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



DUNG BEETLE PROJECT

On the 23rd March several of our members attended the Dung Beetle Workshop convened by Peter Ronalds from the WPCLN and supported by PPWCMA. The guest speaker was Russ Barrow from Dung Beetle Ecosystem Engineers Project.

Dung beetles were first introduced to Australia in 1966 as a pilot study to assess whether or not cattle dung could be controlled by the beetles action of eating and burying dung. When dung remains unburied it sours pasture, locks up nutrients and is a breeding ground for flies. If dung could be buried it releases the nutrients into the soil and aerates the soil thus allowing less nutrient runoff into streams.

The members came away enthused and at our next working bee the thought of raising dung beetles in nursery beds arose. This was put to the group and 4 members wanted to be involved. The properties involved have different property uses.

The idea of nursery beds appealed as several members had dung beetles released in the past and they had failed to establish.

Dung beetles are not cheap and we sort some advice and quotes from Greg Dalton of Creation Care a specialist in raising dung beetles in nursery beds. Without his help and advice, zoom meeting and numerous emails and phone calls this project would not have got off the ground.

A suggestion to apply to Cardinia Shire Community Recovery Grant for funding was made. Our grant was successful our aim was to trial the raising of different species of beetles and different nursery bed types. With this grant we were able to purchase 2 breeding and assessment kits with Bubas bison plus extra beetles for

the pallet nursery bed from Greg Dalton at

Creation Care and 3 wooden beds we were able to obtain from Macclesfield and Yarra Valley Equestrian Landcare Group. These were all set up for the B.bison to arrive on the 2nd June.

Greg suggested that the following beetles Onthophagus vacca, Bubas bubalus and Geotrupes spiniger as well as the B.bison would be suitable for nursery beds plus should go well in our area. This variety of beetles should hopefully cover most of the 4 seasons in the year which enables management of dung year- round. Our group was fortunate to obtain a grant

from Garfield Community Opportunity Shop and Bunyip Community Opportunity Shop. Karen Thomas PPWCMA was organising



dung beetles for various farmers locally and we obtained a nursery bed, assessment bed and O.vacca beetles from her project. The O.vacca and B.bubulas beetles arrived on the 25th August. Their nursery beds are from Creation Care and some constructed beds by the group. Until the beetles are harvested in 6-12 months' time, we will not be able to ascertain which bed and location is the most successful. The larger beds have 100 beetles 50/50 split of female and male, smaller beds only 50 with the same female/male ratio. The Geotrupes spiniger hopefully arrive in March.

The beetles need to be fed on dung not contaminated by drenches every 5-7 days. The O.vacca and B.bubulas are only slowly coming to terms with our climate. We have been fortunate to be able to collect dung from an organic dairy thus giving us ease of mind on the dung purity. Some 60-70 litres of dung was consumed weekly by the Bison in the first few months but are slowly eating less. When the other beetles hit their straps more than 80 - 90 litres will be consumed.

The first testing of our ability in raising of beetles in nurseries will be in Dec -Jan when the O.vacca's young are emerging. Then we will see what 50/50 split of females and males produce.

If our project is successful we are aiming to share our knowledge and beetles with landowners wanting to raise beetles in nurseries.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Brett Owen said the care packs are one way Council is supporting our community during these tough times. "We are helping locals get through these challenging times and I thank everyone for being involved in delivering these care packs," he said. "You can also jump on to our website for a copy of our directory with info about local services such as food relief and rent assistance. "There's also business grants available through Victorian Government and council's business concierge service is here to help you navigate the application processes. "I also encourage anyone who feels like they might need a bit of additional emotional or mental health support to reach out to a support service such as Head to Help in Officer, Lifeline, Kids Helpline and Beyond Blue," Councillor Tammy



Radford, who chaired council's COVID-19 community recovery committee, thanked the committee for their ongoing contribution to help the community. "A number of planned projects the committee were involved in were impacted by COVID restrictions and lockdowns however the team's support for these care packages is appreciated and will greatly assist our community. A big thank you to all involved." The care packages were funded by a Victoria Government grant to support the community during the pandemic. Help green Cardinia - free native plant vouchers for schools, community groups and large properties

Cardinia Shire Council is encouraging schools, kindergartens, community groups and owners of properties more than 4000 square metres to apply for free \$100 native plant vouchers to help green Cardinia Cardinia Shire Mayor, Councillor Brett Owen said the free plant voucher would encourage mass plantings of native species to help support local wildlife



and to increase carbon capture and storage. "Due to the overwhelming success of our residential plant giveaway in April, we're scaling up and encouraging more mass plantings, in line with Council's commitment to our Aspirational Energy Transition Plan," explained Cr Owen. The goal of the Aspirational Energy Transition Plan is to capture and store carbon. The most effective and efficient way to achieve this is to mass plant large, woody trees where possible. Large land holdings lend themselves to this type of planting. Council offered plant giveaways for smaller landholdings and other residents in April 2021 and will again in 2022. "Tuesday 7 September is National Threatened Species Day so it's the perfect time to think about how we can continue to support endangered plant and animals in our shire. Schools and kindergartens may choose to use these vouchers to create a butterfly or bird attracting garden or even a sensory garden," said Cr Owen. "For farmers and owners of larger properties these vouchers can be used for shelter belts, waterway protection, soil stabilisation, planting out following weed removal or even creating wildlife corridors. "Council is proud to support our community to create a greener, cleaner Cardinia Shire through the investment of 5500 native plants for our community to plant," Cr Owen said. Online applications for vouchers will go live at 9am on 7 September and be open while stock lasts. Applicants need to provide their contact details, property size, and, using an easy drop-down menu, explain

how their planting will deliver environmental benefits. Successful applicants will be able to choose from a selection of indigenous trees, shrubs and grasses as tube stock. Species include indigenous plants such as Gum trees, Wattles, Banksia, Correas, Lomandras, Dianella and much more. CEC Nursery at Deep Creek Reserve is located at 62 Cameron Way, Pakenham. Plants can be collected once vouchers have been issues and COVID-19 restrictions have lifted.

LOCAL ROADS AND COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDING TO BOOST JOBS AND THE ECONOMY IN MONASH

The Federal Liberal and Nationals Government has approved funding for 11 projects as part of its \$2.5 billion Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program, which is supporting local jobs, businesses and boosting the economy during COVID-19. Federal Member for Monash Russell Broadbent said getting shovels in the ground on local construction projects was important for maintaining jobs and economic growth in Monash. "Every single job we support makes a huge difference in our local community, now and as we build our way out of the pandemic," Mr Broadbent said. "That is why we have moved quickly to approve funding to flow to 11 projects."Not only will this program support jobs, construction businesses and economic growth across Monash, it will also improve road safety and bolster the resilience of our local road networks, helping Australians get home sooner and safer.

"We will work closely with our local councils in Monash to ensure local projects get underway and start supporting jobs and businesses as soon as possible."

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development Barnaby Joyce said over 5,800 projects have already been approved under the program with around \$835 million paid to councils across Australia.

"This funding will result in some much wanted facilities and infrastructure in our community, which will have flow-on effects for local companies and suppliers," the Deputy Prime Minister said.

"We know how important our support is to communities who have faced the combined effects of drought, bushfires and COVID-19, which is why the construction of new infrastructure will help support the community recover from their economic hardships.

"These projects are driving new money back into the local economy in Gippsland and creating jobs at a time when we need it most – it's a real win-win."

In June 2021, the Federal Liberal and Nationals Government also pre-paid \$1.3 billion of this year's Financial Assistance Grant to provide untied funding for all local councils across Australia to spend on local priorities.

Proposed NDIS legislative improvements and the Participant Service Guarantee

The consultation will last for a four week period. It is now open and will close at midnight on 7 October 2021. The questions ask for views on whether the legislation aligns correctly with the 2019 NDIS Act review recommendations, if they clearly reflect the Government's intent, and if there are unintended consequences to any of the legislative changes. We are interested to hear you views and considerations.

We appreciate people with disability, their families and carers, and the broader community will have an interest in this process – and the intent of these changes is to make the NDIS better for them. But we also understand that not everyone may be familiar with legislation.

We encourage people with disability and their families and carers to work with advocates or other services if they wish to comment so they can best understand what the legislation does and what the changes mean. You can make a submission through the submission form.

Smart Farms Small Grants boost for Monash soil

Monash organisations and individuals can apply for grants of up to \$250,000 over two years. Two-year Soil Extension Activities to improve understanding of Australia's soil condition and how to better manage it. Grants supporting outcomes under the Smart Farms Small Grants Program and the National Soil Strategy. Applications open 7 September 2021 and close 9pm AEDT 12 October 2021.Monash individuals and organisations can apply for a share of \$13 million in Australian Government Smart Farms Small Grants funding for activities to assist farmers and land managers improve their understanding and management of their soil.

Minister for Agriculture and Northern Australia David Littleproud said the round provided an exciting opportunity for raising awareness and knowledge of our nation's soil.

"This round will continue to support the Smart Farms Small Grants Program outcomes while also supporting outcomes under the National Soil Strategy," Minister Littleproud said.

"We all know that healthy soil is the basis for great agricultural output as well as environmental benefits, so this final round of Smart Farms Small Grants is getting back to basics.

"Soil extension activities will take action to improve soil health with evidence-based interventions leading to improved soil management practices.

"If we get this right, our farmers and land managers will see increased productivity and profitability, which will help the entire agriculture sector reach its Ag2030 goal to grow agriculture to \$100 billion by 2030."

Member for Monash Russell Broadbent said the final round of Smart Farms Small Grants would fund a diverse range of soil extension activities across Australia.

"These grants will promote knowledge and awareness of soil and lead to better soil management practices for our local farmers and land managers at the grass roots level," Mr Broadbent said. "This will also deliver benefits for our communities and natural recovered in Manageh. Detter soil

"This will also deliver benefits for our communities and natural resources in Monash. Better soil management will deliver productivity benefits to our farmers and land managers and help to improve our air and water quality."

Under this round, multiple activities may be applied for in the one application. Grants are available for between \$100,000 to \$250,000 per activity and will be delivered over two years.

Applicants may apply for a maximum of \$2 million per application.

Eligible activities could include engaging a soil extension officer; conducting soil management workshops, seminars, roadshows or field days; creating communications products, webinars or online materials; and/or establishing trials, demonstrations and monitoring sites.

Extension Activities will seek to improve soil management, improving productivity and profitability. These measures will also support and complement the two-year National Soil Monitoring and Incentives Pilot Program which forms part of the National Soil Strategy.

Fast Facts:

The Smart Farms program is the key agriculture portfolio initiative under phase two of the \$1.1 billion National Landcare Program.

To date, Smart Farms Small Grants has funded a total of 384 projects to the value of \$25.5 million. The National Soil Strategy sets out how Australia will value, manage and improve its soil for the next 20 years.

More than \$54 million will be available under National Soil Monitoring and Incentives Pilot Program to encourage farmers and land managers to undertake more comprehensive soil testing in exchange for sharing their data with the program.

GARFIELD COMMUNITY GARDEN

October is the mid-spring period, flowers bloom in abundance, the warmer weather with rain bringing ideal conditions for lush plant growth. The cold weather hasn't quite finished yet, cold nights and even frosts can still be expected, along with strong winds, so it's important to protect tender plants and seedlings.

Things to Do This Month:

- Plant evergreen shrubs and trees (this includes citrus trees).
- Relocate evergreen shrubs they can now regrow their roots during the mild weather.
- Set up windbreaks (e.g. plastic tree guards) to protect newly planted evergreen trees and shrubs.
- Plant potted fruit trees and vines (having roots, can be planted anytime, best in spring & autumn).
- Relocate any self-seeded annuals to better locations in the garden.
- Tidy up overgrown plants and tie growing vines back to supports or wires.
- Continue propagating plants by taking cuttings or layering (both ground layering and air layering).
- Feed brambleberries (raspberries, blackberries & hybrids) and currants.
- Last chance to remove dead winter growth, and to dig up and divide perennial plants
- Clean out ponds and water gardens, divide waterlilies, plant new aquatic plants.

TALKIN' ... FISHIN' Days of Old

When I was a kid in the 60's, I fondly remember family all day picnics, complete with a pit barbeque beside the rivers of the Wimmera regions, fishing both the Murray and Darling rivers including the anabranch backwaters for all varieties, the mighty Murray Cod, Perch, Redfin, Yellow belly, and Catfish, unfortunately that also included European Carp in its early stages of infesting the Australian waterways. The lessons learnt from my Father and Uncles taught me how to become an angler and to respect and care for the land and waters running through it. The Darling River in those days was slow and deep with roots below and therefore far too dangerous to swim in, we were always warned to keep away from the edge. Sadly it has been a trickle of its former self, not even capable of sustaining a Carp in places. Sad to see the old girl in such a poor state, a sustained recovery is hopeful.

My family elders told of days when the Cod were plentiful and sizes hard to believe, yabbies and whole rabbits used as bait. Shrimps caught in a grape 'dip tin' with sheep offcuts as bait, covered with a few small leafy gumtree branches, in only a short while hauled out of the water's edge with freshwater shrimp jumping all over the place, plenty for the days fishing.

Trolling a lure as we know it by now, was done in a row boat with a small or large bladed Cod spinner, attached to cord, with red wool or feathers attached to give added attraction (see photos). The large spinner has red felt over the hooks, my Dad told me, his father, (my Grandfather) cut and tore it from the inside door trim of his Model T ford, obviously a dedicated fisherman! The head of the lure was decorated with white chook feathers at some stage. Another popular lure was the soft plastic body 'the Flopy' with an adjustable front bib, manufactured by 'Rublex' a French owned company that in the late 1950's and into the 1980's.produced high quality lures including the legendary soft plastic.



Take a close look at the 'fishing trip' photo which is from 1944, on the Darling River, well before photo-shop. A Murray Cod is hanging slightly behind and alongside my Father as an 8 year old, it's as big as him! These monsters have made a slow and steady recovery over the last 2 decades, but interference of Australian rivers natural flows could see their numbers disappear again. I hope to never see this again and retain my memories of 'Old' instead.


residential homes and sheds

The program will also remove hazards such as dangerous materials or trees, that pose a threat to property or work crews, as well as any vehicles that were damaged beyond repair. This program is voluntary, free of charge and open to eligible property owners. We are partnering with Johns Lyng Group (JLG) to undertake the clean-up. Registration of trees that are still standing but have become hazardous. BRV is accepting registrations for the assessment of trees on residential property that are still standing and pose a risk to a place of residence or personal safety. Trees standing on private property that were made hazardous because of the June 2021 storms and are within falling distance of a structure or access to a structure can be professionally assessed and recommendations made for their treatment. If a hazardous tree is threatening your residence, it is essential that you have a safety plan in place. This safety plan should include alternative accommodation options if weather conditions worsen. If you need support to access alternative accommodation, call the Recovery Hotline on 1800 560 760 to speak to a dedicated local Recovery Support Worker who can assist. The closing date for the Storm and Flood Clean-up program is 31 October. Please spread the message far and wide to your communities. Registrations for the BRV Residential Storm and Flood Clean-up program will be closing from 11:59pm on Sunday 31 October 2021. Anyone impacted by the June storm and flood event with eligible properties should register soon to avoid missing out on clean-up assistance. The cut-off date is for new registrations only - it does not affect those who are already registered and are waiting for a call-back, site assessment or works to begin. is with so much detail and passion that you can be forgiven for thinking he octually witnessed it.

Joson, of Winnindoo, in Victoria's East Gippsland, spends most of his spare time collecting bits and pieces from more than 200 aircraft discovered so for that crashed during training runs from East and West Sale during the war.

About 70,000 pilots and novigators from England trained in the area under the Empire Training Scheme. They, and it, played a big part in Britain's war effort.

But the area developed a deadly reputation.

Jason says the trainees feared Gippsland.

"They calle Valley," he said called it Death

"Gippsland lost more air-cruft during training flights in one month than were last in hostilities over New Guinea in one entire year of the war."

Many crashes were put down to bad weather and inexperience of the crews, but it was later discovered that ourcraft design faults were a major cause

It is from this groweyard for pilots and crews that Jason as collected the thousands of pieces of aircraft that he has meticulously cutalogued, identified and matched with official documents to gain a sense of the history of each plane and how it, and its crew, finally came to grief.

Officially, 165 lives were lost and nine people were injured in the area between 1939 and 1945.

The US has documents and other material relating to its own aircraft losses In Gippsland;

But Joson has come across wrecks for which there is no record and this leads him to believe many more losses were not officially documented.

He knows that in nearby mountain country are the

remains of planes and crew that have never been found and believes there are more than 400 wrecks in the Gippsland region. Some are in-

BEAUFORT – KILLER PLANE

The plane most feared and hated by pliots was the Beautort Bomber, which had a high casualty rate. Pilots and crew never knew if they would return from a simple training run in a Beaufort. Beaufort pilot G. N. Reeve escaped an accident without injury on September 6, 1943, only to be killed in a Beautort seven days later when it dived vertically into a swamp for no apparent. reason. An investigation into the crashes found there was an escape of carbon monoxide gas from the exhaust system into the cabin of the aircraft.

A telephone call from a former with "something" in his puddock is all it takes to send Juson off in his use and trailer to investigate. He usually comes away

with something worthwhile for his collection.

His big project of present is the restoration of an Avro Anson. The Anson, much used during the war, was flown in armed coastal patrols, as a trainer and as a light transport.



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

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
