Bunyip & District Community News celebrates 35 years with the first newsletter published on 7th October 1982. After the 'Bunyip and Garfield Express' newspaper ceased printing in 1979 a community newsletter was suggested, and all local organisations and clubs were contacted for support. The Red Cross were asked to sponsor a public meeting which was held in the Bunyip Hall Supper Room after the annual Red Cross meeting on 6th September 1982. A well attended meeting resulted with representatives from a number of Bunyip groups and the Shire Council representative, Cr. K. Anderson, forming an independent committee called the 'Bunyip & District Newsletter'. The committee elected were President and Co-Editor Elizabeth Porter and Co-Editor Russel Clark, along with members Joyce McDermid, Kath Moody, M. Cowie and R. Bernault, R. Porter, W. Ockwell, and B. O'Connor.

The newsletter was printed by a team of 25 volunteers fortnightly at the Bunyip Primary School and 560 copies averaging 5 to 6 pages were distributed to shopkeepers in Bunyip and Garfield. Collection boxes were placed in Ockwell's Milk Bar in Main Street Bunyip, and Adam's Newsagency in Main Street Garfield.

Printing was later moved to the garage of Dick Baker from Garfield, and then to the office of Cooper's Real Estate Agency at 4 Main Street Bunyip which had more room to print and collate the newsletter. In 1984 the Red Cross moved in to a shop in Main Street Bunyip. There was a large back room that was suitable for producing the newsletter. The newsletter remained there until 1990 until the Red Cross move to another shop.

In October 2000 the committee elected was Editor Elizabeth Porter, Secretary Denise Nest, Treasurer Russell Clark and President Joyce McDermid, and members Shirley Bray, Anna Stagg, Fred Clarke, Kim Elledge, Jacquie Allisey, Jenny Honeyman, Liz Palmer and Pat Thompson. At this time the newsletter was printing 630 copies fortnightly averaging 12 to 14 pages.

In 2005 the newsletter moved the Bunyip RSL Hall where it remains printing today. The rented room stores the newsletter's printer as well as archives, and also the much appreciated cabinetry work of Alan Jenkins that keeps the bits and bobs in place.

In 2007 the committee elected was Editor and President Shirley Bray, Secretary Denise Nest, Treasurer Cr. Bill Pearson, and members Barry and Sue Neilson, Geoff and Gloria Collins, Alan Jenkins and Jane Scott. It was at this time the newsletter began printing a 1,000 copies averaging 20 pages per fortnight.

Editors not mentioned previously for the newsletter from 1982 to 2016 include Geoff Cartledge, Barry Neilson, Glenn Pullen and Lyn Squires.

A short history of Bunyip

The first European settlers in the Bunyip region were squatters who leased the two Connabul Creek runs, which were located between the Ararat Creek and the Bunyip River. In 1845, Connabul Creek 1 Run of 8,960 acres was leased by Michael Ready (or Reedy) and James Hook and Connabul Creek 2 Run was leased by Terence O'Connor and a Mr Hayes. The other squatting run in the area was the 30,000 acre Bunyeep Bunyeep Run, which was located between the Bunyip River and the Tarago River and taken up in 1849 by Henry Jennings.

Around the same time as these squatting runs were taken up in 1847, a road was surveyed from Dandenong to the Bunyip River (in the vicinity of were Ellis Road meets the river) and the township of Bunyeep (Bunyip) developed there. This town was surveyed in the 1850s – it had a High Street and a Barkly Street as well as eleven blocks, two owned by A. McKinnon, two by W.M.K Vale and the rest by David Connor, who built the Bunyeep Inn around 1854.





In 1867, Connor built a new hotel called the New Bunyip Inn. This was built on the Bunyip River on the Gippsland Road, as the Princes Highway was then called. It was on the south side of the Highway, just east of A'Beckett Road and the west side of the Bunyip River. A small settlement developed around the Inn, William Snell built a bakery in 1878 and a dance hall was erected by Mr Hyne, opposite the Inn. The New Bunyip Inn was closed by the Licensing Reduction Board in 1917.

It is possible that this small township on the Bunyip River would have developed into a sizable town however the arrival of the railways in 1877 moved the settlement further south and the modern town of Bunyip developed around the railway station.

The railway line from Oakleigh to Bunyip opened on (depending on what source you use) 4th or 8th October 1877. There is a description of Bunyip in 'The Argus' published 4th October 1877, from a journalist who took a trip down the railway line before the official opening.

"There are no visible settlements at the Bunyip at present, save such as have been temporarily called into existence by the railway works, but the hills on the north are stated to have been all selected. Two redwood cottages have been built at the back of the station, apparently for the purposes of trade. On the whole, the scene is very desolate, and the traveller tempted by railway time-tables to ran down into Gipps Land, will be strongly persuaded when he steps from the train into the open space which has been hewn out of the Bunyip forest to postpone his visit, and hasten back to Melbourne, unless he is of dauntless mind, and hardened to toilsome bush roads."

Another report that contains a description of Bunyip was in the 'South Bourke & Mornington Journal' published on 3rd August 1887.

"... it has two hotels, well conducted by Messrs. Hanson and Finch. These two hostelries, with Mr. Barrow's general store, amicably uniting themselves pretty well form the township. There are also one or two unpretentious dwelling houses about, and a State School."

As is usual in many country towns some of the first establishments were hotels and, according to Denise Nest's book, 'Call of the Bunyip', two hotels opened in 1876 – the Butcher's Arms and the Bunyip Hotel. John O'Brien had the licence for the Bunyip Hotel and in January 1877 he took up the licence for the Railway Family Hotel. I don't know if these hotels were the "red wood cottages set up for the purpose of trade" as described by the journalist above.

John O'Brien's tenure at the Railway Family Hotel didn't last very long as it was sold up by the Sherrifs Office in May 1881, according to an advertisement in

'The Argus'. I am a bit hazy on the early details of these hotels, but by 1884 there are various advertisements for Lawrence Finch's Gippsland Hotel at Bunyip – this hotel is still in existence, it's known as the Top Pub.

In 1897 Sarah Alice Finch was listed as the licensee and William Kraft took over, sometime between October 1898 and September 1899, according to the Shire of Berwick Rate Books. I don't know when the original building was replaced by the existing two storey brick building.

The other hotel in Bunyip today is the Railway Hotel. Thomas Stacey is listed as a publican in the Shire of Berwick Rate books in 1890 and he had it for many years, but I am unsure of the connection, if any, between the Railway Hotel and early hotels – was John O'Brien's Railway Family Hotel the same hotel as the Railway Hotel or was it the Butcher's Arms? The Railway Hotel was destroyed by fire in 1924 and the new building, which is the existing building, opened in October of the same year.

From around 1893, the settlement on the Koo Wee Rup Swamp helped the development of Bunyip and Garfield as they were service centres for the surrounding farm lands. The 1903 Electoral Roll shows that Bunyip had 355 adults enrolled of which just under half were female. The occupations listed in the Roll give us idea of the sort of services were available in the town. As you might expect, most of the men were farmers or labourers but there were also railway employees, a carpenter, draper, coach builder, store keepers, baker, gardener, butcher, Hotel keeper and even one sailor. The women overwhelmingly had their occupation listed as 'home duties' but there was a dressmaker, a music teacher, a teacher and a saleswoman.

The population of Bunyip increased at a steady rate, and in 1921 it was 694. By 1933 it had reached 744 and in 1961, 959. It then remained almost static for 25 years, and in 1986 it was still only 986. The largest increase has come in the last 20 years, from the 1996 to the 2016 census the population doubled from

1,011 to 2,468. As the population grew all the necessary trappings of a 'civilised' life developed. The State School opened at the start of 1880 and the hotel keeper William Kraft built a hall that was replaced by the original Mechanics' Institute Hall in 1906 (this hall burnt down in 1940 and the existing hall was opened in1942). Church services had taken place in the hall and private homes until the Methodist Church was opened in 1899 and the Anglican Church in 1902. The Presbyterian Church (now Uniting) was not opened until 1954.

Community groups such as the Agricultural, Pastoral and Horticultural Society were established in 1899. A football club and a cricket club sometime in the 1890s and Bunyip even had 'young ladies' cricket team which started in 1909. The 'ladies basketball' club (netball) began in the 1930s. The Fire Brigade started in October 1942. The First Bunyip Scout Troop commenced in 1910 and the Girl Guides in 1959.

On the welfare front, the Country Women's Association started in 1936 and the Baby Health Centre the same decade. A private hospital was built in 1912 and another in the 1930s. The Shelley Memorial Hospital at Bunyip was officially opened on 19th March, 1966 and closed on 1st May, 1991. The building is now part of Hillview Hostel.

There are, of course, many other community groups or institutions which have played a role in the life of Bunyip residents, but we don't have the space to go into it here. 'Call of the Bunyip' by Denise Nest, which I mentioned before, has information on some of these groups. You can buy this book from the Bunyip Historical Society.

However, we can't finish this short history of Bunyip without mentioning this publication, the volunteer run Bunyip & District Community News, which has been recording the activities of the area for 35 years. Congratulations to the News team and we look forward to the next 35 years!

Hanson EES Final Scoping Requirements

Hanson is obliged to have reports and studies undertaken in relation to the impact of its proposed quarry in a Environment Effects Statement [EES].

DELWP published a draft of the Scoping Requirements for the EES and invited comments. We understand that it is important that the Scoping is as comprehensive as possible so that Hanson is obliged to engage consultants to study and report on all the issues included in the Scoping. We are in disbelief that our submissions were largely ignored with only relatively minor changes making it into the Final EES Scoping requirements document. We believe that it is not only fair, but essential that our community has representation on the Technical

Reference Group for the EES so that we can continue to provide essential input on behalf of our community. As such we have written to both DELWP and the Minister for Planning asking why, for the most part, we have been ignored.

Talkin' Fishin'... What lies beneath?

There is a way to indicate that you have a fish attached, and funnily enough it's called a 'strike indicator'. They have been known about for many years, but mainly by fly fisherman and we know how cagey and secretively they can be about their habits.

Essentially it's a floating piece of material attached to your line that's either fibrous or cork like, in a bright colour, these materials should not absorb water. Modern materials these days are usually an EVA foam for high buoyancy.

When fly fishing with a nymph pattern or wet fly they both have the characteristic of sinking, hence the reason they get wet, which is pretty obvious really . Now a dry fly sits on top of the water, and you guessed it, remains almost dry on the skin of the water. See... we fishermen aren't too complicated after all.

The purpose of a 'strike indicator' is to keep a wet fly from sinking too deep and hooking either the bottom or snags and keeping it at a controlled depth. The indication part is when a fish takes the fly it will be pulled under, like a float.

This application can also be used for your lures as a small buoyancy device... okay it's a float! It's attached to your line above the lure in a shape that won't impede your cast or the lures action, but will keep it suspended, so there are a few different sizes to match according to the size of the lure. My favourite is a small ball type from Neptune's Tackle Company. They're very buoyant and bright, and simple to fit as



they just thread on to your line. Stop say 12 inches up the line and break the point of a toothpick off and jam it in the hole, trapping the line. There is no knot required, and this allows you to change the depth at any time. Casting will still be possible without the worry of sinking too deep and the ball will be a great visual asset as to where the lure is. A strike from a fish will feel the same but look totally different than ever before.

The fibre 'strike indicator' can be made easily from a bright nylon fibre (builders string line) or synthetic wool that you feed through a small rubber 'O' ring and bind it with a dob of super glue or hard drying nail polish. Let it dry, then brush it out with a small wire brush to fluff up the fibres. The rubber of the 'O' ring prevents it slipping down the line. A simple loop through the ring and over the fibre has you attached. These are not for the lures, just the flies, as they aren't buoyant enough for the weight of a lure and will sink. Never give up, and always look for a better method of presenting your lure or bait.

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Health Matters: calluses, corns and warts



Tender skin lumps on the feet are usually caused by calluses, corns or warts. Calluses and corns are areas of skin that have thickened due to constant pressure, while warts are viral infections.

Calluses

What is a callus?

It is simply a thickening of skin caused by some form of repeated pressure and friction. It is usually not painful but can be uncomfortable. It is common on the sole of the foot over the base of the toes. A callus can be found on any part of the body, especially the hands or the knees. When a callus is pared, normal skin is found underneath.



What is the treatment?

- No treatment is necessary if it is painless.
- Proper footwear is necessary to prevent calluses. Choose shoes that are wide enough and have cushioned pads over the balls of the feet.
- Paring with a scalpel blade by your doctor gives relief. (Avoid using razor blades.)
- Filing with callus files or a pumice stone wears away the callus. Soften it by soaking it in water before peeling the skin.



Corns

What is a corn?

A corn is a small tender raised lump that is round and has a hard centre. Corns usually form over the toes over the joints, between the toes and on the outside of the little toe. Sometimes they can be very painful. Paring reveals a white circular mass of old skin.



What is the treatment?

- The treatment is similar to that for a callus.
- A corn pad will reduce pressure.
- The corn can be softened with a chemical (salicylic acid) in commercial corn removers and then pared or peeled.
- Remove the source of friction if possible. Wear wide shoes—do not wear poor-fitting shoes. New shoes can be a cause, but your feet may adjust with stretching of the shoes.
- For soft corns between the toes (usually the last toe web), keep the toe-webs separated with lamb's wool at all times and dust with a foot powder.



Warts

What is a plantar wart?

A plantar wart is a wart that has grown on the sole of the foot and then gets pressed into it by pressure. It feels like a stone in the shoe and can be quite painful. It is caused by a viral infection and is more common in children and young people, who may pick the virus up from public showers. When it is pared, small bleeding points are exposed. Plantar warts are more difficult to treat than corns and calluses.

What is the treatment?

Professional help is usually needed to treat these warts. Many methods can be used, such as freezing with liquid nitrogen, application of chemicals or surgical removal. Special cushions or pads should be worn inside the shoes to relieve pressure.

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What do you expect from your dog?

Congratulations to Bunyip & District Community News for reaching 35 years. It has been a great asset to our community. I also hope you are all enjoying this beautiful spring weather, especially with your dogs.

Throughout my classes and interactions with my customers and their dogs, I find there tends to be two types of dog people. There are those who expect too much from their dogs and those who don't expect enough.

Dogs have three phases of learning before they become fully trained dogs. The first stage is the 'guiding and learning stage', where the dog has no idea what is required. You guide them into a command without too much expectation. After the initial stage, you then go into the 'training stage' where the dog has practised a command enough times and is aware of what is expected. At this stage you can demand a little more and start to introduce a consequence for not complying with the command. The final stage is the 'proofing and maintenance stage'. The dog has performed specific commands under distractions for months and you are now putting the icing on the cake, so to speak. You are now able to maintain the commands for the rest of the dog's life. This is just a brief overview of the stages of learning, as every person and dog team will reach each stage at different time intervals.

So the type that expects too much from their dog tends not attempt to do any of these stages, but generally expect off lead advanced recalls (LOL) under distraction. The type that doesn't expect enough, tend to be the dog owners who think their dogs couldn't possibly do certain things, so they don't even try. For example, a 10 to 12 week old puppy can do a 'sit-stay' command, granted it might not be for very long, but they can do it. A puppy under 6 months can hold a 'door boundary' command and a 'drop step-away' command. The only thing holding dogs back are their owners, but once you learn that your dog can do these commands, the dog will just follow. Knowledge and understanding is the key.

Also looking at things form the dog's perspective is important in changing behaviour. One case I had recently the owners had just moved and received a letter in their mailbox to "quite" the dog or the council would be called. There is nothing worse than incessant barking for anyone. So the owners decided to purchase a barking zap collar for fear of the neighbours and also lack of knowledge on how else to deal with the issue. It turned out when I got some history about the dog,



prior to moving it had three other dog mates. So moving to new surroundings and no dog mates, the dog was now completely stressed and it was evident as the he had lost weight since the move. The dog was not a happy one and adding the zap collar to him created more anxiety. After some training, he became a lot happier, less anxious and more secure. So the point of the story is not to expect a gadget to fix your dog's problem. Spending time training them is the only way you truly get to know your dog and fix issues.

People give me feedback all the time from lessons that the training is for them as much as the dog. It sure is. Just because you own a dog doesn't mean you know how to train them or communicate with them so they listen to you. I also have people who attend my classes who are quite nervous or anxious around their dog. They are either worried about their dog's behaviour or what people might think of them. But this shouldn't be a problem if you want to train your dog. If you think you've left it too long or just don't feel like you have control, then please don't hesitate to contact me on 0431 629 119 and we can arrange a one-on-one lesson at your convenience. Or if you'd prefer a group training sessions, I will be holding an a 8-week course starting 31st October to 19th December at the Bunyip **Recreation Reserve.**

Lastly in regards to walking your dogs, if you have not walked your dog in several months due to the cold weather then make sure to ease them in slowly. If it's a hot day, walk them in the morning or evening. If you want to jog or run with your dog, make sure they are fit enough first. I see people jogging down the street dragging a dog that hasn't been out all winter and it's not really fair. Get them walking first and then move on to running.

My time with the Bunyip Newsletter

We moved to Bunyip in 1999, and I was looking for somewhere to volunteer my time and to get to know the locals. I picked up the local newsletter, and contacted Elizabeth Porter – then Editor and one of the founders of the Newsletter, to see what I could do. I commenced my time as a typist, typing up news and ads. Further down the track I assisted with printing and collating, and then in 2001, Elizabeth asked to me to consider taking over with the job of Editor.

Back in the day, the words "Cut and Paste" actually meant physically cutting and pasting items onto A4 size paper, filling the page with and then getting them compiled ready for copying. On the day before printing you could find me sitting on the floor of my lounge with all these small bits of paper cut out and placing them in position until the pages were done!

After a year or so of this process, I then graduated to using Publisher to prepare the pages and from there we went from strength to strength. You have to love technology, I know it certainly saves a lot of paper!

My favourite memories of my Newsletter days were those of all the volunteers who tirelessly worked

behind the scenes to bring the newsletter to print. In the beginning, we had to print every page, put it into a pile on the collating table, then the collators would come in when the printers were done, and they would manually collate the pages – one copy at a time. They were then stapled, and then sorted into piles for distribution and delivery. I don't think the public really understands how much work actually goes into producing a local community newsletter.

After handing the reins of Editor over to Barry Neilson, I continued with the newsletter as president until we moved from Bunyip in 2010.

Over the years, I saw many people come and go, and I formed many wonderful friendships within the 'Newsletter' community, some of which continue to this day.

I just had a look at the latest issue of the newsletter online, and how things have changed! From the time I started, to now it has made huge progress and now looks very professional, the current Committee should be very proud!

Memories of the Bunyip Newsletter from 2000 to 2013

Gloria and I retired to Bunyip in February 2000. Shortly after arrival to our new home, the Village Community's Welcoming Committee, namely Elizabeth Porter and Shirley Bray paid us a visit. We were presented with a village newsletter, a Village map and a wattle tree seedling for the garden. Gloria had been a shorthand typist prior to retirement so this said; she was recruited to join the typing team to make the copy for the Newsletter's photocopier. Our association with the Newsletter had begun!

After a while she was asked to become a printer. On her first shift she arrived to start printing at 8:30am saying she would be home for 1pm lunch. A very harassed wife returned at 4pm as the copier continuously kept stopping for no apparent reason. When she was rostered on for printing the next time, she asked me to be her assistant. The copier didn't stop while printing off the 600 newsletters; it had apparently been one of its good days! On its bad days it might stop every half hour I was told. Restarting was usually accomplished by switching off at power point, wait 5 minutes, remove any sheet stuck in the machine and then switch back on, if the scanner didn't move off, then a bang with heel of the hand usually solved the problem.

The copier was located in the old Bunyip Hospital pan room; it was a narrow room with two benches running along both sides of its length the printer was on the end of one bench. The first run printed off the even numbered sheets; these were piled along the bench then turned over for reloading the odd numbered sides. When each stack was finished it was moved to the other bench for collating.

On a good day printing was complete by 1pm and the collating team started at 2pm, the whole job was delivered to the various collection points around the village by 5pm. On a bad day the printer would still be printing when the collators arrived, it got rather crowded with the six collators, part collating, while printers are trying get the printing completed.

As the printer was having more and more bad days the Village Committee at last found the money for a new copier. A representative arrived, he'd never seen our model before and not surprised maintenance and spares were not available. All was not lost, he had a machine in the show room in Mulgrave that would copy, print, collate and staple all in one go. If Elizabeth and the team brought the copy along he would not only print the 600 newsletters, but he would supply the paper as well! Elizabeth and team on the next print day duly arrived at the Mulgrave showroom. The copier was set ready to go and the very first Bunyip Newsletter was produced that was untouched by human hand! Coffee all round while the copier went to work. Unfortunately it was realised it was to slow and would take 17 hours non stop to complete the run. So it was a rush back to the old copier to complete the run before the collators went to bed. It ended up being finished the next day.

A replacement copier ran in the pan room until it and the hospital (Community Centre) was demolished. The Newsletter had many moves, the old wooden house that stood where the Foodworks carpark is now was one, a shop in Main Street, the Video shop for a while. One of the main reasons the Newsletter equipment had problems was because it was designed for stable environments such as offices. After its move from the pan room its future locations were usually damp and cold environments. Fan heaters were used before start up, any unwrapped reams of paper were stored at home for the next print day. Finally the printer was set up in the RSL room in the Village hall, as the collating team had dwindled though the moves, a collating machine was purchased. This proved to be high maintenance (both summer and winter) needing a fan heater to start and being stripped down for a clean every couple of months. Alan Jenkins and I spent many happy hours keeping this up.

A printing centre was leased to replace the single copier and collator. At first it required the hall heaters over the RSL room to be turned on an hour before start up. It was then installed in a cupboard with an electric bulb warming the atmosphere day and night. Eventually it was decided to be cheaper to purchase a new printing centre rather than leasing, The new one could produce an A4 size booklet newsletter. Copy was no longer required as the copy was loaded from a laptop direct to the printer memory. When the hall stage curtains were deemed a fire hazard and dumped in the RSL room, one of them was used to completely wrap the printer, protecting it from the damp, but still needing a fan heater occasionally in winter.

In 2010 the Newsletter was renamed the 'Bunyip & District Community News', distributing 1,100 copies a fortnight from Tynong to Longwarry. Gloria and I had enjoyed our twelve and a half years in Bunyip and our association with the Newsletter. After moving in to our Mornington retirement village, we were approached by the village newsletter editor asking if we might like to help with the printing. We opted out.

For those unable to reach town post to Editor, C/- Post Office, Junyip. Your news sheet will be printed fortnightly (unless the demand grows) deadline for inclusion 1.00pm on Tuesday prior to publication of paper on the Thursday, for delivery on Friday starting with this edition the first week in October.
