TALKIN'FISHIN' make your own BAIT TRAP

Bait, as with our own food is at its best when it's fresh, the fresher and more natural or live the better your chances of enticing a fish to bite. Although it's not always practical to carry live bait with you or keeping it alive in extreme temperatures, frozen or imitation lures are the alternatives. Two of my favourite and very effective baits are shrimp and crabs, but capturing them by hand or with a net is difficult as they are so dam fast. Another method is bait traps and a homemade design I have used for years works very well and is fun to use as well.

You need: 1 x 2 litre paint tin (new and clean) 1 x hole punch or large nail 0.5m length of s/steel wire and 3 crimps 1 x 30m length of 4mm nylon rope 1^{ST} . Punch 2 holes in the centre of the base 25mm apart, these are for tying in the bait meat.

 2^{ND} Evenly punch further holes all over and under the tin to let water escape. 3^{rd} Crimp loop in the centre of wire, this is the handle now, loop wire through the lip edge opposite each other, then crimp over ends. Make sure the top loop is central.

The method of use is: Tie in a bait meat, the best I've found is a cooked chicken wing or drumstick, tie a heavy nylon or braid securely around it, allow long tag ends so you can feed them through the base centre holes and then tie a good knot on the outside and trim off the tag ends. Basically that's it!

Tie your rope into the centre loop of the handle, peg the other end into the riverbank with a stick or tent peg, swing and cast out into the water and allow it to sink. Through the day you'll find the best spot to toss it, by how many you catch each time. When it's been left for a good while the crabs will crawl their way in to feed. The retrieve should be fast, the water will come out the holes as the water rushes in the mouth of the tin and the pressure will keep the crabs inside the tin. Have a keeper bucket ½ filled with water ready to empty the tin into, with either a bait pump running or change the water regularly to keep them in good condition and alive. Return to the waterway what you don't use for bait. Involve the kids in the collection everyone will get a laugh, and they will become quite competent at doing it themselves. Always be aware of dangerous varieties of creatures like 'Blue ring octopuses' for example. The species we only want them handling safely is shrimp and crabs. Have Fun!

Garfield Community Garden

A few days ago, I made a simple soup with potatoes, zucchini and tomatoes from my pretty basic veggie patch; plus, a can of peas from the Food Bank shelf at the ADRA op shop and a big handful of herbs and greens I picked at the Garfield Community Garden. It made me realise how lucky I am to have these resources right here in town and I thought I should let more people know about the Community Garden. Funnily enough, after I'd finished the tasty soup, a new friend I made at the Community Garden messaged me to say she'd pruned back the Chamomile bush that had gone all straggly and wondered if I knew how to do something useful with the pruning's. I am no expert and I've never done it before, but I reckon you can dry the leaves and flowers to make tea...so I Googled it, of course! Love learning something new, that isn't hard to do!

That's one of the things that is what makes GCG so nice to be a part of - you don't have to be an expert or even know anything about gardening to get a lot out of being involved.

There's no pressure to take on a particular role or even show up regularly. We get together on Saturday mornings, between 10am and 12 (or whatever time people can manage) and it's all very relaxed and social. There are some who aren't into chatting much and some who are; some who roll their sleeves up at 9.55 and get stuck right in to weeding, watering, mulching, pruning or whatever task; and others who operate more slowly, having a wander to see what job might take their fancy before doing a bit of something-or-other to help (or not today, thanks). Adults, kids, pensioners, dogs...it's a good mix...oh, and it's called Garfield Community Garden because it's *in* Garfield; but you don't have to be *from* Garfield to be '*in*' the garden - not long ago, a group of Tamils (from Pakenham) asked if they could grow food at the garden - well, of course, how cool to get a different cultural input - let's see what Pakenham style tomatoes taste like! Apart from the obvious gardening activities, there's the all-important (to me) tea break and catch-up with the usual crowd or meeting someone new - I was made very welcome the first time I showed up and then very welcome again, several weeks later on my second visit, when I couldn't remember anyone's names!

The GCG has been going since 2017, a labour of love and dedication to literally 'growing community' and it's changed and developed so much over the years, with members coming and going, different projects and priorities, setbacks and successes. A lot has happened even in the year since I joined and making that soup the other night got me mulling over the question of 'what makes this community garden special? Why are people attracted to coming together in (and for) this place?' So I asked everyone and this is what I heard:

'It's about community, meeting people'

'I want to help create a pleasant environment for all to visit'

'Growing and sharing food and plants makes sense to me. I don't want to rely on supermarkets and plastic-packaged fruit and veg'

'Sustainable practices, composting, mulching'

'As a parent, it's great that my children get to learn about how food is grown. They love coming here and picking a handful of peas, or tomatoes or whatever and eating them on the spot. I don't have time for a veg patch at home...'

'We have kids come here from the local primary school - I'm a teacher and I love volunteering to teach them skills and get them interested in nature and gardening' 'There's always something to learn'

'Organic, no pesticides is important'

'Having a green space with so many different plants support wildlife and contributes to biodiversity on our doorstep'

'Do something practical to mitigate climate change'

'I learnt how to propagate tomatoes and got a decent crop from seeds I saved from the GCG last year'

'It feels good to get out of my own head, do something for the benefit of all, not just for myself and my own family - it's a mental health thing'

'Slow down, smell the roses...and rosemary and lemon balm and strawberries...!'

'Help create somewhere special, cosy, beautiful. I know I'm not the only one who comes here for a walk and a think and a little cry sometimes'

'Get together with people who share similar interests. Although we do have differing opinions and ways - that's how it is with groups like this, everyone's kind and respectful and here for really good purposes; so we work things out'

So, there you have it, or at least a snapshot of Garfield's blooming Garden. Come along some time, be part of this lovely thing (it's free by the way).

BRAG was invited to participate in a panel discussion, "speaking up and speaking out, advocacy in a time of transition" at Riddell's Creek Energy Expo. Our contributions to the discussion were well received and we were also able to network with other groups and pick up many good ideas.

In 2090 if we continue the existing action to tackle climate change, there will be:

- 11 days above 35°C. This is an increase of 6 days.
- 1 days above 40°C. This is an increase of 1 days.
- **0 nights** above 25°C. This is an increase of **0 nights**.

The increase in days is compared to the average over the period of 1986-2005. The Keynote speaker was Professor Emeritus David Karoly, University of Melbourne. As part of his presentation on the Science Behind Climate Change he introduced us to the Climate Council's "Climate Heat Map of Australia" We thought the projected outcomes for Bunyip may be of interest

So what..that's no big deal you may say and, yes, that is a common response:

FAQ: "My local area only shows a small change in the number of very hot days or nights. Is this really something to worry about?"

Even a small increase in the number of very hot days or nights can do significant damage to ecosystems and our health. For example, Tasmania's expected increase of an average of just one more day over 35°C is expected to have a major detrimental impact on its coastal rainforests. Note also that we are talking in terms of average increases, meaning that there will be some years that experience many more extreme hot days than the projected average number, not to mention the likelihood of more extreme weather events.

Future Cardinia: Share your feedback on Council's strategic objectives

The Cardinia Shire community is invited to provide feedback on Council's draft strategic objectives, which will guide the development of the new Council Plan 2025–29 and associated strategic documents.

The strategic objectives have been informed by priorities identified by the Community Panel during the deliberative engagement process in February. The panel, which included a diverse cross section of the community, contributed ideas and provided valuable insights over 4 workshops.

As part of the deliberative engagement process, the Community Panel reviewed and updated Council's Community Vision and identified a number of key focus areas that have helped to inform the draft strategic objectives.

Council is now seeking feedback from the wider Cardinia Shire community on the draft strategic objectives:

- **Thriving communities:** we deliver inclusive programs and facilities that enhance engagement, wellbeing and resilience.
- **Vibrant places:** we celebrate our well-designed towns and infrastructure that strengthens belonging and connection.
- Adaptive environments: we care for our natural environment and support recovery from challenges.
- Prosperous economies: we encourage urban and rural business and local employment to grow.
- **Responsible leaders:** we demonstrate responsible leadership and financial stewardship. Cardinia Shire Mayor Cr Jack Kowarzik encourages community members to share their thoughts on the draft strategic objectives.

"There is no doubt that community input is essential in helping to guide Council in planning for the future of our shire," Mayor Kowarzik said.

"Thank you to the members of our Community Panel who provided valuable feedback and insights throughout the deliberative engagement process.

"We have listened to what the panel has told us and have developed draft strategic objectives to guide our work and help us to respond to the needs of our growing community into the future.

"We are now inviting feedback from the broader community and asking you to let us know what you think about the draft strategic objectives and whether they reflect community priorities."

Following the consultation period, the finalised strategic objectives will inform the development of the Council Plan 2025–29, the Long Term Financial Plan, Asset Plan and Liveability Plan. Each plan will go out for wider community engagement later in the year.

"These key strategic documents will ultimately guide Council's activities and decision making for the next 4 years, so it's important that we develop plans that reflect the community's priorities and that will enable us to respond to our rapid growth and challenges, and ensure that our shire remains a vibrant and liveable place that people are proud to call home."

Community consultation is open from 27 March until 11 May.

Sod turn marks the commencement of Garfield North Community Centre project

Construction works are set to begin shortly on the Garfield North Community Centre, following a sod turn event on Friday 14 March.

Cardinia Shire Council Mayor, Jack Kowarzik and Deputy Mayor Alanna Pomeroy were joined by The Hon. Harriet Shing, Minister for Development Victoria and Precincts, and representatives from the Cannibal Creek Reserve Committee of Management to officially turn the first sod at the Cannibal Creek Recreational Reserve site.

Mayor Kowarzik said the event signifies the commencement of a vital community infrastructure project for Garfield North.

"The scope of this project has been co-designed by several community members impacted by the Bunyip Complex Fires."

"Our community advocated strongly for a multipurpose space to support recovery and help regain connectedness in the town and create a community gathering space for meetings, events and activities," he said.

The new community centre will be a modular build and include a social room, a meeting room, a storage area, a kitchen, an accessible toilet, and unisex toilets.

Deputy Mayor Alanna Pomeroy is pleased to see works start on the project.

"We're breaking ground on this exciting new facility for our community, I look forward to seeing this project come to life."

Together with Council, various user groups and the Cannibal Creek Reserve Committee advocated for the funding to help build the centre.

The Garfield North Community Centre project is supported by a \$1.3 million Growing Suburbs Fund grant from the Victorian Government, and a \$1 million investment from Cardinia Shire Council.







We are now well into the Penitential Season of Lent and Easter is fast approaching. Our journey to the foot of the Cross commences on Palm Sunday.

PALM SUNDAY 13th April at 10am

We commemorate Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem to accomplish His saving work by dying and rising again. On Thursday evening we enter into the Triduum which mark the three most Holy days on the Christian calendar. The Triduum commences on the eve of Maundy (Holy) Thursday and ends at sunset on Easter Day. This is actually one service in three parts (over three days) and traces the final days of Jesus' life, His death, and then, His resurrection from the dead.

MAUNDY THURSDAY 17th April at 7pm (Mass of the Lord's Supper)

Celebrates the institution of the Eucharist. And also includes the washing of the feet (as Christ washed the feet of His disciples)

GOOD FRIDAY 18th April 10 am (The Lord's Passion)

This day commemorates the crucifixion. It marks the day Jesus died for the sins of the world. The Service includes the 'Veneration of the Cross''

Followed by Stations of the Cross at 11.30am

Good Friday is a day of fasting and abstinence.

HOLY SATURDAY 19th April There is *no daytime Service* on Holy Saturday. It remains a day of fasting and sorrow before the Easter Vigil begins. But on this day we recall, with Mary and the disciples, that Jesus died and was separated from them for the first time as He lay in the tomb.

EASTER SUNDAY 20th April 8.30 am Mass of the Lord's Resurrection.

Easter Sunday is a wonderful celebration. It is the day we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. We renew our Baptismal Vows and sing 'Alleluia, Christ is risen'.
