeks ago it was just the two of us...I was on my trusty KTM 990 and my mate Tim on his new-*ish* Honda Africa Twin. Both of us were running 50/50 tyres which were perfect for the dry dirt/road combination.

The Grand Ridge Road (GRR) starts a few km's out of Warragul as a gravel road that gets pretty tight in spots but with absolutely spectacular views of the surrounding country. Look out for new gravel laid in places as this makes it very loose and reminiscent of skating on marbles!

After a few kilometres of gravel, you take a right and you're back on the sealed stuff. This'll take you through the hills and along the ridges all the way to Mirboo North – a great opportunity for both man and machine to fuel up before tackling the next stage of the GRR (man fuel suggestion: Grand Ridge Brewery!). The road is generally very well sign posted (follow road 93) but a GPS is always handy as it does take a couple of unexpected turns here and there. Leaving Mirboo Nth follow highway C457 until you get to Boolarra South where you take a right into GRR, C458. This'll then take you into Strzelecki State Forest and in amongst some brilliant bush roads. Keep an eye out for wallabies and lyre birds, and if riding during the week, be on the lookout for logging trucks. After meandering further South, the GGR turns east again for quite a few km's, and again starts drifting N-NE for a while.

To follow it to the end point will take the best part of the day and takes you as far as the Hyland Hwy intersection, well SE of Loy Yang. We have previously kept on straight rather than taking the right at English Corner and then continue on Budgeree Rd and loop back around to Mirboo Nth again via Budgeree and Boolarra.

This is such a satisfying road to follow if you've got a few hours spare and the loop back around to Mirboo Nth is only around 94kms. It's not a cross-continental adventure tour, but this road offers us weekend warriors a great variety of road surfaces and riding conditions, not to mention some magnificent scenery along the way...not a bad local option!

Until next time, keep the shiny side up and stay safe!cheers

2002: Australian diplomat and war hero Sir Roden Cutler died at the age of 85 following a long illness. He was the longest serving <u>Governor of New South Wales</u> and a <u>recipient</u> of the <u>Victoria</u> <u>Cross</u>, the highest award for gallantry "in the face of the enemy" that can be awarded to British and <u>Commonwealth</u> armed forces. For his diplomatic services to Australia, he was honoured by <u>The Queen</u> as a <u>Knight Commander of the Order of St Michael and St George</u> (KCMG) in December 1965. He was further honoured as a <u>Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order</u> (KCVO) in 1970. He was appointed a <u>Knight of the Order of Australia</u> (AK) in 1981.

1962: Australian television personality, wildlife expert, and conservationist Steve Irwin was born Stephen Robert Irwin in <u>Essendon</u>, a suburb of Melbourne, Victoria. Irwin achieved worldwide fame from the television series <u>The Crocodile Hunter</u>, an internationally broadcast <u>wildlife</u> <u>documentary</u> series which he co-hosted with his wife <u>Terri</u>. In 1997, while on a fishing trip on the coast of Queensland with his father, Irwin discovered a new species of turtle. Later given the honour of naming the newly discovered species, he named it <u>Irwin's turtle (*Elseya irwini*</u>) after his family. Another newly discovered Australian animal – a species of air-breathing land <u>snail</u>, <u>Crikey</u> <u>steveirwini</u>, was named after Irwin in 2009. In 2001, Irwin was awarded the <u>Centenary Medal</u> by the Australian government for his "service to global conservation and to Australian tourism".

"A Little Book with a lot of Knowledge"

Bunyip Landcare launched the new edition of the Native Plants of Bunyip booklet on 4 December, and celebrated by planting 500 native species. The planting was held at Bandicoot Run Winery and featured plants described in the booklet. The area planted is a great example of a problem area – a very wet boggy patch that is completely unusable in winter. The planting featured lots of rushes and insect attracting shrubs to help pollination of the nearby vines.

This is the first time that Bunyip Landcare has planted so late in the year, but the continuing La Nina and the ability of the landowners to water the plants as needed decided us to take a chance.



The booklet was first produced in 2013 with the help of Geoff Boyes who took the photos and provided the plant descriptions. The scientific editing was done by Sue Ablett, and the lovely graphic design is by Iman Barabadi.

This edition includes a couple of important species that we missed last time – the wonderful local Swamp Gum and the locally threatened Strzelecki Gum.

The booklets are free, thanks to a Victorian Landcare Grant administered by Melbourne Water, and are available in most Bunyip shops or by contacting Bunyip Landcare at <u>bunyiplcg@gmail.com</u> or through our Facebook page.

Hard Waste – Please Book

Residents in Bunyip have noticed that some people are putting out hard waste materials on their nature strips without making a booking with the Cardinia Shire Council to collect it.

This can result is making the street look untidy.

Every household in Cardinia Shire that gets its bins collected by Council can now book 2 free hard waste collections per calendar year. This applies to both property owners and renters.

The Council guidelines include.

You must book your collection before putting waste out.

Hard waste should be placed on your nature strip the weekend immediately before your collection week, but no earlier.

Before putting your waste out, make sure you understand what will and won't be accepted for collection.

Additional hard waste collections (on top of the 2 free collections) can also be booked for a fee.
