#### To the Editor.

My wife and I have just returned home to Briagolong from a busy and enjoyable few days in the Tonimbuk area.

We were listening to Australia All Over 2 weeks ago when we heard a call to 'Macca' from Alan Blackwell, who is coordinating the daily tasks at the Tonimbuk Bushfire Relief Centre.

After calling Alan we decided to spend a few days camped at the Tonimbuk Hall in our caravan. The work that is going on in the area, both from this group of volunteers and also BlazeAid is truly wonderful.

Many of the community in the area that have been badly affected by the recent fires are just so appreciative of the efforts of everyone involved. The centre at Tonimbuk has been set up through the Cardinia Shire, and Lions Clubs, Red Cross, St Vinnies, Valley Counselling and several other organisations have representatives in the hall on a regular basis. In the few days we were there we were able to help with tasks from clearing nature strips, helping prepare meals and chain saw maintenance, to cutting Gordon and Julie Cowling fallen trees and splitting firewood, delivering dry

firewood and cleaning cabins in order to store donated furniture.

In some ways the several people who are supervising the different tasks feel that this particular fire has almost been forgotten. I am writing this in the hope that your organisation can give this valuable operation some much needed coverage. To put it simply, many more volunteers are needed for many different tasks which will be ongoing for many months yet.

We can vouch for the facilities as very suitable for staying in a caravan and volunteers will be made very welcome by the organising group. Morning tea, lunch and afternoon tea

are provided for affected residents and volunteers. As several local homes were completely destroyed in the fires an urgent call has been issued for the donation or loan of caravans as temporary accommodation for some of the local residents. Could you all please advertise this need in your respective media?

My wife and I were made very welcome by all at the relief centre, and we urge people who have a few free days to consider helping this devastated region. As already mentioned there is a massive amount of work needing to be done to enable the people affected by the 'Bunyip Complex' fires of early March to get their lives back on an almost even keel. I know that any publicity that your organisation can give the groups at the Tonimbuk Hall will be greatly appreciated, especially the plea for more volunteers, and for the loan, or donation, of caravans. # Antibiotics and children - from Bunyip Pharmacy

### What are antibiotics?

Antibiotics are compounds that are used to treat infections caused by bacteria and fungi. They are very useful medicines and have saved the lives of many children with serious illnesses such as meningitis, pneumonia and septicaemia ('blood poisoning'). Antibiotics can also be used to treat more common bacterial infections in children, including middle ear infections and skin infections.

### Bacteria and viruses

Used correctly and when needed, antibiotics are among the most valuable medicines we have.

But only bacterial and fungal infections can be treated with antibiotics. They have no effect on viruses. Many infections, such as simple colds and some stomach upsets causing diarrhoea, are caused by viruses and can be destroyed only by the body's own defence mechanisms.

In many cases it is not possible to determine if an infection is due to a bacteria or a virus. This is particularly so with infections of the upper respiratory tract. These infections, which cause sore throats, coughing, runny noses and ear aches, are very common. Most children, especially when they first start mixing with lots of other children, will get about 5 to 10 of these infections a year.

The decision to recommend an antibiotic in these circumstances will depend on many factors, including the length and severity of the illness and the presence of other complicating factors. Tests may be necessary to find out which germ is causing the infection. Antibiotics can only treat infections that are caused by bacteria – they have no effect on viral infections.

### Which antibiotic is the right one?

There is a range of different antibiotics for doctors to choose from. Some are only effective against particular bacteria, while others, known as 'broad spectrum antibiotics', will kill a wide variety of different bacteria. The aim of treatment is always to try and match the right antibiotic to the germ most likely to be causing the infection.

### Correct use of antibiotics

It is important to complete the entire course of antibiotics. Even though your child may seem better after 2 or 3 days, the bacteria may not have been completely eliminated and a further infection may develop a week or 2 later. Do not give one child's antibiotics to another with similar symptoms.

Always follow your doctor's instructions about how frequently to take the antibiotic and the number of days your child should take the antibiotic. If in doubt, check with your doctor or pharmacist.

### Why is it important to use antibiotics properly?

When antibiotics are overused or not used properly, bacterial infections become harder to treat because of antibiotic resistance. Antibiotic resistance is when bacteria evolve and change so that antibiotics that were previously used against that type of bacteria are no longer effective.

That's why it's so important that children and adults only take antibiotics that have been prescribed for them, and to finish the entire course of antibiotics.

## Side effects

No medicine can be guaranteed to be free from side effects, and antibiotics are no exception. However, when side effects do occur they are usually mild. Diarrhoea is the most common. True allergy to antibiotics is uncommon and usually shows up as a rash.

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### How Grand is the Ridge Road?

What is the connection between Star Wars and our very own Grand Ridge Road? Well let me elaborate... for those of you out there with a bent for Luke Skywalker, Princess Leia, Han Solo and the like would know of the master Jedi character Obi-Wan Kenobi, who was played by British actor Ewan McGregor....stay with me here...well back in 2004 Ewan teamed up with another actor mate called Charlie Borman and together they rode 20,000 miles around the world through places like Russia, Mongolia, Kazakhstan, Canada etc in a series called The Long Way Round. They rode a couple of wellsponsored, fully kitted BMW GS 1150's, through mountains, deserts, cities, marshes, and open plains, and many would argue that this documentary of their travels was the catalyst for the adventure riding genre as we know it today, at the very least it did no harm for BMW bike sales world-wide!

With that backstory, the popularity of dual-sport bikes and adventure riding has justifiably boomed in the years since with most motorcycle manufacturers throwing their hat into the ring with at least some kind of 'go-anywhere' bike for us Jedi-knight wannabe's to ponder. And for those of us who are fortunate enough to own one of these 'go anywhere, do anything' bikes, regardless of the make...a great road to try your hand is our very own Grand Ridge Road which meanders through the hills south-east of AdventureR, there was Steve on a BMW GS 1200, Paul on a Triumph Tiger and Wayne on a Suzuki V-Strom....a good selection of manufacturers and machines.

After a few kilometres of gravel, you take a right and you're back on the sealed stuff. This'll take you through the hills and along the ridges all the way to Mirboo North – a great opportunity for both man and machine to fuel up before tackling the next stage of the GRR (man fuel suggestion: Grand Ridge Brewery!). The road is generally very well sign posted (follow road 93) but a GPS is always handy as it does take a couple of unexpected turns here and there. Leaving Mirboo Nth follow highway C457 until you get to Boolarra South where you take a right into GRR, C458. This'll then take you into Strzelecki State Forest and in amongst some brilliant bush roads. Keep an eye out for wallabies and lyre birds. After meandering further South, the GGR turns east again for quite a few km's, and again starts drifting N-NE for a while.

To follow it to the end point will take the best part of the day and takes you as far as the Hyland Hwy intersection, well SE of Loy Yang, so rather than taking a right at English Corner, I like to continue on Budgeree Rd and loop back around to Mirboo Nth again via Budgeree and Boolarra.

Either way, it's not a cross-continental adventure tour, but this road offers us weekend warriors a great variety of road surfaces and riding conditions, not to mention some magnificent scenery along the way... not a bad local option!

# Bunyip Fire Brigade Ready to serve

As part of the Safer Together Program, Local governments, the Country Fire Authority (CFA), and Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) are working together with communities to develop fuel management strategies that will guide bushfire management on both public and private land.

By September 2019, the following strategies will be produced as part of the Safer Together Project:

- · Private Land Vegetation Management Strategy
- Public Land Fire Ecology Strategy
- Roadside Vegetation Strategy
- · Suppression Strategy (case study)

Vegetation on private land carries a considerable proportion of bushfire risk in Metropolitan region. For the purposes of bushfire management planning, private land includes council managed and owned land. In this stage of consultation, DELWP are seeking your communities feedback on Priority Fuel Management Areas (PFMAs) for the Private Land Vegetation Management Strategy. This will be open until June 24<sup>th</sup>.

Your thoughts and ideas are valued and your assistance in shaping this plan will help us shape a safer community.

music and singing for many years. He has produced many first time I was paid for a gig. I should have framed recordings for budding artists as well as a number of Australian icons. He has also produced many short films. He lives and breathes music and his passion is to pass on his skills to other performers......

From the moment I meet and am greeted by Peter Donelly in his Tynong recording studio, his passion and love of music is instantly evident the moment he sits down at the piano. Peter didn't have formal music lessons, yet his fingers tickle the ivories like a Maestro. I sit quietly as I watch Peter work to produce a CD for his friend Mark, singing a Beatles number. There are many stop and retakes until Peter is completely satisfied with the quality of each step. His keen ear picks up little mistakes and he re - records them until satisfied.

Peter grew up in Doncaster, the youngest of seven boys. "My second eldest brother Rob, a carpenter built a soundproof room in the cellar for his drums. After he moved out of home my mother bought a piano and moved it down there. My friends and I would always visit the room known as the "drum room" and we'd all take turns on the piano. I was never taught the piano, just read books and learned from friends. I was also inspired by Steve, the middle brother, who played "bop in the blues" almost continuously on that piano. I remember dancing in the driveway to his playing. My first experience on stage was at blues jams around Melbourne in the 80's. Nervous as hell, but soon gained confidence to eventually run blues jams myself."

Music guru Peter Donelly of Tynong has been teaching "Soon I was invited to join bands. I'll never forget the that \$50, but instead spent it on booze. From there I played in many cover bands, wrote my own music with original bands, produced my own music videos, and produced videos for other artists. I play Piano, guitar, harmonica, bass and sing. Singing has always been my greatest joy. Not being a natural singer, I have struggled and still do, but playing a ballad, or boogie, on the piano and pitching good notes to compliment is a unique experience.

# Bunyip – Garfield

The Rotary Club of Bunyip Grafield recently held its 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Say NO to BULLYING Day with 150 Year 5 students from 7 local primary schools.

#### Why do we do it?

The national definition of bullying for Australian schools defines bullying as an ongoing misuse of power in relationships through repeated verbal, physical and/or social behaviour that causes physical and/or psychological harm

(Dept. of Education, 2015).

Bullying has been found to adversely impact both bullies and victims. Bullies, for example, are at higher risk of substance abuse, depression, anxiety and hostility than non-bullies. For bullying victims, being targeted can result in increased suicide risk, depression, poor school performance and physical health, and low self-esteem.

Roughly 1 in 4 students (27%) have reported being bullied, from primary to high school.

- Hurtful teasing was reported as the most common bullying behaviour, closely followed by lies.

- Bullying was more common for Year 5 students (32%) and Year 8 (29%).

- Bullying by females tended to be more covert, while males were more "in your face" about it.

- Peers are present in 87% of bullying interactions, mostly as onlookers who do nothing to help the victim.

### "Ladies of the Swamp. "

We went up to Tonimbuk to drop off the Quilts made by The Ladies of The Swamp. "We were blown away by the destruction. 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# Have you made your Will?

Having a Will is one of the most important things you can do for yourself and your family. It legally protects your spouse, children, and assets, and it also indicates exactly how you would like your estate handled after you have passed on.

A Will is a legally binding document that lets you determine how you would like your estate to be handled and how assets within an estate are to be distributed upon your death. It might also include your wishes as to who you want to care for your young children after you die and your burial wishes.

Everyone should have a Will. If you do not have one, the assets within your estate may not go to the people you want them to, and there is no guarantee your intended desires will be carried out. Having a Will also minimizes any family fights about your estate that may arise. In essence, a Will allows you to decide how your estate will be distributed and importantly, to whom.

A Will provides opportunities to make critical decisions about who should take care of your young children should the need arise. Without a Will, the Court will take it upon itself to choose among family members or a stateappointed guardian. Having a Will means that you can appoint the person you want to raise your children, or better, make sure it is not someone you do not want to raise your children.

To be eligible to make a Will, you need to be at least 18 years of age and be able to understand what you are doing. This is known as having *testamentary capacity*. Have a think about these questions before you make a Will: Do you need help making your Will? What assets do you own? Who will be your executor/s? Who you want to leave your assets to? If you have young children, who will be their guardian?

# I Meet My Movie Hero

I remember as a young boy as I was just starting to learn and improve my English (not able to speak English when I first started school ) my school mates and I loved to go to the Maffra Picture Theatre whenever Westerns were showing starring either Randolph Scott or Rory Calhoun. We would go every time their movies were screening. They were our heroes. We loved them! Personally Rory Calhoun was my favourite. As we grew up and left school, our interests changed if you know what I mean, but I never forgot those early days of my youth when I would try and emulate my hero, Rory.

Many years later when I was working as a nurse at the Maffra District Hospital, to which a nursing home was attached, a tall dark man with blue eyes and a woman came into the hospital to visit an older couple in the nursing home.



You could have knocked me down with a feather – the male visitor was Rory Calhoun from Hollywood. I was flabbergasted ! Not THE Rory Calhoun who was my hero? Yes it was! It turned out that he had married a local girl ( Sue Rhodes ) whose family lived in Boisdale, near Maffra and her parents were residents of the aged care wing of the Maffra hospital. Over time the visits that they made to Sue's parents; about 4 times each year and coming to Australia for weddings and other family celebrations, I was able to befriend Rory and spent time talking with hm. I asked him things like, what was Marylin Monroe like ( he starred in a film with her – "River of No Return" ), Burt Lancaster, Cary Grant and many others. I was fascinated to be talking to someone who knew all of these Hollywood stars personally and had interaction with them. Asking him what they were really like just was so fascinating. I sat in awe listening to him talk about these famous Hollywood

actors in such a matter of fact way. Rory's last TV series was called "The Texan I was given two pairs of the cowboy boots he wore in that series, a brown pair and a black pair. They have never been worn by anyone else. I kept a pair for myself and I



gave the other pair to Bill Pearson of Tonimbuk which hold pride of place in his home theatre. Bill, like me is a Rory Calhoun fan through and through. I also have a cowboy shirt in my collection that he wore in another movie. He gave me the Key to Santa Cruz ( California ) which he was presented with. I was invited to his 70th birthday celebration in America where he was going to introduce me to some of his Hollywood buddies – unfortunately I was not able to go. I still to this day regret my decision not to go.

The last time I saw Rory, he was suffering from incurable throat cancer, which he succumbed to in April, 1999.

In his heyday, Rory was one of Hollywood's most popular actors. He starred in over 80 films and 1,000 television episodes. His life was full and varied and he was loved by millions of movie fans all over the world. I cherish the memorabilia that he gave to me.

# TALKIN'...FISHIN' .....A Time to rest

A tear was shed today, the end of the trout season has come again, a 3 month pause to allow the breeding cycle to go on uninterrupted until the next grand opening awaits all of us that love our trout fishing. So let's use our time well, clean, check, repair and prepare all the gear, then pack away in readiness for that first exciting opening day for the new season around Father's Day weekend.

The only thing I won't miss is the long drives, the average round trip for a day on the river is 300-350klms, 3 Hrs travelling time. Can do without that for a while anyway! These days it's usually Gentleman's hrs that we keep, along with a coffee break with a pie or cake to sustain us through the day. I've never caught a fish right after parking on the river, so I might as well trade it for coffee time, and my fishing buddy voted No.1 for that too. For the wives in our life, that was a vegetarian pie and a carrot cake, with a skinny milk latte. For our mates...





Marysville was our latest location, trying a few new spots gives you a little more enthusiasm than just going to the same spot all the time. However it pays to note, consulting a detailed map will prevent you walking into impassable waterways and private lands. Usually a

couple of trips will enlighten you of the best trails to take no matter what the water levels are, as we will also need another few trips to work that out too. Asking the farmer for access to his land got us a very friendly response, much better than if you just assume that it's your given right to climb his fences and park in front of gates, be sensible and courteous, it goes a lot further to being tolerated other than being just another trespasser.

The water levels on the day were perfect really, nice and clear but moving fast, Fly's drag across the surface quickly and lures come to the surface too. Weighting both will assist with the problem but careful choice of tackle and fine tuning leader lengths and lure bibs to set the swimming depth, minimising hook-ups with snags rather than fish.

While I choose to fish the 'Fly' my mate prefers a 'Lure', and at 10x the price of a fly I'll stick with fur and feather, they are really good value. Debate continues as to which out-fishes the other or is more successful but I believe both are just as effective as each other, but either will perform better on the day given the right weather conditions and trouts feeding patterns.

The choice now I need to make is do I target the winter whiting or salmon from the surf, tough decisions have to be made... So until the season opens again .....

# **Tonimbuk Bushfire Recovery Group**

The Bunyip Complex Bushfire Area is only 8 kilometres north of the Princes Freeway at Bunyip. Not far to go if you want to help. Very close, in fact, at the speed a bush fire can travel. It could be any one of us impacted, at any time.

Since early March, the Bushfire Recovery Centre at the Tonimbuk Hall has daily supported the communities that lost 30 homes, that had over 300 properties impacted. The Recovery Centre, a project of the Cranbourne Lions Club Internet Branch, set up at the request of community by Alan Blackwell, is a joint effort by Lions Clubs International, St Vincent De Paul, Pakenham Rotary and Cardinia Shire Council. Beginning in early March, this group has been supporting the devastated communities in their recovery from loss of homes, businesses and property. But also, from the experience of fighting fire, evacuation and a total upheaval of their lives. It is expected the Recovery Centre will be open for at least 12 months. The Lions Clubs of SE Victoria have provided a Tool Library for Residents and Volunteers to use in the recovery and there are three shipping containers on site for donations. Five Metal Bins have been set up at the Tonimbuk Hall and various sites in the area to collect burnt fencing and other metals. We also have a Lions funded Portable Building on site, used for the Recovery. Lions have provided security and volunteer insurance.

These are strong communities who have worked together since the fires and helped each other. They have no expectations and are very grateful for anything they receive, whether it is physical help, vouchers or just a chance to talk. We are asking for help on their behalf.

We need **VOLUNTEERS** to help in all areas. Catering, Admin, Clean-up of Properties, House Cleaning, Gutter Cleaning and Garden Resurrection. All individual volunteers are well supported with a strong OH&S plan and Insurance. Lunch and refreshments are provided.

We need **Donations** of Fuel Cards and Services such as Carpet and Curtain Cleaning, Plumbing, Electrical, Roof Cleaning, Cleaning products, Tools and the list goes on.

There are so many ways they have made the seeds appeal for people. They even have yummy chocolate ones. We then went on to The Red Stag Deer and Emu Farm. As we walked into Restaurant we were blown away by the beautiful scenery of the surrounding mountains. After lunch the owner talked about how her parents started and then developed the business with family to what it is today. They produce Emu Oil and Creams for Health and Beauty. (Hope it works) The next morning the Wangaratta Lions Club cooked us a hearty breakfast of bacon and eggs before we headed to play Disc Golf at the sports centre. There was a lot competition and laughter along the way. As there was a free afternoon some went on the Silo Art Trail while others shopped and some had a good look around the area. The following day we left early to travel to Bonegilla Migrant Camp to learn about the significance the site played in creating multicultural Australia. They had been used by the army and was transformed into a migrant reception and training centre where the new arrivals lived until they found jobs and a place to call home. Some only stayed a short time while others were there a bit longer. We discovered that some of our own members came out with their parents when they were young so they could have a better life after the war and had stayed at the camp. The tour was very informative about the history of the camp and

there we went to Kangaroo Point that overlooks the just enjoy each other's company and relax before heading back.

The next day El Dorado was our destination to check out the town and it's history. We first looked at the Dredge which played a big part when the gold rush was on. All though the towns main gold extractions were through open cut method they found there was gold in the river flats but it was hard to get. So they decided to build the Dredge to extract the gold. It was the largest Dredge built and we found out that it was the largest in the Southern Hemisphere. So in 1936 production begin mining gold and tin until 1954. The others went to the El Dorado pottery to hear a talk by Howard about his work and how he mostly works in stoneware and he uses a variety of glazes The groups then swapped and then we went to Milawa Hotel for a late lunch. After another great day we headed back to the caravan park.

We have to thank our great cooks for the pancake breakfast on our last day. With the threat of much needed rain it was decided to have the school sports in the morning. Some were dressed in all kinds of gear ready to compete or perhaps cheat as we played lots of good old fashion games. Just before we were to leave to go to the Vine Hotel the heavens opened and it rained which was good for it was so dry up there.We haven't seen rain like that for a long time. The theme for the night was schoolies. There were school teachers/university graduates plus lots of school girls of all descriptions and lots of blonde wigs to be seen. Our resident Poet entertained us and the locals with some of his Aussie poetry before the special awards were handed out. # Local police update

### (26<sup>th</sup> February, 2019 to 26<sup>th</sup> May, 2019) By Danny Hower, Victoria Police Sergeant Hello,

Sorry for lack of newsletter contribution in the last few months – busy times with the bushfire recovery work as well as all the 'normal' police and community things.

A very personal and professional thank you to everyone from everywhere for their tireless, ongoing community and volunteer work. It has been emotionally amazing to be a part of it.

Some of the investigations and incidents we've been involved in or had reported to us locally in the past 3 months are:

Four separate people reported missing and later located.

Eight Family Incident reports; three each in Bunyip & Garfield, and two in Nar Nar Goon.

Thirteen Family Violence Intervention orders served; five in Garfield; three in Longwarry; two in Bunyip; one each Tynong, Tyn Nth & Iona.

Twenty five referrals for counselling &/or assistance from other agencies.

Twenty one people & vehicles field contacted for suspicious behaviour; six in Bunyip; five in Garfield; three in Tynong; two each in Tonimbuk, Tynong Nth & Longwarry; one in Nar Nar Goon Nth.

Fifteen motor vehicle collisions involving twenty four vehicles, two kangaroo's, and thirteen people going to hospital.

A report of damage to a sign in Tynong Nth.

Three reports of illegal shooting in Tonimbuk.

An assault in Tynong Nth involving people known to each other.

A workplace accident at a quarry.

Eight people arrested & charged with criminal offences.

Twelve people going to court for criminal or traffic matters and eighteen traffic infringements notices (fines) issued.

Theft of three motor vehicles; a car on the highway at Nar Nar Goon; a ute at a rural property in Vervale; and a Bobcat in Cora Lynn.

Four thefts of car number plates; two in Nar Nar Goon and one each in Tynong and Garfield. Theft of a fire pump in Garfield Nth; a chainsaw in Bunyip Nth; money in Bunyip; demolition saws in Nar Nar Goon and Nar Nar Goon Nth; a pushbike in Nar Nar Goon; ute tray sides in Bunyip.

Rural Burglaries/thefts; Power tools at Iona; a gunsafe, guns & ammo in Tynong Nth; chainsaw and 30 tools in Nar Nar Goon Nth; a telescope in Tonimbuk.

Five firearms storage inspections were conducted and three drivers licence restoration applications processed.

Four arrest warrants executed and eight court summonses served.

A bushfire and large scale ongoing recovery efforts. And in good news (for some) from the long term investigation circle:

A 42 yr old St Kilda woman was charged with serious driving offences after a collision in Bunyip.

A 34 yr old Hampton Park man was arrested in Pakenham and remanded in custody for a burglary & theft from the Bunyip Red Shed - as well as twelve other ram raid burglaries.

A 52 yr old Pakenham man was charged with sexual offences after exposing himself at a Princes Hwy rest area.

A 34 yr old Longwarry man was charged with burglary & theft from a local golf club and a motorised golf buggy was recovered.

A 29 yr old Warragul woman was charged with handling stolen goods and a 27 yr old Longwarry woman was charged with shop stealing.

A stolen car from Tynong Nth was recovered in Knox and a 44 yr old Mitcham man was charged with the theft.

Three Morwell men in their thirties were arrested for an armed robbery in Bunyip and serious driving offences after a pursuit and collision which ended with a car fire and two of them going to hospital. Two 19 yr olds from Moe were charged with 26 burglaries which occurred between Traralgon and Bunyip – and which included three Bunyip shops. A 36 yr old Pakenham man is wanted for two recent separate thefts in the Tynong Nth area after good investigative work by the victims.

A 33 yr old Garfield man & 36 yr old Aspendale woman were remanded in custody for trafficking drugs after a routine police intercept discovered a large quantity of methyl amphetamine in the car, in the body, & later in the house.

And a 36 yr old Moe man was charged with assaulting a 47 yr old associate at the Bunyip Rail Station.
