
On Saturday 7th September 2019, 600 Firefighters including 2 from Bunyip CFA, Lieutenants • Steve Munday and Casey Hill, participated in the fight depression, PTSI and suicide by climbing the 28 floors of Crown Metropol Hotel wearing 25kgs of turnout gear and breathing apparatus.

Over 3 million Australians are living with depression and anxiety

- 1 in 4 Australians will suffer from a mental illness in their lifetime
- Suicide is the leading cause of death for Australians aged between 15 and 44
- Over 3,000 Australians die by suicide every year, an average of eight lives lost every day.
- 10% of our Emergency Services Members suffer from PTSI

Both members typify what we as volunteers do, we help others, despite the hurdles we come across, raising funds to help others. Steve completed the 28 floors in just over 5 minutes with Casey completing the climb a minute later.

Applications are currently open for Cardinia Shire Council's 2019–20 Beautification Grant program.


The program provides community groups and individuals with funds for landscape enhancement projects on areas of public open space. It provides funding on a dollar-for-dollar basis with a maximum of \$2,000 per grant.


The funding may be used to cover the purchase of plant material, stakes, tree guards and mulch. Other landscaping materials such as street and park furniture are a lower priority.

Projects must be located within Cardinia Shire and finished by 30 June 2020. When the project is complete, grant recipients need to submit a project completion form, receipts for the materials used, and photos of the project.

Priority is given to projects that:

- involve community groups
- are in areas used frequently by the public, such as town centres,





improve the appearance of green, public open spaces

are in line with priorities identified in township strategies, landscape master plans and other strategic Council documents.

The program does not fund grants for projects requiring a vegetation removal permit, where funds may be obtained from other sources or on land that is not managed by Council.

Bill's Movies Entertain - 13 Years **By Roman Kulkewycz**

I turn left off the sealed Tonimbuk Road in Bunyip North into Michell Road which is a an unsealed, narrow corrugated track with lots of pot holes strewn along it's surface. As I drive towards Bill and Kay Pearson's property, there on either side of the road is afternoon tea ready. the stark reminder of the grim, life threatening situation of the bushfire that ravaged this area 6 months earlier leaving burnt and badly charred trees, now standing as an eerie witness echoing their silent scream of what could have been.

Although the Pearson property stands in a cleared area, nearby it is surrounded by tall burnt and some dead eucalypts. Bill looks skywards and says that it was the Water Bombers that saved the property and he is eternally grateful for their swift actions. I've come to talk with the Pearsons about "Bill's Movies", an activity that the couple has been providing to locals and aged care facilities for the past 13 years. It all started after they built their house and shed 16 years ago. The shed was fully lined and Bill knew that it was too good to park machinery and store tools in. It was converted into a games room. Bill had a 10 year working association with The Regent Theatre in Yarram and so developed a love for movies. He decided to turn the games room into a theatre and invite locals and groups to enjoy "free movies". Bill is a people person. The former Cardinia Shire mayor has been helping others for many years. He was involved with Hillview as its CEO when it opened, was a board member of the original Bunyip Medical Clinic and is currently heavily involved with the protest against Hanson's quarry from going ahead.

When locals come to the morning movie sessions, the Pearsons provide a light lunch for the patrons. The afternoon sessions are reserved for the three aged care hostels and following the movie they are provided with a delicious afternoon tea – all for free! Currently Hillview aged care from Bunyip and two hostels from Drouin are regular visitors as well as a local group from the Bunyip community. Today is of special significance as to mark the "movies" 13th anniversary, the residents from Lyrebird hostel in Drouin have been invited to attend. Lyrebird was the first hostel to come to Bill's Movies 13 years ago.

They arrive by mini bus, are welcomed by Bill and Kay and escorted to their seats in the theatre. Once all are comfortably settled, Kay does the rounds,

handing out liquorice allsorts. Bill then introduces the movie for the afternoon. Today the movie is "Father of the Bride", a 1950 classic starring Spencer Tracy, Joan Bennett and Elizabeth Taylor. The lights are dimmed and the movie begins.

Bill leaves the Lyrebird residents to the care of their carer and goes into the house to help Kay get the

Planning for the big trip – part 2

Last month I wrote about some of the preparations you'd need to look at if you were considering a longer trip into central Australia. Personally, I'll be doing a 2 week trip north soon into some of the outback tracks of NSW, Sth Australia, ...places like Cameron's Corner, Innamincka, Birdsville and the fabulous Flinders Ranges on my trusty KTM 990 AdventureR and my mate Tim will be aboard his Honda Africa Twin... two purpose-built bikes for a trip like this.

For the 5,000km trip, and with a large part of it being on gravel/dirt/sand I covered things like carrying fuel, balanced packing, tyre selection, rim locks, a little on tools and spares, centre of gravity and weight distribution in last month's part 1 article. In this month's article I'll take a look at some of the practicalities of camping when riding through our magnificent outback country. One of my main objectives is to keep the weight as low as possible, so after fuel, water and spares/tools, your tent, sleeping bag and clothing are the heaviest and bulkiest items. Forget about swags...too heavy and bulky. I use a compact single man tent which has one flexible pole, weighs hardly anything and takes about 5 minutes to put up. I carry a small tarp for under the tent, and a thin self-inflating mattress. At night I'll bring my riding gear in for warmth and keep my boots outside under the fly, but with my socks stretched over the top – to air them out and keep critters from climbing in. Keep the clothing to a minimum - literally the bare essentials. I consider these trips to be 'low hygiene holidays' meaning I wear what I bring until it almost stands on its own, and I don't bring extra t-shirts or my good jeans for just-in-case. Most places we go to don't have a dress code and besides you'll eventually hit a town or roadhouse with some kind of clothes



The trick is to keep your food and cooking utensils basic, compact and light. You can pick up some of those fancy dehydrated meals which will set you back upwards of \$20 per meal, but I find simple 2-minute noodles, oats for breaky and various energy or muesli bars are enough to keep the energy levels reasonable without over packing. We generally light a small campfire (take firelighters) but also carry a small butane gas cannister and folding burner attachment. We also carry a small lightweight aluminium pot, small plate and a tin cup each. There are some pretty neat sets that fold into one another – well worth checking out.

Above all else, check your planned route and ensure you can carry more than enough fuel for the trip and plenty of water. You can go without food for quite a while if necessary but depending on the time of year that you're travelling, the heat will get you if you don't carry ample water! Especially riding in sand, so be careful.



Cardinia Shire Council arranges new recycling contract

Cardinia Shire Council has entered into a short-term arrangement with recycling processor, Polytrade Recycling, to accept and process a proportion of the shire's kerbside recycling collections.


Despite the limited capacity in the industry, which has made it particularly challenging to find an alternative recycling processor, Polytrade has confirmed it has capacity to accept a significant proportion of the recyclable materials collected from Cardinia Shire.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Cr Graeme Moore said the short -term agreement means a significant amount of Cardinia Shire's recyclable items will once again be recycled instead of going to landfill.

"We acknowledge this isn't an ideal situation, but this new contract will ensure that as much of our kerbside recyclables as possible will once again be diverted from landfill.

"We remain absolutely committed to finding a sustainable, long-term solution for the management of recycling for our community," Cr Moore said. "Polytrade will also be working towards upgrading its facilities to accept the remaining recycling collected from Cardinia Shire Council in the near future. "Thank you once again to everyone for your

understanding and patience while we worked to find alternative arrangements and to limit the amount of recyclables going to landfill."



• Your collection days remain the same. Soft plastics (e.g. plastic bags, wrappers, bread bags, etc.) will not be accepted. Soft plastics can be recycled through REDcycle at Coles and Woolworths supermarkets.







Swivels and Snaps are of a great assistance for changing lures regularly without having to tie knots repeatedly, the smaller they are the better they work, but harder to see what you're doing especially in poor light conditions, mini LED torches are a great help.

Sometimes the weight of a snap can upset the critical balance of a lure, even removing the split rings can have the same effect, so test the swim first and use the lightest or smallest method you can to suit your purpose. Should you not wish to use a snap or snap+swivel then the alternative is directly tying onto the lure by the line. But be sure to use a knotted loop (surgeon's knot) to the towing point at the nose making it finish as close to the lure as possible, so as not to foul up with the swinging treble hooks. The loop allows free movement and action in the lure, changing lures can be time consuming though, so pick a good one first up! But some lures require this line to lure method to retain their unique swim characteristic, especially those with erratic movements. Storing all your lures can be a problem in one small carry tackle box, as the trebles tend to snag each other like a

'barrel of monkeys', to solve this I use very small bands called 'Loom Bands' a children's craft item. Seems like

they are made of a silicone compound which would explain why they last so long, not like normal rubber bands that deteriorate. Simply hookup the tail trebles first, then stretch the band over to the front bib, position the centre body

trebles under the 'V'. Easy to remove and replace, and

keeps the tackle box neat and 'almost' tangle free, certainly better, for sure. Keep spare bands in there too.





Dogs on moving vehicles

When travelling with dogs it is the owner or custodian's duty to ensure the animal is transported appropriately and provided with its essential needs, including food, water, protection from heat or cold and a safe position on the vehicle.

What are the legal obligations of travelling with dogs in cars?

It is illegal to put dogs in the boot of a sedan type car. Dogs can travel in the cabin of the car or behind a cargo barrier in the back of wagon / SUV type vehicles. If on the back of a ute or trailer they must be appropriately tethered or caged.

When travelling, dogs must be provided with adequate ventilation. Containers must have multiple ventilation holes on at least three sides of the container.

Can dogs suffer from heat stress?



Yes, dogs in vehicles and on the back of vehicles can suffer from heat stress and exhaustion during the warmer months of the year. Dogs can dehydrate or even die from heat stress. The interior of vehicles can heat up quickly causing heat stress and potential death to dogs. Dogs must not be left unattended in cars, even with the windows open.

Dogs on utes need extra care in the hot weather. If using a metal cage to transport dogs, ensure it has a roof to provide shade, and that the sides are well ventilated (e.g. meshed rather than solid material). It is also advisable to cover metal floors of cages (and if tethering, the tray floor) with a surface such as rubber, as metal can heat up quickly and burn dogs' paws. In addition, ensure the cage is the right size to prevent cramping and overcrowding. And of course, when stationary, the vehicle should be parked in the shade, dogs should not be left in the cabin of the ute, and they should be left with water.

Travelling with dogs on the back of vehicles

The law in Victoria requires that dogs on utes are restrained either via a tether or cage, so that the dog cannot fall off or be injured when the vehicle moves. The only exception is for dogs that are actively working livestock.

What are the dangers of travelling with dogs on

utes? Many dogs nation-wide are killed or injured from travelling on the back of open and moving vehicles each year. Common causes of injury are:

dogs falling off the back of the vehicle whilst it is moving

- dogs being struck by oncoming or passing vehicles
- dogs being dragged alongside moving vehicles
- dogs attempting to jump from moving vehicles.

How can these dangers be prevented?

If a lead or chain is used to secure a dog, it must be long enough to allow the dog to sit and lie down but short enough to ensure the dog can not reach the sides of the vehicle, get onto the cabin or harass passers-by when the vehicle is parked. Long tethers can be more dangerous than none at all; if the dog does fall off the vehicle it may be dragged or strangled. It is also important to use swivels to attach the tether to both the vehicle and the dog's collar to prevent the chain from tangling. Never use twine, thin rope or similar materials as these can cause injuries if the dog becomes tangled in the tether.

If using a cage, maximise the dog's safety and comfort by ensuring the cage is the right size to prevent cramping and overcrowding, well covered to provide shelter from sun, wind and rain and placed directly behind the cabin to minimise exposure to dust and wind.

Travelling safely with dogs inside vehicles



For best practice, it is recommended that dogs travel in the cabin of the vehicle and are kept either on the backseat in a restraining device or in the open cargo area of a wagon type vehicle behind a cargo barrier.

Dogs need to be adequately restrained when travelling inside a vehicle for the safety of both the dog and human passengers. Unrestrained dogs can cause accidents and should never be allowed in the vicinity of the driver. In the case of an accident, an unrestrained dog may become a projectile and can damage itself and / or the occupants of the vehicle.

Dogs should not be allowed to travel with their head out of the car window; particles of dirt can enter a dog's eyes, ears and nose, causing injury or infection.

If going on a long trip carry dog food, water and a leash and stop regularly to allow the dog some exercise and a toilet break.

Remember, if you love your dog look after it and restrain it when travelling!

Local police update

(24th June to 26th August, 2019)

By Danny Hower, Victoria Police Sergeant Hello.

Sorry for the lack of newsletter contribution this year – it's been a busy one.

It is great working with and knowing some of the many groups, volunteers and contributors in our local communities who do so many unrecognised things in different areas. It helps keep our world running smoothly and safely, and we would be in real trouble without them. They're worth being a part of if you can find the time and opportunity.

Congratulations to all netball & football clubs in the local area for getting at least one of each club's teams into the finals, and for a generally police incident free season so far. The result of a lot of hard work from everyone involved, including the players.

Some of the things we've been involved in or had reported to us locally in the past two months were: Thirty three people & vehicles being field contacted for suspicious behaviour; nine in Bunyip State Park/ Tonimbuk; five in Tynong Nth; four each in Garfield Nth, Nar Nar Goon & Longwarry; three each in Garfield & Bunyip; and one in Maryknoll.

Thirteen people going to court for criminal or traffic matters and eleven traffic infringements notices (fines) issued.

Twelve requests for counselling & assistance from other professional agencies.

Eleven Family Violence Intervention orders and six summonses being served.

Nine people arrested with six of them having outstanding warrants.

Seven Family Incident reports; two in Nar Nar Goon; one each in Tynong Nth, Bunyip Nth, Maryknoll, Cora Lynn & Vervale.

Seven firearms being seized and two firearms licences suspended.

Six motor vehicle collisions involving eleven vehicles, human error, and thirteen people in total getting injured.

Four people interviewed for court drivers licence restorations and one more having their licence reviewed medically due to a collision.

One Liquor Licence application processed.

A search warrant conducted at a Bayles house and two people arrested in relation to fraud and identity theft. Ongoing investigations with Parks Victoria into identified vehicles and people entering the Bunyip State Park illegally and damaging or/and stealing property.

Some other things involved: Burglaries and thefts of tools, cash, alcohol & equipment, as well as damage; at sporting clubs in Garfield, Bunyip and Tynong; farm and residential sheds in Nar Nar Goon x 3, Garfield Nth x 2, & one each at Tynong Nth, Cora Lynn & Bunyip; and two houses burgled - one each in Nar Nar Goon and Bunyip.

A 30 yr old Garfield man having his car impounded & licence suspended as a result of breath test issues. A 20 yr old Garfield man being remanded in custody in relation to numerous burglaries and thefts throughout local and wider areas (again), as well as colliding into a police car in a stolen car from a Tynong Nth burglary. A 24 yr old Pakenham man remanded, his mother's car seized, and him being charged with numerous thefts (two previously reported in Tynong Nth) as well as serious driving offences after a very dangerous evading police episode involving most police tactical devices. An unlicensed 29 yr old Pakenham man temporarily evading police in Tonimbuk due to very suspicious behaviour - then colliding into the bush & being located with numerous unusual and possibly stolen items in his possession and in his body.

A severely drug affected 32 yr old Croydon man and 17 yr old Upp Beaconsfield girl being charged with drug & trespass offences in relation to a Bunyip State Pk incident.

A sad and unfortunate incident with a house fire. In stolen vehicle world locally we had:

A car stolen from Clyde burnt out in Cora Lynn; one from Gembrook burnt out near Bunyip State Pk; one from Wantirna burnt out in Tynong Nth; one from place unknown burnt out in Maryknoll; & one stolen from a burglary in Somerville located in Bunyip - not burnt out?

We also had a stolen four wheel bike, trailer and stolen property located near Nar Nar Goon, as well as a stolen car from Ripplebrook being involved in thefts in Bunyip then being located in Catani with the stolen property. It sounds like the worlds out of control when you read this stuff, but most of the people involved are now getting closer to the right help than what they were before intervention, and we're pretty lucky and safe when you consider the spread of the area & time. Please keep up the contact with us. If you think you need immediate assistance please ring 000. Motion sickness

Motion sickness is a common condition that can affect people when travelling by any form of transport, including car, train, boat and plane.

Anyone can get motion sickness, but some people are affected more than others. Infants and toddlers tend to be resistant to motion sickness, while children aged around 2-12 years are most susceptible.

Symptoms of motion sickness

The amount of motion sickness experienced depends on the length of exposure to, and severity of, abnormal movement.

Symptoms include:

a feeling of uneasiness; sweating; nausea; vomiting; and dizziness.

Treatment

Certain techniques and medicines can be used to help prevent and treat motion sickness.

The following measures may help with motion sickness.

Eat a light snack before travelling. Avoid large, greasy or spicy meals and avoid alcohol. If possible, be the driver or sit in the front seat

when travelling by car. When travelling by bus, sit

as close to the front as possible. When travelling by train, choose a window seat facing forwards. If flying, sit over the front edge of the aeroplane wing - the ride tends to be less bumpy. A cabin at the front or middle of a ship, near the waterline, is best.

Try not to move your head around too much – it may help to use pillows or a headrest.

Look out the window and focus on the horizon or a distant stationary object. If you can't see outside, close your eyes.

Keep cool - open the window or use air conditioning.

Avoid reading while travelling.

Reclining in your seat or lying down can help.

Medicines

There are medicines available to help with motion sickness. Medicines should be taken before travelling, because they are more effective at preventing symptoms than treating symptoms after they have developed. Medicines used to treat motion sickness may cause drowsiness.

Available medicines include:

promethazine (e.g. Avomine, Allersoothe) - a type of antihistamine;

hyoscine hydrobromide (e.g. Kwells, Travacalm HO);

a combination medicine containing dimenhydrinate, hyoscine hydrobromide and caffeine (Travacalm Original).

You should always check with your doctor or pharmacist whether medicines are suitable for you or your child before taking them.


Rotary Club of Bunyip - Garfield
