Excerpt from the Bunyip-Garfield Express 1918

The above giorious news was received in Bunyip on Monday night, and was announced from the platform of the local halt to a a crowded audience at the Y.M.C A. concert by Mr Harconn, and they rose and cheered loudly for several minutes. The National Anthem and Doxology were sung, and gratification was expressed at the joyful news.

After four years the "Mad Dog of Europe" has been beaten and brought to his kn es, and the terrible Hun has been disgraced throughout the civitised world owing to their abominable tactics and frightfulness in the prosecution of the war. The price of victory has been dearly won, as many thousands of our brave men have had to pay the supreme sacrifice in the struggle for liberty and the triumph of right over might.

When the news was prematurely announced on Friday last, the people of Bunyip, in common with other loyal citizens of the Commonwealth gave vent to their feelings in a spontaneous outburst of enthusiasm and delight. Flags were hoisted, residents and school children flocked into Main Street, carrying flags and cheering. Addresses were delivered by the Rev. Backholer, Messrs H. Rodger, Harrison. Botteril, Daniel and others, the National Anthem and patriotic songs rendered.

On Sunday united thanksgiving services were held at Bunyip, Longwarry and Garfield. and although the good news at this time had not been confirmed, the halls in these places were well filled with enthusiastic congregations.

At Bnnyip a combined choir led the singing, and Mrs a'Beckett played the organ. The Scripture lessons were read by Messrs Bell and Harcourt, and a fine address appropriate to the occasion was de livered by the Rev. W. Backholer.

In the Public Hall at Garfield a large congregation met to give thanks for recent victories. Mr A. McKenzie Harrison gave an address on the lessons learned during the war and how to apply them in times of peace. The order of service was thoroughly appreciated and heartily carried out. A similar service was conducted at Longwarry by Rev. Egan Lee.

(Similar services of thanksgiving will be held at these places on Sunday, Mr Harrison will give the address at Bunyip, Rev. Backholer at Longwarry and Rev Les at Garfield)

On Tuesday there was another scene of excitement in the streets. Some members of the brass band, with Mr Rosenbrock as drummer, men, women and children with tins, bells and anything that would make a noise played a variety of tunes and more speeches were delivered.

Cheers were given for King George, the Empire, the Allies, our boys, the women and children for the great part they played in the war

A procession was formed and the streets paraded, each shop being visited, stump speeches made and songs rendered, while the children were regaled with buns, cakes. Iollies biscuits and drinks by Messrs H. Rodger, Campbell, Flett, Holgates, Pearson and Mrs Sherriff.

In the afternoon the shops were closed, a picnic was held and an impromptu programme of events carried out proved most enjoyable, and the tea provided was much appreciated.

At a meeting of citizens held for the purpose of celebrating Peace. Cr Pearson was appointed chairman Mr Rosenbrock secretary, Messrs Rodger, Daniel, Ellis, Rev. Backsholer, Mesdames Pearson, Guiney, Lutman, Robotham, a'Beckett and Burns committee, and it has been decided to hold a monster celebration in the Bunyip show ground on Wednesday next, 20th inst.

It will commence with a citizens grand procession from the town at 2 p.m., and all who are able are asked to wear fancy dress. Prizes will be given for the best sustained characters.

At 2.30 a fancy dress cricket match (ladies and gentlemen) will be played, while there will be races for adults and children, also novelty events.

At 5.30 a tea will take place and all ladies are asked to provide a basket.

In the evening a monster bonfire will be lighted, a fireworks display, followed by a camp fire concert.

The day will be observed as a full holiday, there will be no charge for admission, and as there are no other district attractions, everybody should come.

A working bee will take place on Saturday afternoon, and any help then or on Wednesday morning at the ground will be welcomed.

The Garfield children paraded the streets with 50 kerosene tins, 2 drums, whistles and bells. They played in front of each shop, and L3 was. collected for a school flag. Messrs Chippendall and Gardner agreed to defray cost of flag, so the money collected will go towards entertaining children at the local Peace celebrations.

At a meeting held in Garfield on Tuesday it was decided to hold a monster picnic on Psace Day (when date is fixed), to be followed by bonfire and camp first concert. A souvenir, probably in the shape of a medallion, is to be given to each child.

This excerpt is from the Bunyip Garfield Express 15th November 1918 issue about WWI peace celebrations in Bunyip, Garfield and Longwarry.

Talkin' Fishin'... On the drift

This month I got to cross another adventure off the bucket list, courtesy of the Goulburn Valley Fly Fishing Centre at Alexandra in North East Victoria. I experienced fly fishing in a boat drifted down the Goulburn River.

A mate, Greg and I, relinquished our normal riverbank stalking methods to place ourselves in the capable hands of our fly fishing guide and oarsman "BO".

We cast our flies amongst structure and trees, to skilled instruction while he navigated the snags and rocks with the current and fast flow in sections. In between that, he still had time to remove and re-tie new flies on for us both.

Taking the greatest risk turned out not to be taking the journey in a drift boat down the rapid flow Goulburn River, but my fishing partner Greg telling his wife that he also booked in for the trip with me on their wedding anniversary. No life jacket will get you out of that much trouble! Apparently he has a new name... one that I can't even repeat in writing!

The plan we had was to learn a lot on the trip and enjoy and gain a different perspective of the Goulburn River system, our experienced hard working, knowledgeable and world travelled fly fishing guide Bo certainly ensured us of getting exactly that and more.

Whether the fast flow or our casting ability wasn't up to scratch that was a factor in the low hook-up rate, all requiring improvement we discovered, it certainly wasn't the lack of trying or any failures of our guide. There's more to be learnt about where the fish are, and fish movement indicators to look for, then the catch rate will improve along with that extra information.



Although not a great number of fish were caught, I did manage a strike and hook-up with a following run for a few



minutes, until the trout estimated of a good size by Bo managed to find the fast current and run with it downstream until it relieved itself of the fly and me.


All in all it, we both had a very enjoyable and entertaining day. Within our discussions we discovered and learnt new methods, casting improvements, entomology lessons (insect life cycle) trout habits and feeding patterns and the whole eco system of the Goulburn River, as we have never seen it before from a drift boat. I have a whole new perspective on that waterway, viewing it from access points and locations not previously available because of private property access restrictions.

I can highly recommend the whole experience and the professionalism of the Goulburn Valley Fly Fishing Centre. Check out their website <u>www.GVFlyfishing.com</u> or their Facebook page '<u>GVflyfishing</u>'.

A big thanks to my wife and family for the birthday gift certificate, a wonderful surprise. An adventure I'm busting to repeat next year.

Raising financially savvy children

As a parent, I want my daughter to learn about the value of money and to teach her the skills necessary to make sensible financial decisions later in life. However, with the move towards a cashless society, this has become more challenging. The use of internet banking and debit cards means it's harder for young children to understand how much things cost.

Below are some simple tips which can help the education process.

Use Cash Where Possible

By taking your children grocery shopping and using cash instead of cards, it will give them a better sense of how much things cost. This will give them a greater understanding of the dollar value of a basket of goods, rather than handing over a plastic card which pays for everything.

Piggy Banks and Bank Accounts

Young children love playing 'shops' and watching coins accumulate in a piggy bank – both of which help them understand the concept of money. As they get older, the piggy bank can be replaced by an interest bearing bank account, to further introduce the concept of saving.



Needs vs. Wants

Get your children involved in making shopping lists. This will help them understand the importance of prioritizing their spending – what are essential items and what are merely 'wants' or spontaneous purchases.

Pocket Money

When they get older consider giving them a small amount of pocket money. Help them set savings goals - discuss how much items cost and how long it will take them to save enough money. Initially you could give weekly payments. However, as they get older, changing this to fortnightly or monthly payments will help them with budgeting.



Online Shopping

The chances are at some stage children will see their parents using online shopping. It's important to educate them (especially teenagers!) as to the safe use of websites and internet purchases, and also the dangers of sharing personal information online.

Be a Good Role Model

Children imitate us. If you have trouble budgeting or managing debt, they will notice. Therefore, make financial matters a topic of discussion, not a taboo subject, and allow them to ask questions.

It's never too early or too late to start educating your children in money matters. It will give them a sense of empowerment and confidence as well as equip them with the skills to make better financial decisions later in life.

Bunyip-Garfield Probus Club news

Dr Georgy from the Bunyip Medical Centre spoke to us about how important it is to have regular skin checks to avoid the possibility of skin cancer becoming a real problem. The most common types of cancer are squamous cell carcinoma, basal cell cancer and the most serious of all melanoma. In these cases if discovered early enough it can be often treated with success.

As we boarded it felt like we had stepped back into another era as there was red velvet drapes and the tables had white tablecloths on them which was set for our lunch. With billowing smoke Puffing Billy started to puff his way through the beautiful Dandenong Ranges while we were served lunch. After a



big effort on Puffing Billy part we arrived at Lakeside were we had a walk around Emerald Lake before getting back on board for the return trip. We then were treated to scones, jam and cream.

On the way back there is a lot more movement as we rattled down the track back down to Belgrave so it was a lot of fun trying to drink our cuppa's. It was a very enjoyable day and we would recommend the trip to everyone.

Monthly local police update (10th August to 7th November 2018)

Here is a quick update on things we've been involved in or had reported to us the past 3 months.

- Two separate people reported missing and later located.
- Five cars dumped in the Bunyip State Park; two stolen and burnt out; two dumped and burnt but not stolen; one stolen but not burnt – with two known (not local) people under investigation.
- Five vehicles damaged around Bunyip three on the one occasion.
- Five vehicle thefts; two tractors one each in Bunyip and Nar Nar Goon; a forklift in Nar Nar Goon; a Narre Warren car stolen from Garfield and found burnt out in Clyde; a car stolen from Bunyip found in Garfield; another car from Bunyip being found near Werribee.
- Six firearms storage inspections conducted.
- Eleven thefts including; number plates in Longwarry; a microwave from Cannibal Creek reserve; power tools from residences in Tonimbuk, Maryknoll, Garfield and Bunyip; electrical goods and jewellery from Tynong North; fuel from Cora Lynn; firewood in Bunyip North.
- Thirteen firearms seized and three firearms licences suspended from a 67 year old Yallourn North lady and her 21 year old grandson, as well as a 29 year old Bittern man as a result of two separate illegal hunting incidents near the Bunyip State Park. Criminal charges pending.
- Fourteen vehicle collisions reported and attended mostly on or around the highway areas in Garfield North, Tynong North, Nar Nar Goon North, Bunyip North and Caldermeade.



- Twenty four reports of family violence from the Bunyip, Garfield, Longwarry, Tynong, Tynong North, Iona and Modella areas, and eleven Intervention Orders served. Hopefully these families are receiving the help they need.
- Forty five infringement notices (fines) issued. Fifty four people and cars field contacted for suspicious behaviour and driving offences.

A couple of longer term investigations are:

- The separate (allegedly) thefts of a unique car, boat, trailer and bobcat from three different victims on neighbouring properties, has so far resulted in the recent and welcome recovery of the car (still intact) and charging of an ex-neighbour in relation to one of the other missing vehicles. Investigation on-going.


