Bunyip Strikers present first Life Membership

The Bunyip & District Soccer Club presented the first Life Membership to its founding father, Tony Arrigo on the 10th anniversary since the club was formed.

The award was made during the Junior Presentation day on Saturday 6th October by Club President Adrian Gatti. Adrian is also a foundation member of the Club.

Tony had the idea of forming a soccer club in Bunyip planted in his mind for many years, but due to work commitments was unable to bring this to fruition.

Then when retirement came, he was able to gather a committee of dedicated like minded people and the Club was born in September 2008.

There were many obstacles to overcome as the area selected for the ground was just a large uneven paddock with pot holes and grass a metre high. With the help and enthusiasm of Cardinia Shire Council, the Bunyip Recreation Reserve user groups and grants from State and Federal Governments as well as contributions from many local individuals, the Club

attracted players and after a couple of years entered into official competitions. Even though there was a lot of improvising, the Club was accredited and granted approval to enter teams into the FFV which was a marvellous achievement in such a short time.

Tony acknowledged the support and encouragement of his wife Carmelina who has been a staunch supporter from the beginning. Carmelina, along with Mary Cole, is a foundation patron of the Club.

Recently the Club was successful in obtaining a Federal Government Grant for \$2.3 million to build a complex to expand its facilities. This should be completed by the start of next season.

This Life Membership is a fitting acknowledgment of the dream that Tony had, his dedication, belief and persistence to bring the dream to the reality that the Bunyip Strikers Soccer Club is today.

A caring home for injured animals

When my daughter Rachel was coming home late one night last week, she came across a dead animal lying in the middle of the road – but she noticed that there was something moving next to it. She turned the car around and went back. There she found that a possum had been killed and cuddling up to its dead mother was a young possum in imminent danger of being run over as well. We wrapped up the little visitor in a makeshift woollen pouch, covered her up and placed her into a basket on top of a hot water bottle. She settled well in our shower cubicle. The next morning I contacted Wildlife Victoria Rescue, who in turn put us into contact with a local injured or orphaned carer.

Carmel and Jasper Hails live in Tynong North. One immediately takes a liking to them. They both have warm welcoming smiles and the love and warmth they exude is infectious. Their home overlooks lush green hills and valleys. It's a most peaceful, unspoilt part of God's own country. The couple whose children have grown up and left home are registered Wildlife Carers. They have completed intensive training in wildlife animal welfare under supervision and after 2 years qualified. They are both unassuming caring people whose genuine love for animals is evident in the manner in which they look after the sick and injured.

The current "hospital" has five wombats, eight ringtail possums and two brush tail possums. They even have a cot and special fridge set up in their bedroom as some of the "babies" need to be fed at three hour intervals throughout the night. A possum enclosure in their lounge sees four young ringtail possums darting in and out of their nests checking out who the visitor is.

I asked the couple how difficult was it to finally let the animals back into the wild once they have been restored back to health. I wasn't surprised when they responded that it was quite a sad and emotional experience. Jasper shuffles through his phone and asks me to look at the short video. It shows a mother kangaroo feeding a young kangaroo.

"That mother was one of our injured babies once and now she has returned to show us her baby", boasts Jasper. "Many animals remember us and often make return visits."

My wife Wilma hands the young possum over to Carmel and we are both confident that it will get the very best love and care possible. We will go back and see our little possum in a month's time to see how she has progressed.

Local jazz icon honoured by Australian Jazz Museum

No tram for Bunyip

A small group of enthusiastic volunteers met in Bunyip earlier this year and decided to formally apply for one of the 134 old Melbourne W-Class trams that were being given away by the State Government. Once applications closed, there were 1,500 applicants wanting a tram.

The Bunyip application was unsuccessful. However had it been approved, there were massive hurdles to overcome to bring the project to fruition. Being a community project, the tram would have been delivered onsite for free. However there was the cost of hiring a crane, concrete foundations and a suitable roof to protect the tram from the elements. There was



the cost of removal of asbestos in the flooring and the electrical systems of the tram needed attention. The estimated cost of asbestos removal from the tram controller would cost up to \$800, whilst the flooring could cost upwards of \$8,000. This is a cost that our community would have been unable to bear.

Cardinia Planning Scheme – Notice of the preparation of an amendment



The Cardinia Shire Council has prepared Amendment C229 to the Cardinia Planning Scheme. The land affected by the amendment is all land within the Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) of Bunyip and Garfield, and all land zoned for urban purposes within Tynong.

The amendment proposes to apply Schedule 7 to the Environmental Significance Overlay to the townships of Bunyip, Garfield, and Tynong to protect and enhance habitat for the Southern Brown Bandicoot, being an endangered native marsupial.

Specifically, the proposed Amendment:

- Inserts a new Schedule 7 to Clause 42.01 Environmental Significance Overlay.
- Amends the Schedule to Clause 66.04 Referral of Permit Applications Under Local Provisions.
- Amends Planning Scheme Map No.s 20-24ESO.

You may inspect the amendment, any documents that support the amendment and the explanatory report about the amendment, free of charge, at the following locations.

- During office hours, at the office of the planning authority, Cardinia Shire Council at 20 Siding Avenue, Officer, VIC.
- At the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning website www.planning.vic.gov.au/public-inspection.

Any person who may be affected by the amendment may make a submission to the planning authority about the amendment. Submissions must be made in writing giving the submitter's name and contact address, clearly stating the grounds on which the amendment is supported or opposed and indicating what changes (if any) the submitter wishes to make.

Name and contact details of submitters are required for council to consider submissions and to notify such persons of the opportunity to attend council meetings and any public hearing held to consider submissions. The closing date for submissions is Wednesday 7th November 2018.

The planning authority must make a copy of every submission available at its office for any person to inspect free of charge for two months after the amendment comes into operation or lapses.

Q. How will the amendment affect me?

You have been given notice of the amendment as you may be affected by, or have an interest in the proposed changes. You may own property or live nearby, or be planning on developing property in the affected areas. The documents provided to you are for your information and you do not have to do anything further if you do not wish to do so.

Q. What is the Cardinia Planning Scheme?

Each local government in Victoria is covered by a planning scheme. The Cardinia Planning Scheme sets out how land is protected and how it can be used and developed in Cardinia Shire. Planning schemes require changes from time to time to achieve certain planning outcomes, support new policies and to ensure that requirements continue to meet the needs of the local community.

Q. What is an Environmental Significance Overlay?

An Environmental Significance Overlay is in addition to the zoning of your property and means that further planning controls apply. This overlay provides a way to protect and enhance important vegetation.

Q. What is a Southern Brown Bandicoot?

The Southern Brown Bandicoot (bandicoots), Isoodon obesulus obesulus is a native marsupial which is endangered under the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 and is also protected by the Victorian Government Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988.

Q. Where do Southern Brown Bandicoots live?

The bandicoots live in dense vegetation as it protects them from predators. Cardinia Shire is home to a large and distinctive bandicoot population within the former Koo Wee Rup Swamp area including a group living in the townships of Tynong, Garfield and Bunyip.

Whilst visiting Bunyip eight years ago, Shara McAuley fell in love with the area along with husband John (JB), and they knew immediately that this was the perfect place to raise their family. Shara has been involved in many local committees in her passion to make Bunyip a better place for everybody to live.

What do you like about Bunyip?

I like the scale of Bunyip and the view from Main Street down over the train tracks to the footy oval. JB and I stood there in front of Bunyip Bakery eating a pie and decided this town would be a great place to raise little boys. My adventures as a fireman

I never contemplated joining the Maffra Fire Brigade as I saw how hard they trained and what hard work it was attending an incident/ fire plus the required dedication to duty that each fire fighter showed made me certain I wouldn't be able to score highly on either of those two important requisites.

When my teenage son David needed some guidance in life, I suggested to him to join the Maffra Fire Brigade. There he would meet and mix with good people and this I hoped would rub off on him and help him to become a better citizen. The Bennett name was synonymous with Maffra Fire Brigade and every Bennett that I knew had an active connection to the brigade. The Bennett families were highly regarded and respected in the Maffra community. Another name which in my estimation gave the brigade an esteemed respect was that of the late Captain Ron Pitt. The dedication that Ron showed to the captaincy and his leadership qualities brought the brigade a lot of respect, both within brigade circles and in the general community. Ron owned his own plumbing business and this allowed him to conduct a lot of brigade business during working hours. I often wonder how much better off he would have been financially if he hadn't let brigade business interfere with his work. He gave so much of himself for the community through the brigade.

Anyway, here I am telling my son David about how good it would be for him to join the brigade, when he caught me off guard and said, "If the brigade is that good Dad, why aren't you in it?" I stumbled for an answer, then in desperation turned to my wife Wilma to support me with a plausible reply. But to no avail, suddenly it was two against one. The next thing I vividly remember to this day, is sitting at the Pitts' kitchen table with David and myself filling out application forms to become members of the Maffra Fire Brigade. "What do we write in in this square Ron?, do I tick YES in this box " After our names had been submitted, the committee voted us in as members, although I don't know if there were any "against" votes when our names were read out.

At the time that we joined the brigade, the fire station was in Pearson Street and this was not suitable anymore due to the bigger tankers and equipment that we carried. Our meeting room was an old room with framed photos of brigade achievers proudly on display. We were elated when the news came that a new station was to be built in Johnson Street which would be jointly shared by the Ambulance Service which was currently housed in Queen Street. It was a feeling of

joy when we were able to spread out in our new premises. Everything so modern and new with so much space.

Now, I will tell you about some of my memories during my time at Maffra Fire Brigade. I can remember when the hotel veranda at the Metropolitan Hotel collapsed. I think it was during a Maffra Demo Competition long weekend and it happened whilst all of the competing brigades were marching through the main street in a torchlight procession. Down she came and there were traumatised and injured people lying on the footpath everywhere, some buried by the collapsed rubble. It was a chaotic scene. Luckily nobody was killed. I was at home at the time when a police car pulled up in the driveway and David rushed inside telling us about the tragedy and grabbing blankets and fluffy cuddly toys to take down to the injured. The brigade worked hand in hand with the police to help and care for those injured.

As with all brigades there is a lot of training which is necessary as part of the fire fighter's role. New recruits have to complete a "minimum skills" course before they can go out to an incident. This is not only for their safety and benefit, but also to protect the seasoned members from the recruits making costly mistakes and jeopardising the safety of the entire crew. One of the courses that I did with a fellow member in Traralgon was a First Aid Course, which was followed by an exam. After the test the two of us sat down and verbally compared our answers whilst waiting for the official marks to come through.

My mate asked me, "What answer did you write down to the question "What does A.B.C. stand for?"

I replied that it stood for Airway, Breathing and Circulation.

"I thought it stood for, Always Be Careful," he replied. He got a cross for that answer.

As I was a bit of a mug journalist, I was writing most of the articles for The Maffra Spectator at the time which included writing twice a week on Maffra Football. I thought it might be a good idea to start a brigade newsletter. The committee approved the idea and I put up a box for suggestions as to what to name the newsletter. After the expired time, I opened the box to find mine was the only suggestion inside, so the "Fire Break" was born and to this day it still comes out monthly, with a new editor of course. When I moved to Garfield in West Gippsland, I joined a committee to establish a local newsletter and I was its first editor. To this day its called "The Garfield Spectator" I was quite outspoken when hiding behind the pen in those days.

My adventures as a fireman (cont'd)

One issue of Fire Break came out which was critical of something the Runners were doing. No one said anything before the issue went to print, although it was proof read. So all the copies were printed and ready for distribution at the following meeting. At the meeting when the newsletter was handed out, there on the front page lots of words had been erased with white out. Obviously someone had taken offence at what I had written and had quietly gone through a whole bottle of White Out censoring 40 individual issues. No one admitted to doing this, but it made me more considerate and less critical when writing future newsletters. I think the change in tempo of my future editions was approved as in the year 2001 the brigade voted me as the 'Firefighter of the Year'. I am very proud of this award and the trophy holds a pride of place in our home.

I remember attending the West Sale Training facility and how scared I was using the Breathing Apparatus as I crawled through a hot, dark, burning training room. These training sessions are used to prepare for the real situation. I also experienced real fire fighting when as part of a Group, I was sent on a tanker to fight a fire at Golden Beach to protect a pine plantation. It was a twelve hour stint – I thought I'd be gone for only a few hours. The roar of the flames in the trees, the heat and the choking smoke that not only burned our throats,

but stung our eyes to the point of despair. If one was standing at the back of a tanker, the front couldn't be seen due to the thick smoke which carried burning embers that descended upon us. There were water bombing planes dropping sewerage water from the sewerage pond onto the fire, quite often missing their target and covering us on the ground in liquid "shite". Yet such oppressive conditions brought out in each and every one of us a great spirit of comradery and strengthened our bonds of friendship.

The fire training that I received held me in good stead and helped to enable me to keep a cool head when a fire started whilst I was in charge of Night Shift at Hillview Bunyip Aged Care. I had a Personal Care Attendant, Sheryl on duty with me when the fire, due to an electrical fault broke out at 5am on a cold frosty Saturday morning on the 16th June 2012. We were both able to move the residents affected by the fire to a safe area before the fire brigades arrived. The residents did not receive any injuries during this incident. However the two of us were suffering extreme smoke inhalation and need to be transported to WGH for treatment and observation. We were both nominated for Bravery awards and did in fact receive Certificates and Bronze Medals each for bravery. These were presented to us by the Governor of Victoria, The Hon. Alex Chernov, AC QC at Government House.

Monthly local police update (9th October 2018)

Apologies for the lack of recent newsletter contribution and I hope everyone is well. Things have been really busy in a good and productive way locally, and we have been getting some welcome short- and long-term results for local community safety and public issues.

Some people (who aren't all local) must have misinterpreted what is appropriate and safe in our area, so I thought I might share a bit of legal information regarding some of the actions that police have taken recently when human-made devices have been misused or used carelessly. Hopefully this can be respectfully passed on to the kinfolk that haven't listened. The devices I'm talking about are unfortunately the most common causes of un-natural or unexpected death and injury that police come across in the domestic world.

The privilege of owning and using cars and firearms legally, is earnt and recognised through stringent application processes, testing, licensing and registration requirements. We agree. Most people know how easy it can be to lose a driver's license or points – so here are some of the garden variety offences that you and police are exposed to daily that now give us the legal power to impound a vehicle for 30 days – with costs being incurred by the owner.

The law states: "Police may impound a motor vehicle in accordance with Part 6A of the Road Safety Act (RSA) 1986; and a motor vehicle may be seized or required to be surrendered when a police member believes on reasonable grounds that the vehicle is being or has been used in the commission of a relevant offence as defined in sect .84C RSA."

- P plate licence holders are not to drive a vehicle with more than one passenger!
- The driving of a motor vehicle in a manner which intentionally causes the vehicle to undergo a loss of traction by one or more wheels.
- Any of the following involving improper use of a motor vehicle.
 - Manner or speed dangerous
 - Careless driving
 - Unnecessary noise and smoke
 - Failure to have proper control of a vehicle
- Drive whilst disqualified or suspended; and repeat unlicensed driving / breach of licence conditions where the offender has a prior conviction for either offence.






- Driving when directed to stop by police.
- Repeat drug driving.
- Drink driving offence, or combined drug/drink offence, at or above 0.10 BAC.
- Ride a miniaturised motor cycle on a road or road related area.
- That puts a lot of people in contention.
- Did you also know that under the Firearms Act, if sufficient grounds exist, some of the circumstances where police may immediately suspend a firearms licence and seize firearms where warranted.
 - No longer has the reason specified in the licence for holding the licence
 - Has failed to notify the Chief Commissioner of a change of their address
 - Has knowingly supplied false or misleading information in connection with the application for or renewal of the licence
 - Has contravened or failed to comply with the conditions of the licence
 - Has contravened or failed to comply with any requirement for the storage of firearms held under the licence
 - Through negligence or fraud, caused a firearm to be lost or stolen
- Here are some reasons that a person may no longer be considered 'fit and proper' to hold a firearm licence and possess firearms.
 - Irresponsible in the handling, care or use of a firearm
 - Actual or threatened violent behaviour
 - Irrational or aggressive behaviour
 - Psychiatric or psychological instability; concerns for self harm
 - Habitual alcohol or drug abuse
 - Has been charged with a crime of violence, a drug related offence, or a number of offences involving dishonesty

It can get really complicated out there now, so please respect and look after each other by thinking about the future impact and consequences of your actions. Please contact us for any assistance or advice, or 000 if you think you need police or emergency services.




