IONA CRICKET CLUB

On Saturday the 5th of October a momentous occasion occurred at the Iona Cricket Ground, the first ball was bowled on the brand new 8 foot pitch!

In 1995 when Bob Rogers revived the Iona Cricket Club, a narrow 6 foot concrete slab was poured at the current Murray Rd site. For several years "roll out" carpet mats were laid out every Saturday for cricket to be player on. The ICC then went "upmarket" and got a brand new surface glued down. This was played on for many a year, much to the consternation of visiting teams complaining about the "narrow bloody pitch". Every opposition bowler that ever bowled a bad ball blamed the "bloody narrow Iona pitch"!

So finally, after many years, quite an amount of fundraising and much hard work from club members, and a huge thanks to City2Sea Landscapes the old slab was removed and an 8 foot slab was poured, a new synthetic surface was laid and the Iona Cricket Ground was ready for cricket season 2019/2020!

lona's division 2 team played Longwarry in the first game on the new pitch. With Longwarry winning the toss and electing to bat, Jarryd Bain got things underway with the first wicket on the new strip and followed up with 2 more. Both Kieran Lenders and Chris Phelan also took 3 wickets, and Jayson Barwick bowled a miserly 8 overs for 8 runs, but these efforts could not stop Longwarry amassing 9/165 on a very slow Iona ground. Iona's chase started well with Michael Neilson (55) and Micky Taylor (27) keeping things under control, but unfortunately a string of middle and lower order wickets restricted Iona to being dismissed for 123.

The lona division4 team played away vs Warragul and started brilliantly by putting on 8/173. The ever reliable Graeme Rankin was the mainstay putting on a brilliant 82 and was ably supported by contributions from Craig Lenders (19) and Sam Accardi (29*). Unfortunately however this score proved not to be enough by the closest of margins with Mick Scully's awesome performance of 5/17 and Lachlan Howard's 2/14 not being enough to stop Warragul from reaching 9/174 in the last over! Not the result that the "Swamp Tigers" wanted from round one, but plenty of positives to come out of it. Onwards and upwards for the "Swampies"!



Bushfire Recovery



Six months after a bushfire or major emergency is often a major milestone for impacted communities. It's when people start to realise there is still a great deal of recovery work to do, which can lead to fatigue.

Clinical Psychologist David Younger, who is working with bushfire-affected communities across Cardinia Shire and the wider Gippsland area, said this was an important time to check in with friends and neighbours and think about your own recovery.

"It is important for community members to start to reintroduce balance into their lives and to make time for other important activities, such as spending quality time with family and friends," Mr Younger said.

"Experience tells us that around the six-month mark people start to feel tired and sometimes irritable and angry from the physical and emotional turmoil they've experienced.

"If you know someone who is struggling, it's a good idea to repairing and rebuilding damaged properties. check in on them to see if they are ok. Conversations about traumatic events and how people are coping can feel uncomfortable, but it's important to let people know you are there for them. Sometimes, just giving people an opportunity to feel heard is enough to make a big difference."

Cardinia Shire Mayor Councillor Graeme Moore said

Council continued to provide assistance

for residents in the fire-affected areas, and encouraged people to reach out and access the free support that is available.

"The bushfire recovery centre continues to operate at the Tonimbuk Hall supported by range of services and Council is producing a regular community newsletter informing residents in fire-affected areas of the latest news and opportunities for assistance," Cr Moore said.

"Council staff and a number of other services will remain in the local area providing support, advice, community meals and range of other services as the clean-up and rebuilding work continues."

The bushfire case support program, established by the Victorian Government, continues to help people navigate the support services available including mental health services, family violence support, and services for





BUT... We are excited to announce that we have a new mechanic starting with us on Monday 26th August.



COM PARK

Where are you and your family at six months on from the fires?

David Younger, a Clinical Psychologist working with bushfire affected communities across Gippsland cautions that the six-month mark after a bushfire is very important.

It is often the time when people who have been impacted by the bushfires are just starting to realise there is still so much work to do, yet they have already been working incredibly hard for an extended period of time.

If these people continue to involve themselves in recovery related tasks at the same high pace and intensity without making time for other aspects of life, such as spending good quality time with family and friends, then they place their mental and general health and wellbeing at risk.

"For many community members the distress and heightened emotions experienced immediately after the fires will have gradually reduced over time; however for others this will not be the case," he said.

"While many people seek support early, there are those who may be isolated and feel disconnected. It is important that communities identify these people and work to support and assist them when possible." Those who may have previously experienced a mental health difficulty prior to the fires may also find life more challenging. Some people may start to feel overwhelmed, depressed, sad or highly anxious.

People may try to control their reactions by avoiding or closing off their feelings. This does not help the underlying issue and in time it can make it worse. "If you notice that the balance in life has been lost, that you are just too busy for anything positive, or that you are experiencing changes in your mood or physical health, these are signs that it is time to start taking breaks so that the body and mind can rest and recuperate," he said.

"If you know someone who is struggling, it's a good idea to check in on them to see if they are ok; and while conversations around traumatic events and how people are coping six-months on can feel uncomfortable, it is important to let people know you are there for them. Sometimes, just giving people an opportunity to feel heard is enough to make a big difference."

The bushfire case support program, established by the Victorian Government following the 2019 Gippsland bushfires continues to help people navigate the various support services available including mental health services; family violence supports; and services for repairing and rebuilding damaged properties.

To date the bushfire case support program has worked with over 730 households.

Local police update

(27th August to 25th September, 2019) By Danny Hower, Victoria Police Sergeant Hello,

We hope everyone is going well and getting out and about with spring. You can help shed the winter coat and enjoy things by getting involved in any one of the many local groups and activities available which keep people busy and our area great. Every week I bump into something or someone new in the area who is putting in valuably in some form and I love it.

There is still a lot of bushfire recovery work going on north of the highway. People and the environment are very sensitive following on from the fires in March so please be understanding and respectful to the community and area accordingly.

We all love our Bunyip State Park but unfortunately it remains closed after the fires for the same reasons with really obvious signs and gates indicating so. We continue to work very closely with Parks Victoria as they try to rehabilitate the area and we've had some good results with follow up enquiries and identifying offenders. You will struggle to find a lawful excuse to be in the Park without permission and even entering without lawful reason is trespassing and dis-respectful, let alone; ramming, cutting, damaging or stealing the gates; hunting with firearms in close proximity to Parks staff (where are they?); dumping and burning cars; stealing vegetation and firewood; and ripping the ground apart.

Investigations – to the general public in real life they're mostly a quiet thing that sneaks up on you.

Please check the PARKS VICTORIA website for information on closures and alternatives.

Things sort of feel like they're settling down after a busy year and it feels good to report back with only a months' worth. Some of the police stuff we've been involved in or had reported to us locally were:

Forty people & vehicles being field contacted for suspected criminal behaviour; sixteen in Bunyip State Park/Tynong Nth/Tonimbuk area; thirteen in Kurth Kiln; four in Garfield; three in Garfield Nth; two each in Nar Nar Goon & Bunyip.

Ten Family Incident reports; six at the same place in Nar Nar Goon; three in Tynong (same); and one in Garfield. Seven people going to court for criminal or traffic matters and nine traffic infringements notices (fines) issued. Seven referrals for counselling and assistance to other professional agencies.

Five people arrested on outstanding warrants - with thanks to those who hand themselves in.

Three firearms storage inspections conducted. Two Family Violence Intervention Orders being served. One person interviewed for a court drivers licence restoration.

Touch wood, the general local crime front seems to have quietened for the moment (possibly for a reason), but some local investigations involve:

A hit and run vehicle collision in Nar Nar Goon.

A car from St Kilda dumped and burnt in Tonimbuk. Two searches for missing people, including a major bush search with a very sad ending.

A search warrant in Garfield.

Two assaults; one in Bunyip between two people known to each other; and another in Nar Nar Goon.

A twenty three year old Bunyip man being charged with drug offences & a twenty two year old Garfield Nth man being cautioned for the same incident.

Thefts of; a push bike in Nar Nar Goon; a caravan in Iona; number plates in Tynong; personal items from a car parked in a Bunyip State Park car park.

Damage to toilets at a Bunyip sporting club.

Theft of a motor car from a facility in Maryknoll which was later located in Pakenham.

A burglary and theft of a small amount of domestic items in Nar Nar Goon.

Again - thanks for every ones help. Please keep aware of your surroundings and keep looking after each other. For immediate emergency service assistance and attendance please ring 000. The Mount Cannibal and District Preservation Group would like to thank the many community members who attended our community meeting regarding Hanson's proposed Bunyip North Quarry on Wednesday evening.

Hanson has recently altered the scope of their project to dig a deeper hole and extract more stone in a shorter amount of time - this means more trucks along our roads and the Bunyip/Tonimbuk intersection. Hanson won't tell the community how many more trucks this will mean, but based on their original estimates, they will have 530 truck movements per 12 hour day - meaning a vehicle passing every 82 seconds. This will happen five and a half days a week. Maintenance will occur for one and a half days a week.

Hanson has stated that this quarry will only create 7-10 new jobs.

After more than 12 years fighting this proposal, Hanson's EES is drawing to a close and we need your help more than ever. You can:

My Boyhood Memories

I remember how going out anywhere was such a big occasion in our household. We didn't have a car and most of our transport was on Shanks' Pony or the train for distant travel. Sometimes a kindly neighbour would give us a lift in his car. We also rode bicycles. I rode one to school, to Mass, fishing, rabbiting and visiting mates. I would meet with my mates on weekends and we would ride our bicycles up and down the main street and look into shop windows and dream of owning some of those items on display.

One Sunday we found ourselves in the yard of a tractor dealership and we were jumping on and and off those tractors pretending that we were ploughing paddocks. Suddenly someone pressed the "wrong" button and the huge tractor started to move , broke through the chain fence at the front and proceeded to move until it stopped in the middle of the main street. We tucked our trousers into our socks and took off. To this day I still don't know what happened after that. But I did see that tractor parked back in the same spot in the yard the next day. We made regular Sunday afternoon visits to the local bakery where a friend of the family, Tony worked. Maffra had two bakeries in those days, both owned by the same owner. One bakery solely baked bread whilst the other one (where Tony worked) baked all of the cakes, pastries and pies. No such thing as strict health regulations in those days. I will just give you an example. The bread bakery would cook the pie meat and deliver it to the pie bakery in three huge aluminium saucepans. The meat was so hot that you couldn't touch it so it was left out on the back porch to cool whilst Tony would prepare the pie pastry into the baking trays. When the meat cooled sufficiently enough he would dip his whole hand into the saucepan and scoop a handful of meat into the pastry dish. Once he had meat in all of the pies - a batch of pies would have been about 100 - he would then cover the lot with a sheet of pastry and use a large rolling pin over the baking tins which would cut the pastry out. Then a prick on top with a fork to make a steam escape hole and into the oven they'd go. I must mention here that after the pie meat was left on the back step to cool it started to form a crust as it cooled. This crust got thicker as it cooled and allowed huge blow flies to settle onto the surface and blow the meat. By the time that Tony was ready to put the meat into the pies, the surface of the meat in each saucepan was white with maggots crawling all over it.

Tony just got a piece of wood from the woodheap and simply stirred in the maggots until they blended in with the meat and could not be seen. He said that was ok as they still had to go into the pies and be cooked in extreme temperatures and they wouldn't do anyone any harm after that. The Maffra pies had and still do to this day a very fine reputation and in East Gippsland you can hear customers specify a Maffra pie when ordering pies. I wonder what the "secret" ingredient was that gave them their distinctive flavour. I'd say that the meat is cooled in a more hygienic manner these days. Even though the meat in the pies had lots of maggots mixed in, me and my mates still continued to eat them. Visiting Tony made me into a connoisseur of cakes and pastries and I knew all about them. He was an extremely good, kind and patient man. When I got older, only then did it dawn on me as to how patient he was with us. Dad worked for the Victorian Railways and he would get an Annual Leave travel voucher to ride the trains with his family anywhere in Victoria. On these occasions we would make what I considered a huge journey to Melbourne to visit friends. We mainly went to Newport and Pascoe Vale or to Noble Park. Once I found out that we were going to Melbourne I was so excited that I found it very difficult to concentrate on anything else but the forthcoming holiday. Thoughts of the train travel and what I would do when we got there consumed my thoughts all day and also resulted in many sleepless nights. Such was my joy at the prospect of travelling to Melbourne. Dad made sure that I didn't know too much in advance when we were going anywhere as this would stop me from continuously pestering him and asking all sorts of silly questions. On the night before we were to go to Melbourne I would lay awake in bed for most of the night planning every moment of my holiday. My excitement would build as dawn started to break. As soon as the others would start to get out of bed I was up quick as a flash, dressed and rarin to go. I was so worried that we would miss our train. At the Maffra station we would board the little two carriage Rail Motor which would take us to Traralgon to meet up with the Melbourne train from Bairnsdale. This train had many carriages and was pulled by a magnificent big black steam engine. The engine would hiss and puff steam as it sat impatiently and waited at the platform for all of the passengers to board. During most of the journey between Maffra and Flinders Street I had my nose pressed up against the window taking in every detail as the train

moved along its journey. I was sure that life

couldn't get any better than this. We used to go on day trips to Seaspray which is part of the Ninety Mile Beach. This was due to the generosity of George and Maria. George was one of the first Ukrainians in Maffra to buy a car. I used to admire the back fins of his 1959 Holden and marvel at the speedo which was an orange coloured bar that would extend in an arc around the speedometer showing the increasing speed instead of a needle. George and Maria were lovely kindly people who had a son and two daughters. I cannot remember how the 5 of them and the 4 of us would fit comfortably into the car whenever they took us out. Then there was the migrant's friend Cyril. Cyril and his family were great supporters of the migrants in the early years at Maffra. Cyril always had a car full of kids each morning to take to school. I think that his kids eventually got bikes to go to school which allowed him to pile in extra migrant children into his car each morning and ferry them off to school. He and his wife were devout Catholics and openly practised their faith by acts of kindness and love towards their fellow men. The poor Hurley's had to also put up with many migrant kids when television came out in 1956. They were one of the first to buy a TV in Maffra and always made their lounge room available to the neighbourhood kids. At about 4.00pm each afternoon us kids would descend into the Hurley household to watch cartoons and the Mickey Mouse Club with Annette Funicello. The Hurley's only had access to their TV only after all of the visiting kids had left. But they never complained, in fact they cheerfully welcomed us all into their home. By 6 O'Clock we were starting to get hungry and there was homework to do, so by that time we had generally gone home. I can still remember vividly going fishing with my father in the Macalister River at Bellbird Corner on the way to Newry. All the gear, including a large jam tin of garden worms was packed somehow onto our bikes and off we'd go on the 5 mile ride. Of course we were too poor to afford fishing rods and used only hand lines. The river had an abundant supply of trout and a smaller species of trout known as the "Sand Trout' which was a beautiful eating fish. I think it is extinct now.

Then we would ride our bikes rabbiting and take along our dog who would sniff out the rabbits and give chase until he caught it or it got away. They were great times. Even though he was busy with work, I always seemed to spend plenty of time doing things with my dad and now I cherish those times we spent together.

October/November– Gardening Calendar for Temperate Australia

October is the mid-spring period, flowers bloom in abundance, the warmer weather with rain bringing ideal conditions for lush plant growth. The cold weather hasn't quite finished yet, cold nights and even frosts can still be expected, along with strong winds, so it's important to protect tender plants and seedlings.

October

•Plant evergreen shrubs and trees (this includes citrus trees).

•Relocate evergreen shrubs - they can now regrow their roots during the mild weather.

•Set up windbreaks (e.g. plastic tree guards) to protect newly planted evergreen trees and shrubs.

•Plant potted fruit trees and vines (having roots, can be planted anytime, best in spring & autumn).

• Relocate any self-seeded annuals to better locations in the garden.

•Tidy up overgrown plants and tie growing vines back to supports or wires.

•Continue propagating plants by taking cuttings or

layering (both ground layering and air layering).Feed brambleberries (raspberries, blackberries & hybrids) and currants.

•Last chance to remove dead winter growth, and to dig up and divide perennial plants

•Clean out ponds and water gardens, divide waterlilies, plant new aquatic plan

November

•Mulch around fruit trees and plants to retain moisture in the soil and prevent water loss from evaporation (keep mulch away from plant stems and trunks as this can cause stem rot/collar rot). Mulch strawberries by placing straw underneath to keep the berries off the soil.

• Propagate strawberries from runners.

•Plant potted fruit trees and vines (having roots, can be planted anytime, best in spring & autumn).

- •Tie growing vines back to supports or wires.
- •Propagating plants by taking softwood (green) cuttings from now till January (after which they harden off).

•Last chance to plant evergreen shrubs and trees (this includes citrus trees).

•In ponds and water gardens, thin out existing aquatic plants, continue planting new ones, fertilise aquatic plants and feed fish regularly.

A Fly line cast well is a thing of beauty to watch, even seems in slow motion at times, a poor cast in the air is ugly and as frustrating as tangled underwear.


