" Clos des Vignes" "Small Plot of Grapevines"

Bunyip once boasted at least four hobby vineyards, but the only one still operating today in the town is "Clos des Vignes" The owners Jean-Pierre and Beryl Gorry are a very welcoming couple who love "everything of the land". This is their inspiring story

'Clos des Vignes' is a small hobby vineyard owned by a delightfully energetic, loving couple. Jean-Pierre, aged 79 and Beryl 77 have been happily married for fifty-four years, have three married children and seven grandchildren. Thirty-one years ago, in 1989 the family cleared their newly purchased two acres and as Owner Builders, started construction of their family home. subcontracting to local tradespeople and using local suppliers. Jean-Pierre was working as Departmental Manager and Administrator of the Microbiology, Immunology Department at

Melbourne University, travelling by train and tram each day. Beryl, a Clerical Officer moved from the workforce in 2000 to start her own business of In Home Family Day Care. Both are now fully retired.

In 1995 they planted 290 grape vines of assorted varieties. Each row is clearly marked to indicate which wine will be produced. Having a good friend in Dr. Mary Cole whose viticultural advice is always welcome, ensures Jean Pierre keeps the vines healthy. Well drained soil, and looking out for fungal infection is important. Bird Attack can be disastrous. Nets are required to protect the vines as soon as ripening starts.

Clos des Vignes produces between 250 and 300 bottles of wine each year. The wine making process includes picking the grapes, then crushing, destemming, and pressing the juice, and is a family affair. Tall grandchildren really make life easier and the family eat heartily of foods prepared for the occasion.

Jean Pierre was born in the centre of the Bordeaux region in France acclaimed as one of the best

wine producing places of the world. His grandfather grew grapes at home and made wine for his family. Jean-Pierre's cousin and her husband own a large, highly renowned vineyard in St.Emillion, Bordeaux, France, where she and her family produce some of the best wines in France. Why did Jean-Pierre and Beryl choose Bunyip as their home? Beryl said it was the village atmosphere, easy access to public transport, peace and quiet, and good friends and neighbors. "We couldn't have chosen a better place to live", she said.

TALKIN' ... FISHIN' Is it really worth the shot?

*I*n a previous part of my life I was a fishing rod builder and reel technician for some major companies, as such it amazes and annoys me to see rods and reels sacrificed, all for the sake of a photo opportunity.

Manufacturers go to great engineering lengths to supply us with the best of gear we demand to support our love of this sport, and for some operators it's their business. It's difficult to see this gear treated with such disregard by dumping it in all consistencies of watery depths. It puts lines, bearings and drag systems under conditions they were not designed to tolerate. Sand, grit and salt will find its way in, you can bet on that. Sealed drags, stainless bearings or not, they don't run well after that sort of treatment, and the repairs can be very expensive later down the track.

Rods, especially graphite can sustain hidden injuries when dropped on the rocks, to take that all important photo. This can occur in the form of cracks or chips damaging the blank that can lead to breakages. Even a weighted fly or lure cast poorly hitting the blank can cause similar small fractures leading to subsequent breakage, although not apparent to you immediately, but under heavy load when fighting your next big fish, that audible 'Snap' is something to lament.

If you're that keen on the perfect shot, take the time to photograph the main topic, that's you and your precious catch. Then add the additional shots of the valued gear used to land that magnificent trophy fish and your location views for those all-important memories. And what's up with the trend of rod and reel clenched in the teeth or positioned over the back of the neck, like a photo bomber that's afraid of not being in the pic, I just don't get it at all. If your tackle is precious enough to be worthy of a photo then take care of it. Treat your gear with some lovin'. I hated seeing quality gear abused and neglected, then customers expecting to present it for warranty repairs, clearly not under the guidelines of normal use.

I never knew what a Go-Pro was before, I sure do now, ("that's because you're old Dad!"). Seems every aspiring and budding fishing reporter and U-tube star has one strapped to their head, chest with one also at the front and/or rear of their watercraft and one on the end of a stick as well. Not a bit of action is missed, either in the water or on it, with constant commentary along with the action, perceived or real. Are we really that important? 'The Truman Show' has truly come to life for us all, under constant video surveillance or bombarded with the latest boring everyday footage. Give us all a break and just let us get on with our lives and you enjoy yours in silence please. As with others, I too like to be well informed, but talk about overkill, sure, save it for your mates, they'll either enjoy it with you or not, and give you their honest opinion, whether you like it or not, and as a bonus they'll keep your ego in check as well.

Well thanks all, glad to get that off my chest, too many Lockdowns I think! Get out there if you can.

Dress to slide!

Many years ago, shortly after the idea of getting my motorbike licence first entered my head, I attended a Rider Training course out at Kilsyth. I must admit that at first it was pretty intimidating, but money very well spent, for most of us were mere novices, all very eager to hit the open road, but with barely a clue between us! There were a number of valuable lessons learned that weekend when it came to riding a motorbike – turning, braking, slow-riding, clutch control etc, but one of the most stand-out lessons that still sticks with me to this day was about the gear you wear when riding a motorbike.

The rather charismatic instructor looked around the class, checking out our jackets and boots/shoes, and recognising that once again he had a bunch of hacks on deck, then asked us what we'd rather be wearing if we happen to come off the bike at 70km/h hurtling down the bitumen? The question was apparently met with a few blank looks – afterall, a few of us had gone to the trouble of donning our favourite Blundstone boots, and a couple even had fashionable leather jackets...albeit from the local Steven Datner outlet!

His point being that regardless of fashions, or convenience, or temperature, that we should always wear the best and most protective purpose-made motorbiking gear...and that we should "dress to slide, not just to ride"!

The instructor proceeded to explain that those Blundstones, with the elastic sides, for example may be a good work boot, with steel caps and easy to pull on and off, but are less than ideal should you happen to come off your bike and your foot is caught underneath while sliding down the road...not a pleasant thought. The elastic would allow the boot to be pulled off regardless of whether you have the steel-caped toe or not. Always wear strong, leather, purpose-made boots, with good ankle support and protection, "...and don't skimp on price!". All valuable advice even to this day.

Furthermore, it goes without saying that strong, durable jackets and pants are a must, regardless of the temperature or weather. There are so many good brands and materials out there I won't even try to comment one way or another, but in terms of comfort, believe me once you're moving and the wind is circulating around your body, you will forget about the heat. Its of course a different story once you stop, but the point being that good gear MUST be worn whenever you ride – that includes jacket, pants, boots, gloves and of course the helmet.

Murphy's Law will test you that first time you ditch the jacket for a t-shirt because its 38 degrees out!

Are You Eligible For The Power Bonus?

A \$250 Power Saving Bonus is a once-off payment available to all Victorian households with at least one concession cardholder in residence. All pension types will be eligible – age pension, disability support pension, carer payment and single parenting payment.

The payments have been available from 1 February 2021 and end on 31 January 2022.



Payments will be limited to one per eligible household. There is plenty of time to claim your bonus.

Concession card holders to claim the bonus will need to head to the <u>Victorian Energy Compare</u> <u>website</u>. This website provides Victorian consumers with information about how to source the best price for their electricity or gas supply. You will need a copy of a recent power or gas bill. Once you have completed a simple comparison exercise, you will be able to provide your details and receive the \$250 bonus.

The bonus will be paid into your nominated bank account within two to three weeks via electronic funds transfer.

Destructive Quarry in Bunyip North Looms!

Hanson's Quarry Plans for public exhibition from April 2021

Dear Residents,

A survey of local residents showed 100% opposition to a quarry in the proposed location. From 2006 when Hanson purchased land in the name of a pastoral company, Hanson has misled the community.

Mount Cannibal and District Preservation Group Inc. (MCADPG) is preparing to oppose the proposed quarry - your support is needed – **NOW MORE THAN EVER!**

APRIL – MAY 2021 – EES Public Exhibition:

After the planning Minister has reviewed the EES, it is released for <u>public comment</u> for up to 30 business days. During this time, <u>the public can make written submissions</u> indicating concerns they have and any objections they wish to make regarding the proposed quarry.

WE NEED TO WORK TOGETHER AND SUBMIT AS MANY SUBMISSIONS AS POSSIBLE

AREAS OF CONCERN - this mega-quarry proposal is bigger than Melbourne's CBD!

Traffic - Upwards of 500 truck movements per day from quarry operations

Environment - Hanson propose to clear 47.5ha of old growth native forest.

Water - 3 entire hills will be removed! Stopping surface water flow-depleting dams on nearby farms. Affecting water flow in Cannibal Creek & Bunyip River.

Flora & Fauna - In & around the 800 acre proposed site is home to rare orchids & endangered fauna.

Air Quality - Quarry operations create Dust. Silica-laden dust can travel many kilometers to townships.

Mount Cannibal reserve is a State Significant area with unique & some endangered plants and animals. The proposed quarry is only 360 metres away from the reserve.

Blasting - the proposal includes significant blasting.

The Hanson project is planned to have a 70-100 year life span – all this destruction for 7 jobs!

Your Consideration is required - Is this quarry proposal good for the health of the area?

Hello from Garfield Community Garden

Things to do in your gardens:

Mulch

Top up mulch on your veggie patches, herb gardens and flower beds, especially important for weed suppression at this time of year. Mulch after watering - to a depth of about 7cm.

Keep mulch clear of plant stems... especially young seedlings.

Plant Food

Plants need a feed at this time of year. A seaweed tea, or any low environmental impact liquid fertiliser, great for the seedlings you've just planted. Apply to the soil early in the morning, and in the concentrations as per the packet.

Weeding

A necessary job - good to do at this time of year.

Cut down the competition between your plants and tidy up your patch.

Water Smart

Water first thing in the morning - a nice, deep drink a couple of times a week is far more beneficial than a quick watering.

Manting for March

Sow Seeds direct in soil

Broad beans, Beetroot, Carrot, Chives, Coriander, Daikon Radish, Endive, Florence Fennel, Leeks, Mizuna, Mustard Greens, Oregano, Pak Choy, Parsley, Radish, Rocket, Shallots, Silverbeet, Spinach, Turnip

Start in seed trays or plant out (transplant) seedlings or sow seed

Lettuce

Start undercover in seed trays to plant out in 4-6 weeks

Broccoli, Brussel Sprouts, Cabbage, Kale

Planning ahead... Planting for April

Sow Seeds direct in soil

Did You Know By Roman Kulkewycz

1753: In Sweden February 17was followed by March 1 as the country moved from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar.

1864: Famous Australian bush poet, journalist and author Banjo Patterson was born Andrew Barton Paterson at the property "Narrambla", near Orange, New South Wales. He wrote many ballads and poems about Australian life, focusing particularly on the rural and outback areas, including the district around Binalong, New South Wales where he spent much of his childhood. Paterson's more notable poems include "Waltzing Matilda", "The Man from Snowy River" and "Clancy of the Overflow". In 1885, Paterson began submitting and having his poetry published in the Sydney edition of *The Bulletin* under the pseudonym of "The Banjo", the name of a favourite horse. Paterson, like *The Bulletin*, was an ardent nationalist, and in 1889 published a pamphlet, *Australia for the Australians* which told of his disdain for cheap labour and his admiration of hard work and the nationalist spirit. In 1890, The Banjo wrote "The Man from Snowy River", a poem which caught the heart of the nation, and in 1895 had a collection of his works published under that name. This book is the most sold collection of Australian Bush poetry and is still being reprinted today. Paterson also became a journalist, lawyer, jockey, soldier and a farmer.

1867: The first ship passed through the Suez Canal.

1882: The first cricket Test match at the Sydney Cricket Ground began.

1934: Australian comedian, satirist, dadaist, artist and character actor John Barry Humphries was born in the Melbourne suburb of Camberwell. Humphries is best known for writing and playing his on-stage and television alter egos Dame Edna Everage and Sir Les Patterson.

1940: American singer-songwriter Gene Francis Alan Pitney was born in Hartford, Connecticut.

1958: Pope Pius XII declared Saint Clare of Assisi (1193~1253) the patron saint of television.
